

# Brazilian Seeking Abolition of War; Takes I.R.I. Post

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—Capt. Alvaro Alberto, Brazilian navy scientist and explosives expert, formally took over the chairmanship of the United Nations atomic energy commission today with the assertion that not atomic war but all war should be outlawed.

"The outlawing of war is a noble idea," he said, "perhaps the greatest and noblest of all ideas."

He suggested that international control of atomic energy would be an important step toward the abolition of war.

# Russia's War Hero Ousted From Top Job

NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—Generalissimo Stalin has shaken up the high command of the red army and relegated Marshal Georgi K. Zhukov, the Soviet Union's top hero, to a obscure provincial post.

No announcement of the red army's new top command has yet been made. Soviet public but the United Press today learned that it already has been carried out.

Chief Victim  
The chief victim of the red army reorganization, so far the United Press has been able to learn, was Zhukov, commander in chief of the ground forces and the top military hero of Russia's World War II campaign.

First indication of the red army shakeup came in a brief United Press dispatch which declared Zhukov's ouster.

It said: "Unconfirmed reports said today that Marshal Zhukov has been appointed to command the Odessa military district."

Real Let-Down  
Today the United Press obtained the real let-down. It was the relief of his high command and sent to the obscure Odessa post—a demotion, it was widely felt.

Dr. D. D. Kuznetsov to command the U.S. army post at New Orleans. Zhukov, it was learned, is not the only victim of the reorganization.

Details of the changes are not yet available.

# Pay Contract Favors Lewins In Coal Mines

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—A government agency was reported to favor John L. Lewis's new labor pact in the coal coal industry.

It means that Lewis and his United Mine Workers (U.M.W.) have the first contract specifying supervisors' wages and working conditions in the industry's history.

Fought for Years  
Mine owners for years have tried to keep the U.M.W. out of the contract applicable to supervisors on the contention that they are not employees.

In recent weeks the operators sought unsuccessfully to restrain the government from entering into such an agreement. The mines still are in the federal ownership as a result of the seizure order which grew out of the two-month bituminous strike this spring.

Shapes Policies

Members of the executive board besides Kroll are: David J. McDonald, secretary-treasurer of the CIO Textile Workers; Julius Epstein, secretary-treasurer of the CIO Electrical Workers; George F. Johnson, secretary-treasurer of the CIO Automobile Workers; and the CIO Textile Workers.

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# Tuber Moths Held Menace to Spruds; Burely Battle Set

BOISE, July 18 (AP)—Gov. Arnold Williams today directed that "everything humanly possible within the law be done" to combat an infestation of tuber moth which state department of agriculture officials said "endangers the state's entire winter storage potato crop."

The governor ordered the immediate application of \$5,000 to launch an aerial and ground spraying attack at Burely where the most serious outbreak has been discovered.

"The tuber moth is being held by the millions," declared Wilson Kellogg, acting director of plant industry, who inspected the district yesterday. "It may be in Idaho Falls, St. Anthony and Caldwell as well."

Kellogg at a meeting of the state pest control commission today explained the infestation.

Potatoes were shipped from California for use by processing plants in Idaho during the "off season" before the harvest of early Idaho potatoes began.

Despite state department of agriculture orders that the carboys of potatoes be fumigated there is a possibility the fumigation was not strong enough to destroy the potato moth.

Kellogg said that the storage houses of a Burely processing plant are "very old" and that the moth has been able to penetrate the walls of the plant.

He said the infestation in other communities is likely because California shippers had sent to Idaho carboys of potatoes to sell to the state department of agriculture.

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# Retail Store Dealers Join Price Strike

Retailers in three states today joined labor, veterans and civil groups in retailing price increases.

More than 400 members of the National Retailers Association planned to meet Tuesday to consider raising their prices for one day as a protest against rising wholesale meat prices.

Retail grocers in "Tupelo, Miss., boycotted distributors after a five-cent price increase in the price of pork."

Boys Refused  
Memphis, Tenn., milk distributors refused to raise a 25 cent price increase on to consumers because of a congressional action on OPA.

A week-long boycott on meat purchased by the U.S. government and union leaders, was under way in Detroit. Union members in other cities pledged their support.

The Connecticut OPA council was recruiting labor organizations and community groups for a state-wide demonstration next week.

Plains Sticks

## Oregon Solon Raps Attitude Of Physicians

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Dr. E. H. Morse, R. O. O., said today he believed the medical profession has adopted too much of a negative attitude toward growing public demand for more universal medical care.

Morse made his comment in a statement sent to Dr. Edward H. McKim, president of the Oregon State Medical Society, at Oregon City. He said it was in answer to statements of Oregon medical men criticizing him for being one of the senators who introduced a bill to provide for maternal and child welfare.

He said he was speaking of the nation as a whole rather than of the Oregon medical men alone.

Morse said the national child welfare bill would be materially changed in committee.

"I work to protect to the maximum degree possible within confines of the public's interest the private property rights of doctors in their professions," Morse said, "but I don't propose to let the people that some doctors in Oregon seem to think I should accept, namely that medical profession is surrounded with some sort of special sanctity that entitles it to absolute immunity from any public consideration from legislative standpoint aimed at giving to all our people more adequate medical attention."

Morse said he believed the best interests of the nation's health can be served without socialized medicine but said the public had a deep interest in protecting the health of the nation.

## Senate Favors Pay For Wake Civilians

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Back pay and disability and death benefits dating from Jan. 1, 1942, would be paid to civilians working on Guam, Wake and the Philippine Islands under a bill passed by the senate yesterday and sent to the house.

Most of the hundreds of men, who were captured when the Japanese invaded the islands, were recruited by construction firms from the Pacific northwest. Many lost their lives and others were taken to Japanese prison camps.

## Dan Cavanagh May Win Nod For Bourbons

BOISE, July 18 (AP)—A week from next Monday Democrats will gather in Boise in convention to select a state chairman and adopt a platform.

The word goes round now that the Democrat leaders hope to settle differences that may arise over selection of a state chairman before the convention opens so that the party may present a solid front to the people.

### Acceptable to Leaders

Whether that shall be done remains to be seen. Dan Cavanagh, the genial former Twin Falls contractor the said United Press he had almost completed dissolution of his contracting business has the support of many Bourbon leaders. He is entirely acceptable to Gov. Arnold Williams. And the governor traditionally "picks" the state chairman. The word went around earlier that Cavanagh also was acceptable to Sen. Glen H. Taylor, who though not a candidate, is expected to play a part in selection of a chairman, but the name of W. I. Koster of Moscow, now has entered the picture. Koster is said to be Taylor's choice.

Koster is a former Idaho county treasurer (1901-3) and has always opposed any attempt to make a four-year version out of the southern branch at Pocatello. Koster, it is understood, is a supporter of George Donart, the Democrat senatorial nominee, for whom Taylor dumped the state in the primary election.

### Refuses to Run

Treasurer Chairman Dave Bush said he will not be a candidate and would not accept if "drafted." Many other candidates have been mentioned, but not a one has strong backing like Cavanagh, who served several terms as Twin Falls county chairman.

Cavanagh and Williams are close political friends. So were Cavanagh and Sen. Charles C. Gossett, whom Donart defeated. But Cavanagh also is friendly to Donart. Taylor is scheduled to attend the convention. Whether he will attempt to control the convention is not known. Be as it may, this correspondent has learned authoritatively that Gov. Williams will oppose such an attempt. One of his friends quoted him as saying: "Taylor will not run the state of Idaho or the Democrat party."

His showing to employees celebrates the 40th anniversary of the incorporation of Swift and company, according to C. H. Smith, Swift manager in Twin Falls.

Smith said the idea of producing "Red Wagon" was an outgrowth of the Swift suggestion plan and that it will be shown to employees as a feature of the annual "family suggestion party" here.

Most of "Red Wagon" was filmed in Hollywood with a cast including 23 principal characters and a number of other "bit" parts together with hundreds of Swift employees. It was produced for the company by top ranking Hollywood motion picture technicians. The picture stars John Whitney and Barbara Woodell.

A musical program is also planned at the party, Smith said.

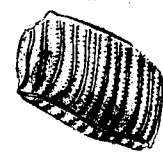

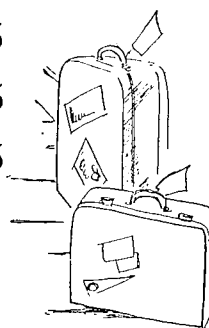
