Jap Thinking Hides Opinion Of Democracy

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5 (AP)—What the Japanese really think about their new constitution is far from clear.

Many welcome it as a charter for a democratic future. Some have their doubts. Others go on talking much the same as before.

Public Doubter
Only public doubter thus far is the aged Yukio Ozaki, member of every Japanese parliament since 1890. He predicts it will take three generations to educate the Japanese away from their violent political traditions to the point where their new democratic charter can work.

He warns that "murder and falsehood" stand in the way. By murder, he means the old Japanese custom of political assassination. By falsehood, he presumably refers to any other old custom of treating the truth with casual violence at times.

Kills Democracy
The new constitution strips the emperor of his divine status and makes him a symbol of Japanese unity. A crowd of 200,000 Japanese gathered to pay its respect to the emperor when he promulgated the new charter. What was in their minds?

A "prejudicial opinion," a member of Tokyo Japanese was expressed by President Shigeru Nomura of Tokyo Imperial university.

The new constitution, he said, "establishes an immovable foundation for a new tenet (temperament) system."

The interesting word here is "tenet." A Japanese expression meaning "heavenly unit" and often translated as "son of heaven."

Holcomb's suit stated there was an oral lease, and he seeks treble damages on \$5 per day for each day of illegal possession, plus costs. James H. Bothwell is Holcomb's attorney.

Alleging \$311.20 remains due on a \$500 promissory note issued Feb. 23, 1945, the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company filed suit for collection, interest and costs against Ogle Horton, Ray D. Ape is attorney for the plaintiff.

Sift flour before measuring. Use level measurements for all ingredients.

Have all ingredients at room temperature (about 70°). Preheat oven to baking temperature, 325°, a slow-moderate oven.

Grease and flour a square baking pan, 8 x 8 x 2 inches. Sift together into a mixing bowl—
