

Vets Trailers Will Receive Winter 'Coat'

Skirts of tarpaper to ward off wintry blasts will be tacked on all 42 trailers at the American Legion's veterans' housing project, the post housing committee decided Tuesday.

A resolution to move parents with one or two children from trailers to the nearby apartments before winter sets in is earnestly being pushed by the post, according to U. N. Terry, acting chairman during the absence of Carl Hittche.

Legion directors heard William R. Meyer's report on his work as county service officer.

Robert Kazmayer, writer and commentator on current events, will discuss "The New International Frontier for Americans" at 8 p. m. Thursday at the high school auditorium. Kazmayer's program is the third of the winter Town Hall series.

Although still in his 30s, he has gained a national reputation as a news analyst, speaker and author of the duties and opportunities that confront the United States. He has traveled widely in the far east, Europe and Russia in recent years. He worked in the Auto automobile factory in Russia when the first five year plan was inaugurated. Kazmayer is the author of "Out of the Clouds, a Realistic Approach to the 'New World'" and is now preparing a book on the United States' merchant marine.

Kazmayer first worked his way around the world as a seaman on tramp steamers and during the war traveled extensively in South and Central America. During the past summer he lectured in Germany and England.

U.S. Appears Tied up With Midget Fears

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 (AP)—America, to one returning after several years abroad, seems like a giant crippled by midget fears.

Or, perhaps, like a schizophrenic man in a field of mice, brooding over which one may grow up and give him trouble.

The national temper, bold, resourceful and aggressive under the strain of war, appears to me to have deteriorated under the friction of victory and uneasy peace.

Balance Lacking
There is lacking above all—balance, the long view and confident faith in the immediate future, a future better than the people of any other country can ever dream of.

You get a feeling of widespread disillusion and personal insecurity, both largely unreasoned and baseless. These are the most striking things just back from other lands where America is still regarded by the common people as the beacon light to a secure world.

As one observer told me in Switzerland: "You people appear to have no real idea of your power and prestige at this moment. Nothing is impossible for the United States now."

He was speaking less of America's economic might than of the impact of its moral prestige in assuring permanent world order—a prestige created by the force of its arms in war and enlarged since by its huge gifts of food and clothing to distressed countries.

Far-seeing Worry
There is, however, a real worry abroad that the United States, beset by internal problems, will again retire into its isolationist shell and forego further adventures in international political and financial philanthropy.

Coming home, one is amazed at the extent of the change in the American intellectual climate. Hope has been replaced by an unhappy, doubting distrust.

"I'm doing all right now," many friends have told me, "but I don't know what lies ahead."

This bothers them so much they don't enjoy the tobacco vices they couldn't even afford to smoke five years ago.

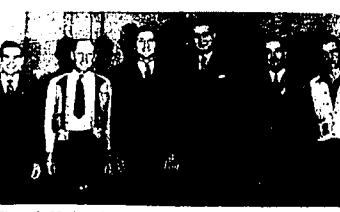

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Estate Names Brought Feud Won by FDR

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Nov. 12 (AP)—His bitter feud with President Roosevelt which led to voluntary exile was explained here by Howard Spencer as a "family" contest over the name of the estate, Krum Elbow.

Spencer, just returned from the Bahamas where he established a residence, said he and the late Mr. Roosevelt were distant cousins who lived on nearby estates on the Hudson river, in New York.

Spencer declared that his estate had been named by Hendrick Hudson in 1609, but that Mr. Roosevelt wanted the name, Krum Elbow, for his own estate. When he refused to give up the name, said Spencer, the feud began.

Mr. Roosevelt was stopped from appropriating the name by a New York state law, said Spencer, but under his war powers, a special committee was appointed to rename historic places. Spencer declared he found a bronze plaque at the entrance to his place marked "Spencer's Point," placed there by the Roosevelt-appointed committee while at Mr. Roosevelt's estate a new plaque went up with the name "Krum Elbow."

Spencer said he had not visited the United States since 1939. His return after seven years' was prompted by the Republican landslide of Nov. 5.

Need for Youth Center Told at Jaycee Meeting

Twin Falls youth are not juvenile delinquents, but a high percentage of Twin Falls have failed them," Dick Harper, Twin Falls high school student, told a joint meeting of Jaycees and Jay-Cettes Tuesday evening.

Don Ingvoldstad, Kellogg, state Jaycee president, renewed Harper's plea for the needs of a youth recreation center in Twin Falls and explained the conflicting philosophies of government in America.

The cause of juvenile delinquency, Ingvoldstad said, is that "too many problem children are parentless."

Harper pleaded the support of Twin Falls youth for an adequate youth recreation program and

charged that "the community with an eye to thrift has not provided for its youth."

He said that the youth center program should be more adequate than the youth center here several years ago and that it should include provisions for a "crazy bar," indoor swimming pool, dance hall, athletic room, recreation room and should be run by an experienced director well trained in youth psychology.

The state president urged Jaycee participation in local government and outlined several suggested programs to stimulate interest in local government participation. He said that the goal of America was to strive for more democracy instead of the Democratic-Republican form of government we now have.

The last election was a revolution against too much power in the executive branch of government," Ingvoldstad said.
