Board to Check at Hospital

Revealing a "first things first" attitude, the newly-formed 15-member hospital board appointed a five-person administrative committee to investigate the present Twin Falls county general hospital, and take the first step toward appointing a permanent manager.

County Commissioner DONALD H. Young, president of the board, announced the appointment of a permanent hospital manager because he thinks "some money could be saved if this were done."

The projected cost of \$1,250,000 for a new hospital was not mentioned after the board's formation, but Young indicated that it "will be at least six months" before building materials can be secured. He said County Attorney E. M. Sharpe has agreed that it will probably take "one and one-half to two years" to build.

Maintaining that the hospital "is not in the hands of a single man," Young said the board will now move on at least four persons.

He said the individuals as Dr. J. H. Morgan, Twin Falls county physician and active manager of the hospital, Mayor C. E. Young, County Commissioner Young, County Attorney E. M. Sharpe, and the district attorney.

The administrative committee appointed included hospital board members Fred Bond and Mr. Young, Dr. Morgan, County Attorney E. M. Sharpe, and County Commissioner Young. The committee will investigate the present hospital, and take the first step toward appointing a permanent manager.

Taylor's nose was fractured, and his eye was blacked. He was taken to the hospital, and he is now in bed.

Taxpayer Benefits in Battle of Budget at Capitol

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—A new budget bill introduced today with a pretty good chance that the first lot of all will be that Congress will cut some strings of government, ending the system of blank check appropriations which it willingly adopted during the Roosevelt administration. The plan is to make Congress rather than the President primarily responsible for scheduling government revenues and expenditures.

The best answer may be in a section of the legislative reorganization act of 1946, better known as the act to streamline Congress.

It reduced the number of committees in both the house and senate, thereby reducing the number of subcommittees. 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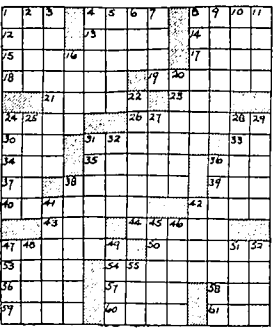

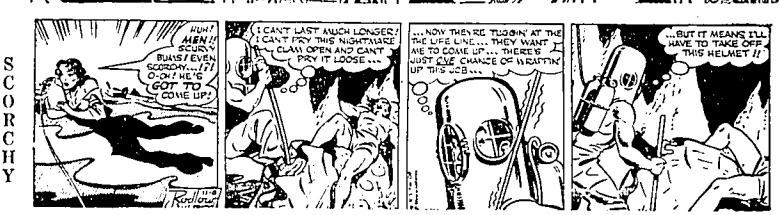
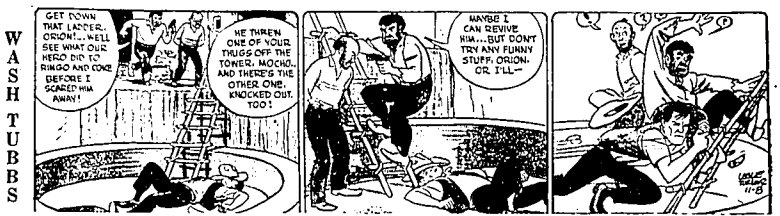
