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Colorado Hit By Big Storm; Roads Closed

DENVER, Nov. 9 (AP) — Another November snowstorm lashed Colorado today, blocking many highways and boosting the snow depth to 12 inches in some places. The storm hit the state tonight on Nebraska and Kansas.

New snow piled on top of last week's drifts also took a toll of livestock. From the southeastern part of the state came reports that stock losses resulted because of drifts which blocked feeding operations. Sheep suffocated as they piled on top of each other in fence corners.

Travel Hazardous

Some bus travel was resumed after noon, but the highway patrol warned motorists to avoid all but absolutely essential travel — and then only with chains. Windshield wipers were used rapidly. Gale conditions presented an added hazard.

Trains were operating, but some, including the streamliners, pulled into Denver late.

No airplanes stopped in Wyoming or Colorado or took off from the airports in those states.

Temperatures over the area ranged during the day from 10 at Casper, Wyo., to 23 at Grand Junction on Colorado's western slope which had an inch of snow.

The weather bureau predicted a sharp drop in temperatures as the storm broke, probably before tomorrow's dawn. Losses of 10 to 20 degrees were forecast for Colorado.

The storm imposed fresh burdens on highway department maintenance crews who have been battling drifts for 24 and 48-hour shifts. Highway Engineer Mark J. Waterson said 300 snowplows have been in continuous operation, some of them rotary outfits moved from their usual mountain pass stations to the eastern plains.

The 12 Colorado storm deaths were due to exposure, traffic accidents and heart attacks brought on by over-exposure in the snow.

Georgia Raps Bund Deal of Ku Klux Klan

ATLANTA, Nov. 9.—The state of Georgia charged the Ku Klux Klan today with attempting a 1940 merger with the German-American Bund, and accused the hooded order even now of seeking to weld ultra-nationalist veterans groups and anti-Semitic, anti-Negro, fanatics.

Assistant Attorney General David Duke, designated by Gov. Ellis to prosecute the Klan, filed the charges in Fulton (Atlanta) superior court as amendment to an earlier suit to restrain the Klan's activities. A hearing on demurrers to the original petition is due Nov. 25.

The amended petition was introduced coincident with state litigation to revoke the charter of a new anti-Negro, Anti-Jewish organization called "Columbians, Inc."

In 1940, certain local Klans on the eastern seaboard made "A definite, planned effort" to combine the Klan and the German-American Bund into one racially-supremacist "All-Aryan" organization and under took joint operations to harass Jewish, Catholic and Negro-owned businesses.

Activities planned were executed by the order (Klan) in collaboration with racially bigoted and anti-Semitic organizations. The petition also charges that the state seeks charter revocation on grounds that the Klan "systematically is carrying out its activities designed to violate the rights of Georgia citizens guaranteed under the constitution of the state and of the United States."

Published in printed form for the first time in fully a decade and a half, the Twin Falls high school "Bruin" was distributed Friday afternoon. The student newspaper was formerly in mimeographed form.

The four-page printed paper presents a fairly balanced appearance with a front page picture and an attractive masthead. Departmental features include sports, "As I See It" which is an interesting reporter feature, "Pads 'n' Fashion" and "All the Cats Join In."

The sports department includes "Player of the Week" for both varsity and junior varsity.

Journal Dwyer is editor-in-chief and Laurene Nielson managing editor. L. J. Schreyer is faculty advisor. The printed "Bruin" is published bi-monthly by the Journalism class. It is printed by the commercial department of the Times-News.

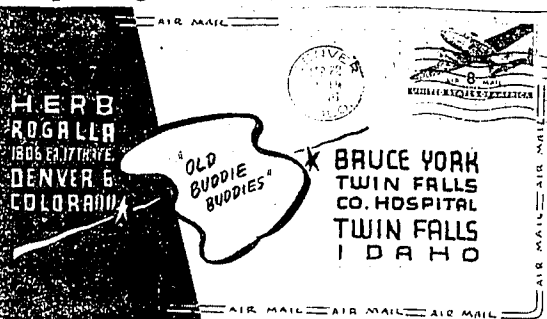

The purpose of the meeting is to organize an Amvet post here for the county.

Amvets is a national organization, exclusive for the veterans of this war. If enough interest is shown here, application for charter will be made to Washington and temporary officers selected, according to Cole.

Amvets have been active in the following legislation: Care for amputees, terminal leave for the disabled men, Wyatts federal housing program, clean-up of the "caste system" in the service, investigation

Magic Valley veterans who have not designated beneficiaries for their national service life insurance were urged by W. C. (Jack) Stutzman, contact representative, to do so immediately.

He pointed out that the new insurance act has changed the situation regarding beneficiaries and the old provision for an automatic order of succession in the event no beneficiary was designated, is no longer in effect.

If the insured is not survived by a designated beneficiary the proceeds of his insurance now goes to his estate. Stutzman said. He pointed out that in such case the person for whom the insured intended may never receive the benefits and in only case the veteran who does not designate beneficiaries may expose his dependents to the risk of delay and unnecessary collection expense.
