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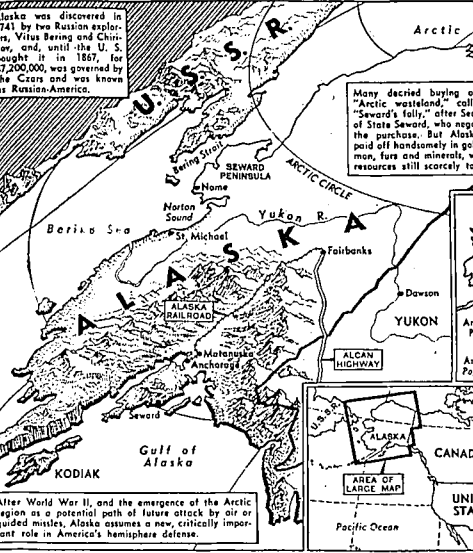
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ALASKA—The Forty-Ninth State?

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 8 (U.P.)—A hurricane which boiled up in the western Caribbean to whirl furiously toward the thickly populated Florida coast, was expected to hit the state today.

Tampa, St. Petersburg and other resort cities in the Tampa area had been warned to expect a heavy rain and high winds early today which swept on up the Florida mainland, turning north and heading toward south Georgia and South Carolina.

The committee voted 11 to 1 to petition for decontrol, and authorized Robert C. Thompson, executive vice-president of the Live Stock Association, Lima, O., and Rocco G. Hayes, executive chairman and vice-president of Wilson and company, Chicago, to sign the appeal.

The decontrol action came as the war department announced that negotiations are under way for a "loan" of 20,000,000 pounds of beef belonging to Great Britain to meet requirements for troops overseas.

District Manager Harry A. Eick of the Idaho Sugar Beet Association, outlined progress and recent developments in the sugar beet processing industry in a luncheon meeting of the Twin Falls Rotary club.

After telling of modern methods of sugar manufacture, the speaker pointed out that, through a process discovered six years ago, it is possible to make syrup from molasses, which was formerly used as a cattle feed. This, however, does not cut the amount of pulp still available as a feed.

Through a process of preparing fertilizer as another by-product, there is an almost complete utilization of every sugar beet that enters the plant, according to the speaker.

He also touched upon the fact that certain OPA rulings have resulted in a curtailment of syrup production from the molasses.
