No, President Truman Will Not Resign to Allow Full GOP Grip

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—President Truman is not going to resign and has not even seriously considered the possibility. This can be reported today without qualification.

The suggestion that Mr. Truman appoint a Republican secretary of state and resign to permit the GOP to take over the presidency came from several sources, D. A. H. It was echoed in some newspapers, normally Democratic, but Representative Stephen D. Allen, who asserted that such a step was "not the thing to do."

The attitude around the White House today was that the sugges-

tion should not be identified by comment either from the President or any member of his staff.

It was known that Mr. Truman himself felt that to resign now after the Democratic crushing election defeat would be to pull out on the job.

Moreover, the President is known to believe that he should not change the American constitutional system by such a move.

Some political observers also are strongly of the opinion that the Republicans themselves would not want a Democrat to choose a President for them. Such would be the case if Mr. Truman followed the course suggested.

There also was a question as to

whether the President might submit a resignation even if he had such a thought in mind.

Persons in a position to know said there had been "very little discussion" around the White House about the future course of the administration.

Mr. Truman came back from voting in Missouri with a head cold. He spent most of yesterday resting and extended all engagements to the day after tomorrow, said a Foreign Minister in Washington.

There seemed little prospect of any direct statement by the President until next week on either Fullbright's suggestion or the full cabinet's reaction to the election outcome.

Gibbs was driving a 1937 world-over model, and hence number has been phoned to peace officers throughout Idaho. Both cars are described in stocks, and are age 20 to 25.

World Bank's Leader Flays U. S. Strikes

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 (AP)—Eugene Meyer, president of the world bank

said today that strikes in this country are threatening the world with economic starvation and thereby endangering the peace.

Meyer called present American labor relations "antagonistic" and urged the reconstruction finance corporation use Republican administration and rejected no publisher of the Washington Post last June to accept the bank's presidency.

Loans Cited

Citing mining and factory production loans from strikes this year and stressing the potential effect of "a fresh stoppage of work threatened in the coal mines," Meyer asserted in a speech prepared for the annual meeting of the Academy of Political Science.

"The importance of continuous fuel production for our own welfare and for that of mankind is too obvious to need to be exaggerated."

"We Americans who but recently abandoned our sympathy for the people of the world by sharing the products of our fields must now come aware that this economic starvation threatens the winning the peace."

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Decontrol Plans Not Slowed by Landslide

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—A top government official

said today there was no slackening of price and wage decontrol in the wake of the administration's election defeat. Even as OPA posted higher prices for many infants' and children's cotton garments and some other clothing items, this official told a reporter "the chances are better than 50-50" that price controls on all wearing apparel and textiles will be removed "very soon."

The official said he was not aware of any change in the administration's master decontrol list is announced, possibly this weekend. Elimination of price ceilings on clothing and textiles automatically would free these industries of wage controls.

"Both price and wage decontrol will continue to be speeded up along the line as outlined by President Truman when he announced the end of most ceilings," a high official said.

He added that heads of government agencies concerned have been holding conferences to determine whether such items as automobiles, building materials, steel and other metals should be freed of controls at this time.

"We must have to keep controls on these fields for a while, but the whole matter still is wide open," the official said. "It would be difficult to hold prices there while virtually everything else is decontrolled."

The official added that much consideration is being given to contractors' contentions that the veterans' housing program would be more difficult to administer if building materials were decontrolled. Housing administrator Wilson Wyatt has opposed removing these ceilings.

Tied to the forthcoming announcement of OPA's decontrol list will be the administration's decision on what to do about the wage stabilization board.

The future of this panel has been in doubt since industry members of the board submitted their resignations early in October. Labor and public members stayed on, but there have been demands by both business and union leaders that the board be scrapped.

Oversights Slow Canvass of Votes

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 7 (AP)—County commissioners

are continuing their canvass today of returns of Tuesday's general election and special hospital bond election, but official results are being delayed by numerous discrepancies uncovered in the balloting records.

Chief obstacle to a speedy canvass is the fact that a number of election officials failed to complete the tally books. In some cases the tally books were not filled in; while in others the totals were filled in but did not tally with the actual vote.

Some boards filled in the totals, but did not indicate the totals. Such instances are being referred back to the election boards for correction of these errors.

Early Budget Cut Forecast by Taft

CHICAGO, Nov. 7 (AP)—Sen. Robert

A. Taft, R. O., today predicted a budget of \$25,000,000,000 to \$30,000,000,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1 as the result of the election of a Republican congress.

President Truman set a revised 1947 fiscal budget figure at \$41,500,000,000 which was an increase over the previous January estimate. The estimated total budget for the 1946-47 fiscal year was \$38,000,000,000.

Taft said "We must balance the federal budget in 1947. If it is not, we are paying off the national debt too fast."

"If the federal budget is not balanced, we are paying off the national debt too fast," Taft said.

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President Truman Brought By Democrat Loss

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—President Truman, his administration rebuked at the polls,

faced with outward calm today the political decisions which could alter the course of American and world events.

Mr. Truman apparently must decide: 1. Whether he shall compromise with the Republican dominated congress on controversial domestic and foreign issues, or challenge it and fight back with Democratic-supported vetoes.

2. Whether he shall attempt to lead his own party back toward the more conservative line that appeared to be popular with Tuesday's sweeping GOP victories, or steer it even more forcefully toward the opposite of center.

3. Whether he shall attempt to rally dispersed Democratic forces around himself as a candidate for reelection in 1948 or prepare to step aside then for some other nominee.

Mr. Truman gave no indication that he is considering with any seriousness the over-cropping of suggestions that he should resign. The constitution permits that he should resign.

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U. S. Retains Large Rights Over Islands

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 7 (AP)—The United States will retain

today that she would reserve sweeping rights, especially military, in the Hawaiian Islands, mandated islands which President Truman offered last night to place under United States trusteeship.

One delegate, who did not want to be identified, said the military rights demanded by the United States were exactly the same as she would have if she annexed the islands outright.

U. S. Terms for turning the islands—the Marshalls, Carolines and Marianas—over to U. S. are contained in a draft agreement now being circulated among the 11 member states of the security council and two other nations, New Zealand and the Philippines.

Disclosure of the terms gave rise to speculation that it would also almost certainly attack the proposals and might publicly threaten to withdraw from the treaty.

However, the islands would continue in their present status as occupied enemy territory.

Play Close Islands

The draft agreement not only reverts the islands to the United States, but also grants the United States the right to establish military, naval and air bases within the territory, but provides that any of the area may be declared closed for security reasons.

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Late Election Returns Reveal That Senator Taylor Struck Most Damaging Blow for Demos

BOISE, Nov. 7 (AP)—Continuing

returns from remaining scattered precincts in Idaho's election proved conclusively today that the most telling blow struck by the Democrats on Tuesday resulted in a fractured law for Ray McKelvin, Idaho Republican leader.

With Republican victories assured by comfortable margins in all national and state offices, there was apparently no chance for further changes in the results as new returns came in.

In contrast, there was every reason to believe the full-toss election on Tuesday between McKelvin and U. S. Sen. Glen H. Taylor, D. Ida., would continue to be talked about for days to come.

McKelvin's defeat, revealed yesterday that the 66-year-old Idaho Orange legislative chairman had suffered a fracture.

Taylor, who took a leading part in the Democratic campaign, predicted a Republican legislature for next session.

The late vote cast was expected to be under 176,000, compared with 144,000 cast for governor in 1944, the last non-preferential election, and 388,859 for governor in 1944.

Despite failure of the turnout to reach the 200,000 predicted, the Republican landslide in some cases gave OPA candidates a greater majority than in the last election.

In the 1932 Democratic landslide, James P. Pope, successful Democratic candidate, won by 24,955 votes over the late John Thomas, whose unexpired term Dworsnik will fill.

Last Race in Vote Awaiting Six Precincts

BAIT LAKE CITY, Nov. 7 (AP)—The outcome of the only major congressional contest still undecided in Utah and the nation today hinges on the six yet unreported vote in six remote districts in Utah's hinterlands, and may be forced to await the official county canvases next Monday.

With 500 of 500 precincts now reported, unofficial tabulations show that veteran Democratic Rep. Walter K. Granger is trailing the Republican aspirant, David J. Wilson, by only six votes in the race for first district congressman.

The count was Granger 44,722, Wilson 44,728.

Granger held the post two years ago with 56 per cent of the vote and won it four years ago by a narrow 100 vote margin.

While the small number of votes expected from the six as yet unreported districts possibly could change the picture, most observers were of the opinion that final tabulations would only increase Wilson's narrow lead. The unreported districts are isolated rural areas and Utah's farmers traditionally vote Republican.

Judge Delays Broadhurst's Will Hearing

CALDWELL, Nov. 7 (AP)—Further delay in the complicated case of Mrs. Gladys Elaine Broadhurst, pregnant wife of slain W. D. Broadhurst and charged with his murder, was indicated today when Probate Judge R. P. Houston announced continuation of a hearing on the dead rancher's will for 40 days.

Mrs. Broadhurst, 40-year-old widow who with her chauffeur, Alvin Lee Williams, 23, is charged with first degree murder, was left the entire estate valued at \$100,000.

The will is contested by Broadhurst's three sisters. Their attorney, Elbert S. Delano of Boise, and Cleve Groome of Caldwell, both requested continuance of the hearing.

Broadhurst, 51, was slugged and shot Oct. 14, about three weeks after the will was drawn and about two weeks before it was filed. He was en route from his dairy farm here to his Jordan valley, Ore., ranch when killed.

Williams is held at Vale, Ore., where the charges were filed against him and Mrs. Broadhurst. She is fighting extradition.

At Ontario, Ore., District Attorney E. Otis Smith said Williams admitted he killed Broadhurst.

Rest of World Watches U. S. Vote Results

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7 (AP)—Beldom if ever has the world watched with such great interest an off-year election in the United States. The usual old-world bewilderment about American elections and balances is discussed by British newspapers with complicated explanations flavored with criticism that the system really is outmoded.

Skeptical Shown
The usual skepticism abroad about the American two-party system is typified by a Rome newspaper headline:

"Donkeys and elephants to govern the United States."

That relatively new element in the American political scene—a bipartisan foreign policy—draws attention from a Soviet writer: the difference between them never so insignificant as now. The tendency... in the sphere of United States foreign policy amounts to a firm position toward the Soviet Union.

Isolation Dead
The German press predicts that no matter how the election turns out, American isolationism is dead.

So the American world is to be now—just as at our isolationism is affected by the election.

Russia is apprehensive of increased American opposition to Soviet desires in that "firm" American foreign policy.

In-between countries like Germany are interested because of the nature of things more or less. Soviet-American tension will affect them.

5 U. of I. Experts To Meet on Soils

Five University of Idaho specialists will conduct a meeting here Nov. 14 in an attempt to coordinate efforts of fertilizer dealers, the soil conservation service, AAA and Smith-Hughes teachers in their service to Idaho farmers. County Agent Jack P. Smith said Wednesday. The all-day session will begin at 9:30 a. m. at the Idaho Power auditorium.

Valere Smith, extension soils specialist and brother of the Twin Falls county agent, will be chairman of the meeting. Other specialists who will attend are G. O. Baker, soil technologist; J. R. Robinson, potato specialist; Left Vernon, head of the university's department of horticulture; and Anton S. Horn, extension horticulturist. Each will discuss the problems of commercial fertilizers in relation to his department.

Topics range through terminology and availability of the fertilizers, methods and time for fertilizing, and the fertilizing of individual crops of fruits and vegetables common to Idaho. Vance Smith will discuss the fertilizer elements and their functions and the evaluation of tests to determine soil fertility.

Garage Set for Remodeling Into Living Quarters

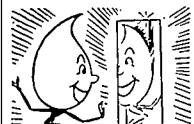

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Writer Finds Travel Hurts Hair, Weight

NEW YORK, Nov. 7 (AP)—Everybody who takes a trip abroad, brings forth a baby, writes a book or crawls safely out of a train wreck, asks himself:
"What did I gain from this experience?"
So do any other tourist—for foreign correspondents, however they may dislike to think so, are hardly just long-term tourists on an expense account—I took out my battered notebook to thumb back and see what four years of war and peace overseas had taught me.

The Statistics
The notebook had a few statistics: Since leaving Mayor LaGuardia's bullwhip (it was then), I had gone around the world by 1960 who won't have?—and traveled about 102,000 miles. Some 50,000 were by jeep, 50,000 in 16 different types of aircraft, and 2,000 on my own business and assorted excursions, burros and one fire-ravaged camel that spent 20 years leaping the long way around a pyramid.
I had visited 50 countries and six continents. That's a lot of moving for a fellow who used to argue with his wife over who would walk down to the corner about to buy the first edition.

Fond Memories
The notebook held many memories. I had helped cover a world war, climbed the Eiffel tower suicide-handed and spent a nice afternoon conversing with a young lady in Bali who never saw a three-base hit or a brawler.
I saw a lot of battles, a few riots, a couple of revolutions, and many bread and rice lines. I talked to several thousand people, from General Eisenhower—he said, "hello"—to a Bombay fakir who could tie himself into a knot, but didn't cry here. And what did it all do to "me" that was?
Gained, Lost
Well, travel is still broadening, so I beamed up ten pounds, however another chin and lost enough hair to make me a first cousin to a cue ball. And I learned a lot of odd and useless things, such as:
That the blind hand in all parts of the world is giving way to the greened palm.
That foolholes make more friends than cocktail parties.
That Calcutta hotels have more rats than guests and more servants than either.
