Union Head Says CIO Not Posing Walkout Threats

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 21.—CIO President Philip Murray said today the CIO is "not threatening strikes" and is "not running around this nation with a club in its hands, threatening the people."

In a speech to the CIO convention, Murray said to industry: "Come on, be decent; be gentlemen, sit around the bargaining tables and let us arrive at mutually satisfactory wage agreements without resort to strikes. That is our position. It is not the attitude of the Management First, threatening the nation."

The bullet victim was Thel Chapman. The youngster was leaving the LDS ward chapel where he had attended primary class. He stood here with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John A. Elton.

The bullet struck the boy in the heart.

China Asks Full Report on Troops

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 21.—China today gave full support to a Russian proposal for reports to the United Nations on the disposition of all troops outside border areas.

The proposal was made by the Soviet Union, which is demanding that the United States also give domestic armed forces.

Wellington, New Zealand, today reiterated before the assembly's 44-nation political committee that United States troops were "not interfering" in internal affairs and gave cause for no friction or misunderstanding.

where his right to vote has been challenged. It does not appear that any of the persons voting in the Berger precinct were challenged. Accordingly, the absence of oaths signed by the election voters in that precinct is not a reason to reject the returns.

Not Test
The test is not whether an elector signs an oath as to his qualifications. There is no reason to suspect any fraud in the Berger precinct vote. The qualifications of electors to vote upon the bond issue was given wide publicity. I can only assume that all of those who voted knew what they were doing.

Citing court cases to support his position, Attorney Sweeley states, "It is the general rule of law that the vote of a precinct should not be rejected unless fraud, or irregularity, which taints or affects the whole vote thereof."

Continuing his argument, he states that the election was held in the presence of the judges to a bond election and a qualifying oath was required. The judges had failed to do this, the failure of an officer to perform such duty in the election is not a reason to reject the vote of the electors expressed by their vote at the election. As I have pointed out above, there was no failure on the part of the judges to comply with a provision of law when they permitted electors to vote without signing a qualifying oath; but even if there had been, unless there is a provision in the law declaring such a failure to be fatal to the election, the returns would be accepted.

Should be Accepted
"It is therefore my conclusion that, in so far as the absence of oaths signed by electors is concerned, the returns from the Berger precinct should be accepted and included in our official canvass."

After pointing out the provision of state law enabling an adjustment in discrepancies such as the extra votes, the attorney's opinion concludes, "When the judges have acted as provided in the statute, and the returns are again brought to you, you will then complete your canvass in accordance with such returns."

A statement by L. J. Peterson, administrative director of the department of public health said:

"Activation of the state tuberculosis hospital at Gooding will fill a long felt need in caring for tuberculous patients in Idaho and every effort is being made to secure the necessary technical personnel needed to run the hospital including nurses, clerical assistance, an x-ray specialist, dietitian, cooks laundry helpers and others."

Before the hospital will be ready to admit patients, considerable work must be done, including reconstruction of the floor in the basement, some remodeling of the building, installation of kitchen equipment, a new elevator, medical and surgical apparatus and equipment.

When opened, the hospital will provide care of approximately 30 patients. At present tuberculous patients are receiving care in the Gooding D'Alene hospital, Coeur D'Alene, and B. Alphonso hospital, Boise.

Clarence Fowler Passes at Burley
BURLEY, Nov. 21—Clarence Fowler, 38, Unity farmer, died at 11 p. m. Wednesday following a lingering illness involving a heart ailment. Born in Caldwell, Idaho, March 17, 1868, he moved to Idaho from Kansas 30 years ago and homesteaded in the Malheur area.

Later he moved to Burley where he married Myrtle Galloway, Burley, in May, 1926. Since then he has farmed near Unity.

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1947 Market For Beans to Stay Strong

Farmers in Magic Valley can look forward to continued strong demand for edible beans at high prices in 1947, according to agricultural market forecasts just received in the county agent's office from the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics.

This is the first time since 1941 that the market has been so strong. Grocers of delicious fruit (apples, peaches, pears, etc.) can look forward to a season of domestic demand, but despite the price-lowering competition of imported fruit and bananas, orchardmen should receive prices ranging from 150 to 200 per cent of pre-war levels.

After the sharp decline of chicken prices in early October, 1946, the price should remain level. Turkeys are expected to draw a slightly lower price next season because growers are enlarging their output. Because of high feed prices, poultry levels on eggs will be raised and farmers should receive higher average prices than in 1946, particularly during the flush production season.

There is some indication that overall consumer demand for meat may weaken in 1947 with resultant lowering in prices for beef, pork and mutton in the latter part of the year. Poultry are expected to command prices ranging from \$1.30 to \$1.35 a bushel for U. S. average grade.

County IEA Scans Peabody Survey

Without applying his findings to Twin Falls county examples, George M. Likness, Buhl superintendent of schools, outlined the Peabody report at a meeting of the county Idaho Education association in Twin Falls high school.

He touched on recommendations for school consolidations, reorganization on an appropiate basis of state and county school offices and the proposal that classroom unit assignments be upped 60 per cent in his address which was heard by approximately 50 persons.

Idaho's Potato Yield 3,000,000 Bushels Lower

BOISE, Nov. 21 (AP)—A preliminary estimate indicates the 1946 Idaho potato harvest will approximate 3,000,000 below the record yield a year ago of 44,200,000 bushels, the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics reported today.

The current crop expected to aggregate 41,500,000 bushels, will be more than 10,000,000 greater than the yearly average between 1925 and 1944. The annual yield for twice the 1945 period averaged 30,427,660 bushels.

Idaho will harvest a crop nearly as large as the combined yield of Oregon and Washington combined. The Gem state has fallen far behind the Maine and Idaho, and is hard-pressed by California for late potatoes.
