Russians Want Peace, Chance to Improve Standard of Living, Uncensored Journey in Soviet Discloses

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following dispatch is based on a 4,000 mile unedited, uncensored trip through the Soviet Union by an experienced editor and world traveler. Unusual facilities for talking to the Russian workers and farmers in their homes and on their collective farms were obtained by the writer when he called Stalin after six months of efforts through regular channels had failed to get him a passport visa to Russia.

The Russian people do not want war. They want peace, a chance to improve their standard of living, an opportunity to clear the ruins of World War II and build their homes, farms and factories for the future.

Those are my dominant impressions after an unparalleled opportunity to travel 4,000 miles through Byelorussia, the Ukraine, the Caucasus and Moscow, without official guide or censor.

Few people have been permitted to travel unhindered through Soviet Russia. To the best of my knowledge, no other newspaperman has been given as great a freedom as I had to go where I pleased, to talk freely with the people in their factories, in their markets and in their homes, to have a look at the hundreds of pictures of life and conditions behind the so-called iron curtain. This privilege was granted to me only after I had called Prime Minister Stalin when he was in the Caucasus to obtain a visa through regular channels were unavailing. I appeared to Stalin in the presence of a writer for American farm publications, to talk to the common people of Russia, to hope for "improvement" in their standard of living, and to understand behind the so-called iron curtain, 10 days later I had the visa.

I finished my tour with a stern admission of our official sources that of the millions of agriculture to "fill the stomach" of the Russian people. The official asked for my copy, and this dispatch is transferred from my original notes. No one sought to conduct my travels, although on the half-dozen occasions my coming was announced in advance, the Russians were quick to set up a welcome, dress the children in shoes and hats, and to offer me a banquet table. It was easy to appreciate the pitifully small "communist" standard of living, and these occasions afforded me an opportunity for comparison with what I know in the United States.

No Russian official has even examined the hundreds of photographs I took in the cities and farms of Russia. Much of the territory I covered is still former "bread baskets" of Russia. 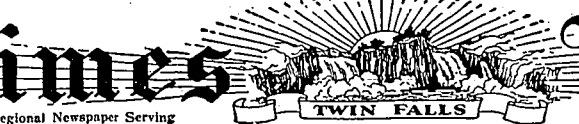

45 Cities Report Shortages Worse Than During War

A sharply etched picture of shortages of meat, soap, sugar, toilet tissue and other key living items—worse in many instances than during the bleakest war days—was disclosed today by a survey of 45 cities. Up and down across the country, major communities reported that many normal essentials had either gone from the shelves entirely, disappeared under the counter to become items for favored customers, or were available only to the lucky or conniving shopper.

The cross-section check by the Associated Press brought in these among other returns: In 40 of the 45 cities meat was either not available at all, or more often was in supply ranging from a small fraction of normal to an "occasional" appearance. In all 45 cities soap was in short supply.

In 24 cities sugar was scarce or even in acute shortage, while in 18 others it was either plentiful or in fair to middling supply.

Sixteen communities listed toilet tissue among top shortages. Cooking oils and fats, shortening, mayonnaise, salad oils, oleomargarine, lard, syrup and other items containing sugar were short in varying degrees in most cities—a list to which the Jacksonville, Fla., reporter tacked on "booby whisks" and Milwaukee added a diaper shortage.

Base, Ida., stood out as a bright spot in the nation. It reported "no shortage of beef, lamb, pork or butter," but complained mildly that there was a scarcity of "certain cuts of pork."

Even in Idaho, however, when a food mart actually advertised its supply of soap and shortening a shortage of soap and only 10 per cent of the jammed customers could be accommodated. Base also had shortages of "booby whisks," mayonnaise, cheese and some canned goods.

Reports of minor disturbances in the dash to capture scarce items were scattered throughout the country. In Columbus, O., where some housewives were reported to be bringing their own broilers and only one wishful buyer lost a tooth and two were scratched when 30 women were left to fight for a single turkey.

2. There is a genuine gratitude and appreciation not only for the assistance which the U. S. gave the Soviet Union to defeat the Germans, but also for the UNRRA food shipments which in some cases may be making the difference between life and widespread starvation in the many Russian cities.

3. The people are amazed and baffled to read in their newspapers that the U. S. is plotting aggression against Russia and brandishing the atomic bomb offensively.

4. Communism, as practiced in Russia, is far from Utopia. In its present phase of development it involves such bogies of U. S. left wing labor leadership as the speed-up, incentive pay and back-breaking work days.

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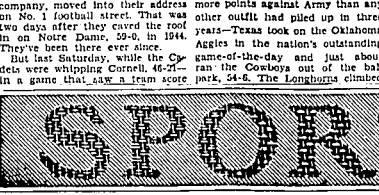

Beet Pay Can Be Raised if Field Frozen

If the ground freezes or fields are flooded by rain, beet-growers in Twin Falls county were expected to secure a 10 to 20 cent increase over set-rates for field-workers by C. E. Herremans, boss, state wage stabilization board chairman, at the county labor sponsoring association's meeting Tuesday in the courthouse.

This optional wage increase, however, is applicable only in special instances, the boss man said, and must be approved by the wage board.

The option may also be applied to weekly standards of beet, he indicated.

In most cases, higher wage scales will be employed only on the recommendations of sugar factory representatives. If there is a dispute between field man-Joe Haxman in Amiahamslet sugar's representative—and farmer, a distinguished outsider will be called in to arbitrate.

The ruling is timely because of heavy rains in this area which kept workers out of beet-fields for a day and one-half this week, two days last week and four days down up the factories, according to Harry A. Block, Twin Falls, district manager of Amiahamslet.

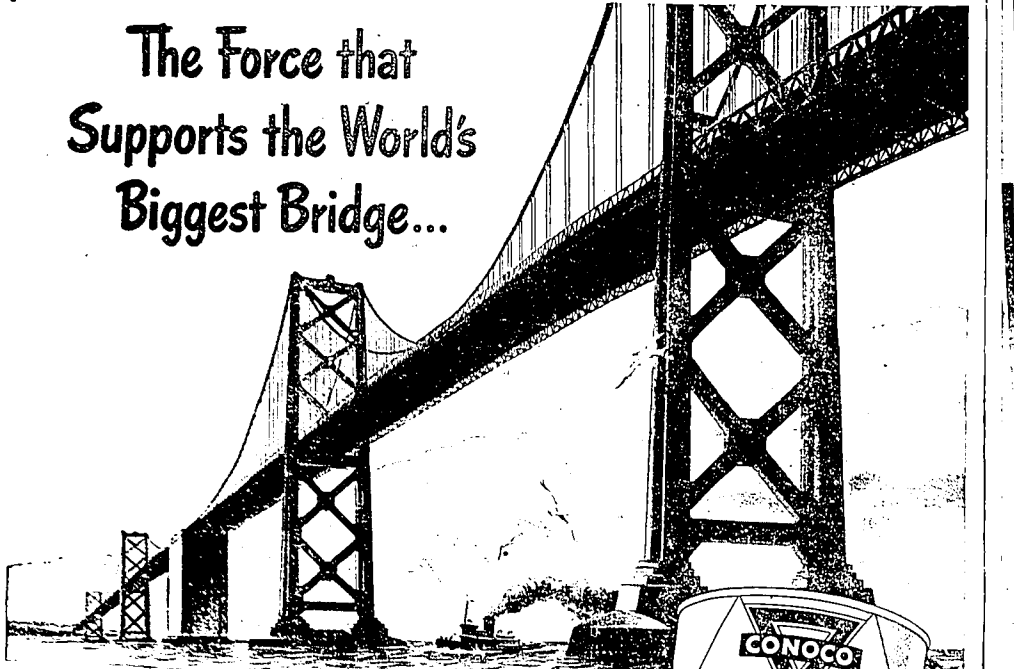
