Miners Threaten Strike in Search of Meat Supplies

The nation's meat supply hit a new low today as coal miners in three states threatened to strike for a full dinner pail. The production of beef was only 10 per cent of normal. Retail butchers across the country either had closed shops or curtailed operations. Spokesmen for the meat industry predicted gloomily that there would be even less meat this week. The only bright spot was the promise of more meat after the end of the month. Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles said more meat would reach consumers next month with a decision on the future of price controls. Bowles believed the meat would become available whether the controls are discontinued or not. Coal miners in western Pennsylvania, eastern Kentucky and southern Illinois threatened to stop work unless they get more meat. A spokesman for Pennsylvania miners said that the men will just sit home because their work is useless and they won't go to work without food in their dinner pails.

Rains Help in Halting Vast Range Blaze

Eisenhower Says Reds Concealed Plans Until Near End of Fight

WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower recorded in his final report today as supreme ally commander in Europe that he was kept in the dark about Russia's grand strategy until four months before V-E day. Then, however, Marshal Stalin came through with full plans for the red army's final offensive, which became one jaw of a bite that crushed the German war machine "to a degree never before experienced in the history of modern armies."

Culturists in Germany Have Russ Friends

BERLIN, June 24 (AP)—Soviet Russia is beating out American and Britain in the art of winning friends among the German cultural class. The Russians are making a powerful and apparently increasing successful bid for the support of the former Reich's top-flight creative and intellectual level by a double-barreled campaign that appeals (1) to their vanity and (2) to their belly.

Sincere Berlin artists of radio, the theater, or the writing world complain that it is difficult for them to work in the atmosphere of inferiority with which the western allies surround them.

"The Russians never make us feel that we are a beaten nation," said one German intellectual, "but the Americans and British always manage in certain moments to impress on us that they are victors."

A well known German playwright put it this way:
"You have to approach Americans for putting through your project for finding a chance to publish or put on a play—but the Russians on the other hand, approach you first themselves... even seek your collaboration."

They go even further to stimulate cooperation on the artistic level by special materialistic inducements, such as extra monthly rations of butter, cooking oil, flour and winter fuel. They also are that no productive and talented German musician, writer, painter, or singer is thrown out of his home to make room for a Russian officer's family. Until recently American occupation officers made no distinction even between Nazi and non-Nazi when it came to the question of eviction.

The Russians have on occasion courted rather than punished culturally influential Germans with a record of forbearance to the westward. Their program has been to win such men over to their own propaganda by special favors. One German actor, for example, who had been signally recognized by the Nazis, was released from jail and his expropriated estate returned to him after he saw the new Soviet light.

In a time when bread is more scarce and important than money, some German artists point out that in the American zone a waitress gets more in terms of stomach wages than the poorest musician. And in Germany today only the stomach wages count.

NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—Being a bowery bum costs about \$18 a week these days to Joe Campbell it is going back to work!

Joe leaves the beer, the shadows, and the ancient women with their anxious, painted faces.

"And it'll seem strange," he said, "Sometimes I like to sleep. Sometimes I think I was not born living here, and never worked at all."

Back to Railroad
"But that's finished now. It's all washed up. I'm going back to the road, to sandy dancing, on the railroad."

Inflation has done it, Joe explained. As far as he's concerned, inflation has beat the O.P.A. The air money has hit the bowery bum down with the rest of the rest of the rest, and a man can't live any more without having blisters on his feet.

"Thirty cents—six nickels—to sleep in a flophouse. That's how bad things are."

Tough All Over
"When you fork over 30 cents, like I did last night, it's getting tough all over," Joe said. "It isn't no fun with half-a-hundred bucks crawling on your ribs. You can take it or leave it the way I told you. I want my last 20 cents, but I took it."

Time was, before the war, when Joe Campbell could afford to go out at night and give nothing. But now he just gives you anything to eat.

He paid 20 cents in the city. If he wanted to splurge, he'd spend a half dollar.

Handout Unchanged
Joe said bumbling a dime here, or two there, has lost its meaning. "You can't eat off a dime," he explained, "and you can't pay to be a gent. I'm hungry and need a few things to eat a lot more."

In fact, people don't hand out as much to the panhandlers now.

"They got more dough," Joe said. "But I guess they're getting more. They're having a good time. They think you're kidding if you ask your laundry."

"It costs the average bum about \$18 a week now," he said. "That's too much for life in the bowery. A guy can relax."

War Weapons Use Eyed for Weed Battles

BOISE, June 24.—(AP)—The bureau of reclamation will launch an all-out offensive against weeds in reclamation areas in the west with such war-time weapons as flame throwers, beach-storming amphibious tractors, and war developed chemicals spearheading the attack.

Commissioner Michael W. Strauss of the reclamation bureau said today.

To blast weeds from their foot-holds in irrigation ditches and farmer's croplands, the bureau in cooperation with agencies of the department of agriculture, local weed districts, and private settlers, has set up a comprehensive weed control program, the commissioner said.

The program will be pushed vigorously in the Pacific northwest under the technical guidance of trained weed specialists," he added.

The military weapons, which got their basic training in extermination and "weeding-out" on Pacific Islands against the Japanese, are expected to prove invaluable in the control program.

The amphibian tractors will be used in clearing areas of ditches and cattails. Flame throwers will be used as weed burners and the chemicals are expected to be effective weed killers.

Bureau of Reclamation Agriculture R. B. Johnson said "weeds eat the farmer more every year than all crop and animal products, insects and predators animals, and rodents combined. An estimate taken before the war placed the cost of weeds to the average farm at about \$450 a year. Weeds were accepted as a natural calamity, about which nothing practical could be done to combat them on a large scale. With the development of many such weapons as we will employ, we hope to beat the weed problem on a major scale."

Earlier Sunday morning a crash driven by Carl Galkin, Wendell, overturned four and a half miles north of Jerome on highway 83. Fast driving was given as the cause of the mishap and Galkin is being held in the Jerome county jail, Sheriff Johnson said.

Riding with Galkin was Don Carter, also of Wendell. The two men received slight lacerations. Damage to the car was estimated between \$200 and \$300 by Deputy J. M. Pardee, who also investigated.

The overturning Wendell car caused the third mishap of the weekend when Edward Libert, Twin Falls, whose attention was drawn to the wreck, failed to see a car driven by John Carey, Jerome, pull onto the highway in front of him. Both cars received minor damage. Deputy Pardee said Carey had also stopped to gaze at the previous wreck.
