Genova Plant Operations to Be Open Soon

NEW YORK, July 12 (AP)—Steel making at the Genova plant, Utah, plans scheduled to be resumed on July 27, when a portion of the open hearth department will be brought into production, Irving S. Oida, chairman, board of directors, Oida Steel corporation, today said.

This will enable the slabbing mill to begin producing formed steel so as to permit the finishing mills to turn out some finished steel products commencing sometime in August, Oida added.

Meanwhile, he said, the effective blast furnace production, recently purchased from the government by U. S. Steel—came closer to realization this week with the blowing-in of an additional blast furnace.

Placing the blast furnace in operation is a part of the corporation's program, says Geneva Steel, to bring in to the production of steel products as promptly as possible so as to aid in supplying heavy demands for steel in the fast west.

For the time being, Oida said, the plant will be operated by Geneva Steel company, the same subsidiary of the Geneva Steel corporation, which is in charge of the plant for the government under a lease agreement.

Under the lease agreement, the Geneva Steel company is to quickly re-assemble a competent operating organization.

THE MANGRUM MANNER, No. 1: Determine Golf Grip by Trial and Error, Open Champ Says

By *Phyllis Mangrum*

Every good golfer does something that suits his particular physique or temperament. It may be a different stance in putting, how he grips the club, or how he swings.

His club, etc., but sound golf is based on fundamental principles. The first thing to learn is how to hold the club. There are three types of grip: the interlocking, overlapping and full hand grip.

The interlocking and overlapping grips cause both hands to work as one. The full hand grip gives added driving power, but is liable to especially with beginners—to have one hand working against the other.

I take a full grip with the left hand, and with thumb extended straight down the shaft so the V formed by thumb and forefinger points toward the right shoulder when the club is approached to the ball.

The middle fingers of the right hand are placed underneath the shaft with little finger inserted between left and right hands. The right thumb gripping the shaft to the V formed by thumb and forefinger also points toward right shoulder when the clubhead is laid on the approach. The grip is firm, but not too tight. This keeps the club from slipping or twisting during the swing.

The overlapping grip is the same as the interlocking, except that the right little finger lies outside the left forefinger in the device formed by the latter and the middle left finger.

The full right hand grip holds the club with hands in the same position as the overlapping, except that all fingers of each hand are on the clubhead with lateral side of the right hand closely touching the forefinger of the left.

Many teachers advocate use of the full right hand grip for players with small hands, hence most women use it.

30 Moose and 35 Sheep To Be Killed in Idaho

BOISE, July 12.—For the first time in more than a decade, a lucky few Idaho hunters will be permitted to shoot 30 moose and 35 mountain sheep in special hunts this fall. The state fish and game commission today authorized the moose hunt for Oct. 15-24 in Fremont county north and west of Fall River.

The sheep hunt will be Sept. 15-24 in parts of Idaho, Idaho, Idaho and Lemhi counties.

Permits will be issued the hunters after public drawings conducted by the fish and game commission. The most hunters will be required to take along a state conservation officer or other approved guide to make certain that only mature bulls are killed.
