

\$1,250,000 County Hospital Wins 350 Votes Margin

The new Twin Falls county general hospital is a certainty today. Casting 353 votes to spare above the required two-thirds majority, county taxpayers at the polls Tuesday answered a decisive "Yes" to the question of whether they would authorize the \$1,250,000 bond issue to finance a modern and adequate 165-bed hospital.

Today the complete unofficial but reliable vote, as gathered by the Times-News from officials in 38 precincts, showed 5,805 ballots in favor of the proposal to 2,373 against, for a total of 8,178 votes.

The board of county commissioners, in a special session this afternoon to start canvassing results of both the hospital bond vote and the election.

Success of the bond issue voting eliminates efforts spanning a period of years by civic-minded county residents to eliminate the spectre of inadequate hospitalization which became increasingly obvious with expansion of the county's population.

The outcome justifies the faith placed in taxpayers by the county's leaders of religious, agricultural, business and professional "citizens" groups who appealed for passage of the bond issue on a humanitarian basis.

Asked for a comment on outcome of the bond election, T. C. Bacon, Twin Falls, newly-elected chairman of the non-partisan hospital board, said Wednesday:

Doctors Plan Office, Clinic Building Here

Plans for the erection of a new medical office building with space available for several emergency hospital beds were announced Tuesday by Dr. Malcolm Sawyer and Dr. Harold L. Stone. The building will be erected at the corner of Locust street and Addison avenue near three hospital buildings being moved to Twin Falls from the Hunt relocation camp.

Dr. Sawyer said that work was being done on the building to move the buildings to Twin Falls and establish the construction program by the first of the year.

The one-story frame building will contain offices for Dr. Sawyer, Dr. Stone, a large reception room, a waiting room, a minor surgical room and a room for a "few emergency hospital beds," Dr. Sawyer said.

Dr. Stone said that one of the wings of the Hunt hospital, the surgery room and the out-patient department, were being moved to the new building. It will be a L-shaped edifice with one wing 120 feet long and the other 120 or 130 feet long. The wings will be 30 feet wide. Entrance for the structure will be on Addison avenue.

Dr. Sawyer said that the emergency hospital building will be ready for occupancy by the first of the year.

Incumbent Democrats Swept From Office; White in Tight Northern Battle

SPOKANE, Nov. 6 (AP)—Rep. Compton I. White, Democrat, today conceded the election of Abe McGregor Goff, Republican of Moscow, to his seat in the house of representatives. White has served in the national capital since 1932.

BOISE, Nov. 6 (AP)—Riding the crest of the national tide, Idaho Republican candidates for U. S. senator, second district congressman, governor and seven other state offices surged to victory yesterday. The triumph unfolded an incumbent Democratic state officials.

The GOP swept plunged Democratic Rep. Compton I. White into an apparently losing see-saw battle in his try for an eighth consecutive term as first district (north Idaho) congressman. The 69-year-old congressional veteran through the night was locked in fierce combat with Abe McGregor Goff, 46-year-old Moscow attorney discharged recently as an army colonel. However, Goff pulled ahead early today when his home Latah county reported him at 1,010 votes over White. Unofficial tabulation from 341 of the 395 precincts in the first district gave White 33,991 and Goff 35,402.

Rep. Henry C. Dworshak in his successful campaign for a two year term as U. S. senator led the Republican ticket to a resounding victory in every sector. The husky statesman piled up more than a 22,000 vote lead over George E. Donart, Weiser attorney ardently supported by Sen. Glen H. Taylor, D., Ida.

Dworshak was opposed by the Idaho American Federation of Labor who endorsed Donart. Dworshak, 69-year-old Hagerman lawyer-agriculturist, rocketed to victory in the contest after a long fight. He defeated the chief attorney for Dworshak's race in the house of representatives, Senator Charles C. Gossett who was defeated in the Democratic primary.

House, Senate Fall to GOP in Heavy Protest Vote in Nation

Republicans, with a comeback of landslide proportions, and the house of representatives within their grasp today reached for control of the senate as well.

Riding a tide of protest votes from citizens who gave evidence of having "had enough" of Democratic idleness, the GOP swept to its first major victory since it lost power in the depression days of the early 30s.

A thundering tide of votes poured through New England, lapped at the borders of Dixie and surged on to the west coast to turn up these results of Tuesday's balloting.

In 65 counties remaining to be settled, the Republicans needed only to maintain their gains to have the 218 majority necessary to gain organization of the house of the 80th congress.

Amendments Pass, "Vice" Issues Beaten

BOISE, Nov. 6 (AP)—Initiative measures proposing to outlaw slot machines, permit local county option liquor prohibition across and restrict possession of liquor were defeated in yesterday's general election.

However, four constitutional amendments appeared to have been approved by voters. Two of the amendments would transfer the prison pardoning and parole authority from executive officials to a nonpartisan board created by the legislature.

The other amendments provide an increase in legislators' pay from \$5 daily at present to \$10 when in session and permit the investment of permanent endowment funds in state bonds.

All the amendments were piling up more than a 1,000 vote lead of approval on the basis of incomplete returns. To assure adoption, an amendment must receive only a majority of the votes cast for the proposition.

The initiative measures to have passed would have required the approval of a majority of the voters cast for a proposition—in this election something in excess of 150,000 probably. However, the initiative measures received only a fraction of the vote cast for governor.

Even so, negative votes cast against the initiative measures indicated affirmative vote by wide margins.

The initiative measures were sponsored by the Idaho Allied Civic Forces, a group comprised chiefly of church organizations. Opponents of the measures included the war veterans organizations.

Surging along with the state and national Republican sweep, Twin Falls county voters yesterday eliminated the last Democratic county officeholder by approving a complete Republican slate.

Brooks R. Rayborn, 26-year-old Pacific war veteran who came back from Japanese prison camps, defeated incumbent Sheriff Warren W. Lowery, Democrat, in the feature race on the county slate.

On the basis of complete unofficial returns today, Lowery won only three precincts although he led the entire Democratic ticket from top to bottom.

Rayborn was swept to victory in the Republican landslide and not

Climax Nears In Battle for Trioste Port

NEW YORK, Nov. 6 (AP)—A showdown fight between the United States and Russia over control of the key Adriatic port of Trieste appeared to be developing rapidly today as Yugoslav and Italy sides of the Trieste fight—the big four foreign ministers council here.

Yugoslavia, is driving for domination of the port while the United States, with Britain and other western powers, insists on a strong United Nations involvement.

One phase of the row grew so sharp last night that Foreign Minister Molotov of Russia accused Secretary of State Byrnes of trying to deliver an ultimatum to the council to force it to take an action considered unfavorable to Yugoslavia.

Byrnes struck back with pointed dig at Molotov's constant insistence on his own views.

Following this brief flare-up, however, the two men joined in reaffirmations after agreeing with Foreign Secretary Bevin and British Deputy Minister Cleeve de Merville of France to meet again today and continue in session until both Yugoslavia and Italy had been heard.

In one line after another Molotov showed up on the minority side of stalemate issues in the projected Italian peace treaty—backroom deal of the Trieste fight—but the big four must be unanimous before any agreement can be voted.

In the United Nations, however, where majority votes can force a conclusion, the steering committee of the assembly today rejected a Soviet proposal to consider the possibility of moving the United Nations headquarters to Europe permanently instead of keeping it in America.





Double duty appeal of new furniture stems from ingenious designs which make every cranny of limited living space count.

Multiple-purpose and interchangeable furniture units developed by one company are so easy to add to or take from as a baby's house of blocks. Units include many finished cases of five different sizes, of varying width and depth, shelves, legs, bases and cabinet doors. With these a housewife can, using a penny of all things, for lightening connector rods—secure anything from a bedside table to a giant breakfast table.

Plastic plugs cap holes on top and bottom and at sides of each unit. Unplugged holes serve as entry points for metallic connector rods which attach units together or cords which lead out from cleverly concealed electric fixtures.

If one needs change, units can be disconnected and rearranged, multiplied or subtracted or switched to new uses as easily as a child's

BUCKY HARRIS NAMED MANAGER OF YANKEE CLUB

Former Pilot Of Nats Signs For 2 Years

NEW YORK, Nov. 6 (AP)—Stanley (Bucky) Harris, co-pilot to president Larry MacPhail's financial bid Tuesday and signed a two-year contract to manage the New York Yankees at a reported \$36,000 yearly salary with Chick Donnelly, late of Brooklyn, as his head coach.

"This was the 'boy wonder' of 1934 who won a first pennant in 1934 and won the Washington series for the Yankees in 1935. He was a skipper and a complete outburst from his earlier announced position that he was not interested in becoming a field manager."

MacPhail had not been made until a few days ago, the story had leaked out and was common knowledge at the time of the official report.

In his first statement as 14th Yankee manager, Harris, late of Brooklyn, said he would select each coach at a later date from several applicants.

"Johnny requires that each coach under Joe McCarthy," he said, "must be a winner. I have many plans for improving the ball club with new players."

The new boss admitted he was interested in making a deal for a first baseman, outfielder and pitcher but backed up President MacPhail's statement that he had no thoughts of trading Joe DiMaggio.

DiMaggio will play center field for the Yankees, Harris, announced. "You can be sure we will make deals only, and you can understand only, when we believe they will be for the benefit of the Yankees."

MacPhail who had walked into the clubhouse, said Harris and Donnelly to announce the news, added "we have had no talks with the Red Sox about Ted Williams or any other player."






