## Tight Ration Set for Coal Left in U. S.

that these supplies will soon be exhausted unless the most prudent and drastic rationing is applied by the communities themselves.

"Each community should determine what activities should be given preference and what curtailed so that the health and general welfare of the community may be best maintained."

"Consider Disinfectants  
The community should determine whether available coal stocks should be conserved by disinfecting, closing or restricting amusement places, closure of schools, curtailment of power for industrial purposes or whether in its opinion coal stocks available in the community are sufficient to justify no action."

"I cannot overemphasize the seriousness of this situation. I suggest that you ask the governing authorities in the communities of your state either to set up an emergency agency or create one or more committees to do so."

"I suggest that you might then set up for the state a fuel conservator or a fuel conservation committee to whom such local committees could turn for advice and help."

"Will you advise me whether you decide to make appointment of a state fuel conservator or equivalent official. If so, please advise his name, title and address."

Coal Use Banned  
In two supplements to the previous freeze order, Krug barred railroads from taking over coal in transit and notified any shippers who might be operating to ship coal only on government orders for emergency users.

"I issued a warning to 'all industrial and domestic consumers' saying that 'only by the strictest saving can widespread suffering and collapse of essential public services be averted.'"

## Christmas Seals To Be Mailed Out

Twin Falls county residents will be among thousands in Idaho to receive 1946 Anti-tuberculosis association Christmas seals this week. First seals will be mailed out Monday. Distribution to schools will continue on that date, according to Mrs. J. O. Humphrey, county Christmas seal chairman.

The new seal shows a lamp lighting a lamp against a starry blue sky and is symbolic of the recurring hope of the world after the dark years of war.

Funds derived from the sale are the sole support of the association and are used to provide chest X-rays for diagnostic purposes, to maintain a chest X-ray consultation service for physicians and hospitals, tuberculosis testing programs in the high schools and colleges, aid to tuberculosis cases and their families, and to help provide public health nursing services.

## Mother Sues for Half Son's Estate

Suit for damages equal to one-half the residue of the estate of her deceased son, Thomas T. Anderson, was filed by Elsie V. Drysdale in district court Saturday against William B. Wolcott and the General Casualty company of America. She asks \$1912.50 damages, statutory interest, and costs of the suit.

Complaint charges that Wolcott in probating the estate and "causing the whole to be distributed to the widow did not constitute faithful and proper execution of his trust" and that "the reason of his trust" was the General Casualty company of America. The company had bonded Wolcott for \$2,000 as administrator of the estate of Anderson. The estate was distributed May 21, 1946.

Plaintiff maintains that none of her son's property was community property and that she is therefore entitled to half of it. J. H. Barnes is her attorney.

## Library for County Goal Of Proposal

That county or regional libraries would be optional and not compulsory under a proposed state library law was emphasized at the one-day biennial convention of the Idaho State Library association here Friday. The association will sponsor the law in the 1947 legislature.

The law sets up machinery that would enable counties to obtain by an election within their individual borders the permission to maintain their own library. Josie Fraser, Twin Falls librarian, explained.

Miss Fraser said that many communities in Idaho are without library service and the proposed law would enable them to have a library if they wanted one. Idaho is one of the few states which does not have laws providing for county libraries.

Similar proposed library legislation has been voted down in the legislature twice before, she said.

Eldon Hart, Hicks college librarian, Rexburg, was re-elected president. Paul W. Scott, Pocatello librarian, was voted vice-president again, and Margaret Hiler, circulation librarian, Boise, was elected to succeed Margaret Hiler. Pocatello, as secretary-treasurer for the next two years.

The new nurse is Elsie Packrell, who quit her job as supervisor at the polio emergency hospital. She previously had nursed in Denver during the infantile paralysis epidemic there.

Miss Packrell was obtained through the facilities of the Red Cross. Elizabeth Coffin, Shoshone, returned to Twin Falls Friday afternoon after Miss Clayton's illness was diagnosed as polio. She had nursed here on polio cases late this summer and returned to Shoshone only last week-end.

Miss Clayton is quarantined at the Twin Falls county general hospital, where she is a nurse's aide before contracting the disease.

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## \$75,696 Sought As Damages in Fatality at Filer

Damages of \$75,696 and \$404.31 for hospital and funeral expenses in a Twin Falls county fatality were requested in a civil suit filed in district court Saturday. Caroline Braziel and her six minor children are suing W. J. and E. H. Smith, co-partners of the Triangle Construction company, Bole, and an employee, Irvin E. Sandau, Twin Falls.

The complaint asserts Sandau was driving a gravel truck for the construction company when it struck Jay V. Braziel, Filer, husband of the plaintiff, Aug. 30, 1946. He died the next day. Braziel was waiting for a bus at a point one and one-half miles east of Filer on highway 30 when the accident occurred.

The "defendants were operating the truck in a careless and negligent manner" when it struck Braziel is alleged in the suit. Barry Keenan, Robertson and Daly represent the plaintiffs.

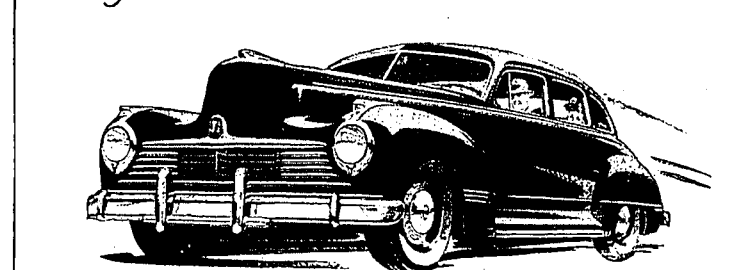

## Vacancies in Housing Here Virtually Nil

The addition that all houses at the Legion-sponsored veterans village here and that eight more apartments will be ready for occupancy soon.

**SURVEY RESULTS TOLD**  
BOISE, Nov. 23 (AP)—Twin Falls has a habitable housing vacancy of only 1.5 per cent in September when the bureau of the census conducted a survey for the national housing agency. NHA regional housing expediter George W. Coplen, Seattle, said in a report received here today. Coplen said of the estimated 1,300 Twin Falls, of 100 veterans living in Twin Falls, 90 per cent were married and of those one of every four was "doubling up" with relatives or friends. He said nearly one-third of all veterans were newcomers to the Twin Falls locality since they entered the service.

The average veteran, as judged by the Twin Falls survey, indicated the maximum they could be able to pay under present market conditions for a house is \$1,500. The average gross monthly payment would be \$20, Coplen said. Average weekly income for veterans from all sources was \$55 at the time of the survey, the NHA expediter added.

**Divorce Suit Lists \$111,750 Property**  
Community property with an estimated value of \$111,750 was listed in a divorce suit filed by Fay C. Perkins against M. L. Perkins in district court Saturday, charging cruelty.

Mrs. Perkins asks custody of three children, \$150 temporary alimony pending determination of suit, and support money for the children. \$500 suit money and attorney fees. She also requests defendant be required to furnish money for education of the three children. The suit was filed May 29, 1917, in Logan, Utah. Rayburn and Hayburn are attorneys for the petitioner. The complaint did not make any specific recommendations for a division of the community property.

In another divorce suit, Mrs. China L. Cardin against W. O. Cardin of Idaho, charged cruelty. The requested custody of a son, 17, and rooming house equipment valued at \$2,000 in lieu of support money. The marriage took place Nov. 8, 1930, at Gooding. Edward Debeck is attorney for the plaintiff.

## 300 Mexicans Given 72-Hour Notice by Sponsoring Group

The determination of the Twin Falls County Labor Sponsoring Association to avoid unnecessary board bills for contracted field-hands bore fruit Saturday afternoon when confirmation of their 72-hour notice to 300 out of the county's contingent of 400 Mexicans was received from Boise.

Departing laborers will clear the Twin Falls and Piler labor camps, leave 100 at Duhl, where they board a train scheduled to arrive Tuesday evening, according to Roy C. Lane, Boise, USDA labor representative. This shipment was the result of a week-long debate between Charles J. Conner, Hansen, sponsoring association chief; Jack Smith, county agent, and O. J. DeWoolf, county labor assistant, all three in favor of letting the men go quickly, and Harry A. Elcock, manager of the Twin Falls Amalgamated Sugar company, in favor of getting the beet harvest started.

According to the contracts under which the men came here, the sponsoring association must pay the men's board bill on days they don't work. At \$1.50 per man per day this could mean a \$45,000 bill for the 300 men for every extra day the 400 men would be here after there was no more work. At week's end, Conner declared, "I am going to tell Elcock that if he wants those workers after Monday work, he can pay for them himself." A different solution was found, however, when Conner and Elcock agreed to let the men stay in their labor contracts which allows association to terminate them on 72-hour notice.

The group of 100 laborers who are left behind will be harvested in the county, mostly near Hansen where they will be housed in huts. The group will be housed in the sugar company's agricultural superintendent, estimated Saturday night. He said that best-field harvesting in the west end of the county was practically finished Saturday, and he looks for the men to clear up most of the east end beets on Monday.

Smith declared that good weather Monday and Tuesday will mean that the last Mexicans remaining in the Twin Falls county will very likely be shipped out Wednesday by bus.

A large turnout of Salmon tract farmers was reported at a meeting in Holter Friday evening. Rolph said efforts would be made to form a chapter in that area.

Pond mountain and the river over on Baldy have been packed to hold the present snow. All roads of Ketchum are still closed. At present no lifts are in operation.



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
