## Huge Industry For Diamonds Returns Home

ANTWERP, June 14 (AP)—Half of the world's diamond industry has returned to this historic European trading center in the year since the end of hostilities in Europe.

Control of the world diamond market has been centered in the diamond light offices and shops along Antwerp's ancient Rue Du Prince for 500 years, but the war shattered the industry to the four corners of the earth.

Merchants in Palestine, Brazil, Canada and the United States groped feverishly for the market during the war years, but it came back to Antwerp again.

During 1945, even though half the stock was shipped by Antwerp exports, it was valued at \$200,000,000 in diamonds. In the first two months of 1946 almost half of that value was reported, mostly to the United States.

Diamond cutters and polishers in Belgium make from 2,000 to 4,000 francs a week (about \$40 to \$80) which is about twice the average wage in the country.

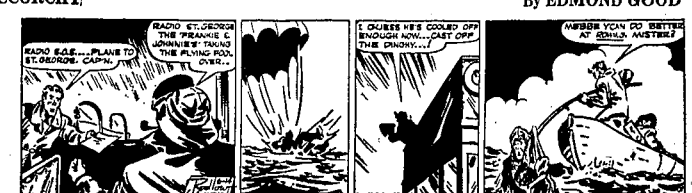

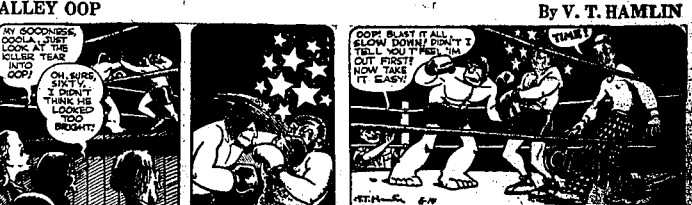

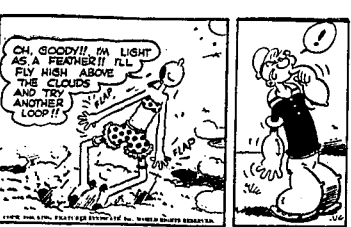
