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



Donart Upholds CVA; Robins Fires at 'Boss'

Dr. C. A. Robins, Republican gubernatorial candidate, Thursday night attacked a man he said was "determined to be Idaho's political boss" but did not name him.

Robins in a press statement here said the unidentified political leader "takes his cue from the rule-ruler tactics of the big machine operators like Fendler and the Kelly-Nash crowd."

"The big machine," Robins said, "operates on the theory that the voter is not intelligent enough to know how to vote, that the people do not know what is good for them. An illustration of this is to be seen in the anxious advocacy of Idaho's boss of the proposed Columbia valley authority, which was repudiated by the Democrats in their state convention."

"We do not want big machine politics in Idaho," Robins said, "and we do not want a boss who would be boss by voting suddenly against his state's interests."

Despite the fact that the Republican gubernatorial candidate named Donart, Twin Falls political observers had no trouble identifying the man they felt certain Robins meant—U. S. Sen. Glen H. Taylor.

Clyde Mustrant, Flier, GOP county chairman, said more than 1,000 turned out for the Halloween dance sponsored by the Republicans at Radio Room, Jr. Robins, John Sanborn, Hagerman, congressional candidate, Lela A. Palmer, state senator, C. W. Collins, state representative, and Donald S. Whitehead, lieutenant governor candidate, were present.

They expressed confidence in GOP triumph in the coming election, but also said they were not sure of the result.

U. N. Confabs Aim for Bans On Atom Race

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 1 (AP)—A determined effort to head off an atomic arms race and slash military establishments, the world over appeared to be in the making today as United Nations delegates turned from strategy to committee discussions of the issue before them.

The temporary end of the formal session, however, did not mean that at least a few—found Russia and the United States competing for leadership in the disarmament undertaking.

American officials described the United States proposals for a supervising inspection system as a revolutionary idea that would result not only in a constant watch over atomic resources of all nations but also put an end to secret weapons of all kinds.

While the Soviet Union, which took the initiative in demanding arms cut, has consistently opposed inspection proposals as applied to atomic energy alone, there was some hope evident among the diplomats gathered here that a formula might be worked out which would be acceptable to both America and Russia and result in concrete proposals for bringing all types of armaments under strict control.

The arms cut program, demanding that the United States and Soviet Union agree to reduce their armaments by more than 50 percent, was moved into a new phase of assembly work, passing from general debate to consideration by committees.

Recent Rushing Ahead; OPA Gives Notice to Workers

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Price controls were lifted from nearly 100 more items today, as OPA took on the appearance of a skeleton left over from Halloween.

The new list included paper and wood matches, milking machines and other dairy equipment, some lighting fixtures, a few lumber items and a long line of industrial products.

It was issued as the price agency took sweeping action toward controlling inflation along with the national economy. Notice was served on approximately 10,000 OPA field workers—roughly one-third of the remaining staff—that their jobs will fold up in 30 days.

Even more immediately, OPA ordered its labor boards, 1,642 of them, locked up for good Monday.

Today's decontrol announcement said the latest list of articles was forced because their supply is in approximate balance with demand, or because they are unimportant in business or living costs.

Truckers' Strike Erased Quickly on Road Project

A union stoppage on the Filer-Twin Falls highway by what a union official described as an "unauthorized strike" ended abruptly Thursday when the Triangle Construction company obtained trucks from another firm to replace those used by contract haulers who left their jobs after demanding higher pay.

Richard Farnsworth, Twin Falls superintendent of the Boise firm, said that "all but one or two truckers are back to work Friday, and everything is running smoothly again."

He emphasized that "one or two ringleaders of the strike" would return to the job as contract haulers.

Fred Hoops of the Hoops Construction company said that five of his firm's trucks are still loaned to the Triangle firm for work on the road. Triangle Construction company employees are operating the loaned trucks, Farnsworth said.

The engineering superintendent pointed out that the striking truckers had signed a contract for the hauling of gravel at the stipulated rate and that "the strike was entirely unauthorized."

He said that "organized labor" had no part of the strike and that most of the striking truckers were "thru on the strike by one or two ringleaders."

Troy Sandau, one of the striking haulers, said that the contract truckers quit because the firm refused to raise their rates above six cents a ton-mile.

The men, who left their work on U. S. Highway 30 between Twin Falls and Filer, said they were trucking members of the Twin Falls Teamster's Union Local No. 483, according to the local's business agent, Frank Gledler, who termed the strike "unauthorized."

Gledler hurried to the scene of the conflict but did not intervene in an "official" capacity, he said.

At six cents a ton-mile a truck driver can gross \$18 a day hauling gravel to where tarvia is being laid four miles from the old rock crushing plant. The haulers' skids of Twin Falls where Triangle headquarters are now located.

Gledler said that the truck drivers are now working at six cents a ton-mile, which he said is the rate for the haulers.

Work on the highway was held up for only an hour.

treasurer, and Eugene M. Sereley, county attorney.

Dr. Robins said: "My attention has been directed to a continued distortion of a statement made by me at Donnell's earlier in the campaign, at which time I stated that we had some 1,100 federal agencies, bureaus, facilities, engaged in attempting to order the lives and the business of the American people. The point I drove home was to the effect that it was evident that there was in this great number of government agencies a great overlapping and duplication."

"As an illustration of this fact, I made the statement that there were some 93 federal agencies engaged in lending public money, which is after all—the taxpayer's money. I did not raise any objection to any particular phase of public lending, but did call attention to the fact that this duplication and overlapping was one of the faults of a bureaucratic type of government," he said.

"The state chairman of the opposition, in commenting on this release, saw fit to put words into my mouth which I did not utter; namely, that I was opposed to the lending agencies, which have been of so much help to the farmers and the stockmen. Later the opposition saw fit to continue this distortion by publishing a full-page spread in one of the papers naming these agencies to which they claimed I was opposed, and again misquoting me."

"To my mind the only meritorious lending agencies we have had were those which have enabled agriculture and the livestock business and other allied businesses to continue their operations."

"I have not found it necessary, nor do I think it honorable, to practice the sort of distortion and deception which has been used as a weapon against me."

Confidence Vote Given Galloway At Convention

MALAD CITY, Nov. 1 (AP)—Idaho department commander William F. Galloway continued his ecological campaign against communism last night, at the Legion's sixth district convention during which Galloway was given a vote of confidence after a demand for his resignation had been made.

The resignation call came from Dan Pullos, Pocatello, who did so at a business session in a motion which would have required Galloway to explain statements made in other district conventions in the past few days.

Dave Bush, Uble, former Democratic state chairman, also joined in the demand for the explanation. The motion was lost, first on a vote and later on a roll call vote of 70 to 8. Douglas Dean, Twin Falls, department publicity director, reported.

Following the business session, Galloway repeated the address made at conventions at Meridian, Jerome and Twin Falls in which he attacked "communism and their fellow-travelers" as "threatening to strike a real blow in this Idaho election."

Galloway did not mention by name Pete Leguineche, Democratic nominee for second district congressman. The address included remarks about a 20-year-old non-veteran candidate.

Another speaker, Alfred W. Shepherd, Paris, a member of the national and Idaho Americanism

Russia Aware Of Enemies in Allied Circles

MOSCOW, Nov. 1 (AP)—Russia is aware that she has enemies not only in many parts of the world but also in certain circles in countries which were her wartime allies.

Russians consider existence of these enemies, some of whom are highly articulate as well as in position to influence their compatriots and also the policies of their country, a constant danger.

Hate expressed in the United States, and heard many persons who for one reason or another expressed outright hate of the USSR.

They were people—and not a few of them—who declared that America, now in possession of atomic bombs, should go ahead and use them on Russia.

And if anyone thinks that the Soviet press, in its criticisms of the United States, keeps up a constant barrage, he need only look at part of the American press.

Russians are not fools, far from it. And they know and realize that foreign reaction for they have their official channels through which they can get the word.

It is not in the Soviet embassy in Washington one day not so long ago and had a serious young official look at me across the desk.

"To read your paper," he said, "and I mean some of them published in Washington, I sometimes have to punch myself and talk to myself."

"The way they go after us Russians sometimes makes us here feel like hunted animals."

Sharp said Taylor made a speech at Piler wherein he said, "I'll put Henry Ford out driving tractors, instead of making them." If a Taylor-backed state is sent to Congress, Taylor applies to be the political boss of the Democratic party in Idaho," Sharp said in an interview here.

"The assembled teachers (approximately 60) were 'interested' in probably report figures which show that the average farm laborer in Idaho draws \$177 monthly wages while teachers are paid only an average of \$158.44. Kent reported.

Several days before the meeting it was reported by a number of in-

structors—but never confirmed by IEA chapter officials—that the faculty planned to ask an immediate pay raise or bonus to meet the increased cost of living.
