Nazis Cremated; Keitel's Suicide Plans Disclosed

NUERNBERG, Oct. 17 (AP)—The bodies of Hermann Goering and the 10 other Nazi war criminals have been cremated and the ashes "dispersed secretly," it was officially announced today.

The announcement of the disposition of the bodies was made at 5:35 p.m. by Col. B. C. Andrus, prison commandant. He spoke in the name of the allied control council, which was in charge of all details of the hangings and burial.

A six-line communique, headed up the major mystery in this war of the hangings. The bodies were removed from the prison at 5:34 a.m. Wednesday in two sealed trucks, guarded by jeeps.

Where cremation took place was not disclosed. The dispersed details were wrapped in equal secrecy.

Prison authorities disclosed that Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel had planned, like Goering, to escape the gallows with suicide. But he was foiled by a watchful guard.

Keitel Plan Told

As a result of the trial, U. S. army officers combed every possibility to determine how Goering planned to escape. As he followed with suicide, but he was foiled by a watchful guard.

Keitel had returned to prison after a court appearance one day recently and was changing to old clothing. As he walked, he pushed something down his sleeve.

When the guard noticed it and grabbed the waist, in a corner he found a small, sharp piece of metal.

Keitel had planned to use the metal to cut his way out of the prison. He was foiled by a watchful guard.

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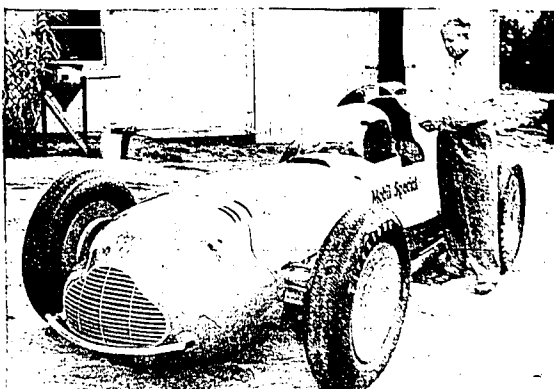
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Auto Racer Pursues New Record

Bad Weather Delays Trial On Salt Flats

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 17 (AP)—Speed king Ab Jenkins announced today that he definitely plans to go ahead with his scheduled attempt at new automobile records on the Bonneville salt flats when weather permits.

A driving team yesterday partially inundated the 10-mile circular course on Utah's salt flats but Jenkins said the time resulting from the third postponement of the speed run will be used to good advantage.

Fire and fuel crews, who have been given an opportunity to improve techniques in the hopes of cutting down on time, will be on hand.

Pending clearing weather, the "mobile speedster" racing team, which is being displayed publicly in Salt Lake City after it undergoes a cleaning, Jenkins said.

"We've had the car in speeds of 125 miles an hour in tests this week," he said. "I'm confident that, with clearing, it will be ready to go on a moment's notice. We can take advantage of the first stretch of good weather."

"There is no valid reason for postponing the lower grades for harvest vacation," he stated. "The children can't help out appreciably and the work is too hard for the small ones."

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OPA Frees Coffee on Drive to Scrap All Price Controls

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—OPA today removed price lids from coffee as it speeded up the decontrol drive. The price agency said it has approved a decontrol petition on both green and roasted coffee at all levels of distribution. As the White House prepared to hasten the scrapping of wage controls along with food price ceilings, OPA freed all vegetable fats and oils—margarine, mayonnaise and salad dressings—from federal restraints. The agency said it agreed to lift its price ceilings on coffee because "data presented by the industry and obtained by OPA" indicated that "supply and demand were approximately in balance."

The action represented the first formal approval of a petition for removal of ceilings on requests of one of OPA's industrial advisory committees.

The petitioners was the coffee industry advisory committee.

OPA must act on such petitions within 15 days and it pointed out that today's action came 10 days after the decontrol petition was accepted.

Haps Decontrol Move

Even as the pace quickened, UNRRA Director Florentia H. LaGuardia denounced the decision which led to the speed-up—removal of meat controls—and declared that it would result in "a serious trial confusion, financial dislocation, social disturbance and political chaos."

As LaGuardia spoke, in Oklahoma City, a high government official here predicted that the day or so after President Truman will clarify the status of the wage stabilization board.

As for the wage board, AFL and CIO members of the panel conferred yesterday with Roosevelt's labor secretary John H. Steelman. They indicated beforehand they would urge scrapping of the board's control of wages on any wage increase negotiated in collective bargaining.

William Willard Wirtz, chairman of the board and a public member, told newsmen after a separate conference that he was "in favor of scrapping the board's control of wages on any wage increase negotiated in collective bargaining."

Wirtz said he did not believe this course was being considered seriously by OPA and its other removing ceiling from all vegetable fats and oils was the direct result of lifting controls on meat and items derived from it.

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U. S. Shipping Paralyzed by 17-Day Strike

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—The nationwide maritime strike dragged today into its 17th day, with a complete foreign commerce almost paralyzed, relief shipments at a complete standstill and the domestic supply shortage growing more acute.

Government officials said the shipping industry's general strike pact on foreign rehabilitation programs, particularly UNRRA shipments, remained dead.

Maritime commission records showed that 82 ships were tied up in the strike, with a direct result of the strike. The number was growing daily as ships that had been scheduled to leave began, arrived in port. On the second day of the strike, 343 ships were involved.

The effects of the stoppage were aggravated by the fact that the shipping industry had tied up 15 days last month by strikes of unlicensed AFL and CIO seamen.

13 Die As Plane
Crashes in Snow

LARAMIE, Wyo., Oct. 17 (AP)—A chartered passenger plane bound from Oakland, Calif., to Cheyenne, Wyo., crashed in a blinding snowstorm, three miles west of Laramie, early today, killing the crew of three and 10 passengers.

The plane was identified by a civil engineer as a C-47, a twin-engine plane operated by the NATS Air Transport Service, a private airline.

Acting Albany County Coroner E. L. Knight said the plane crashed as it came in for a landing. He said 11 persons were killed instantly and two died in a Laramie hospital.

The plane was one mile north of the airport when it crashed.

Drivers Face Bad Shortage For Batteries

DETROIT, Oct. 17 (AP)—The shortage of electric storage batteries probably will become more critical during the coming winter than it has been at any time in the automobile industry's history.

There may be enough batteries for the restricted number of new cars and trucks that will be produced during the next two or three months, but it will be difficult to obtain the expense of an already inadequate output of batteries for replacement purposes.

Unless there is a quick easing of the battery situation thousands of motor vehicles will be made idle this winter.

These are the views expressed in authoritative sources of both the automobile and the battery industries.

The battery shortage stems from a prolonged scarcity of lead. The metal also is needed for bearings and solder, insofar as the automobile industry is concerned.

Battery manufacturers generally attribute the scarcity of lead to attribute to government control on imports and prices.

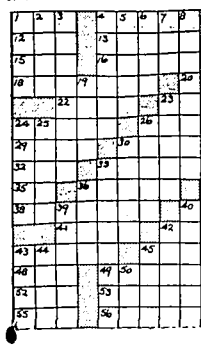

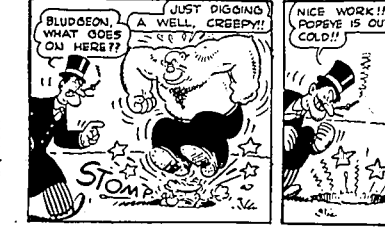

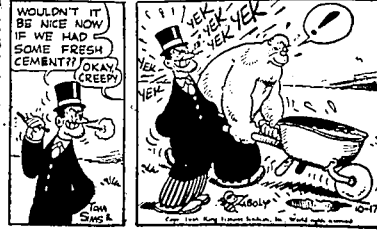

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Surplus Gents Offer Slightly Old Tobacco

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 (AP)—Know anyone who would like to buy 437,562 slightly moldy plugs of tobacco? Or 323,612 packages of shopworn scrap tobacco, also suitable for chewing?

The government, which gets mixed up in practically everything these days, has chewing tobacco on the bargain counter today.

It's surplus stock—stuff the army, navy and marines bought but didn't use.

J. V. Morrow of the department of agriculture heads the tobacco sales. He already has peddled \$5,500,000 worth for us taxpayers and has another \$2,500,000 to go.

"The cigars and cigarettes were easy," he told a reporter. "But chewing tobacco—"

"I'm having an awful time. People don't chew like they used to." To add to his problems, the tobacco has dried out, and has to be reconditioned before the choicest chewer will chew it. Only manufacturers with plenty of equipment can afford to bid on such stock.

C. of C. Hears of Reclamation Meet

BURLEY, Oct. 17—Some encouragement for the proposed Northside Extension project was given the Burley delegation at the national reclamation meeting in Omaha last week. W. A. Sharr told the Chamber of Commerce here at a recent meeting.
