Dr. Furrer explained that alfalfa is the major honey producing plant in Idaho and that by proper pollination by bees, alfalfa seed yield of 2,000 to 3,000 pounds per acre can be attained. Alfalfa normally yields between 100 and 120 pounds of seed to the acre.

Experiments Conducted

He declared that the bee culture division is working on experiments to perfect pollination of alfalfa and is establishing two new stations at Logan, Utah, and Columbus, O., to study pollination.

The Washington faculty member also declared that "bees are wild, although man has harnessed part of their efforts to benefit mankind."

Laidlaw Sole Owner of Big Hailey Ranch

HAILEY, Nov. 29.—Complete ownership of the Laidlaw and Brockie ranch, Muldoon, located about 15 miles from here, in this part of the country, has been recorded by James Laidlaw in the office of Blaine county recorder B. P. Thamm, following his purchase of one sixth interest from Mr. and Mrs. Brockie, formerly of Muldoon, now of Rupert. Price paid for the one-sixth interest in the business was listed as \$22,500. The ranch contains between 17,000 and 18,000 acres, and the owner has specialized in raising thoroughbred Suffolk hogs. Laidlaw is proprietor of the puma skins, a cross of Lincoln and Rambouillet breed. This cross breed is adapted to this section of the country.

Laidlaw first entered the sheep business here in the early 1890's with Robert Coates, who later transferred to Catalina, James Lindsay was also formerly associated with the ranch.

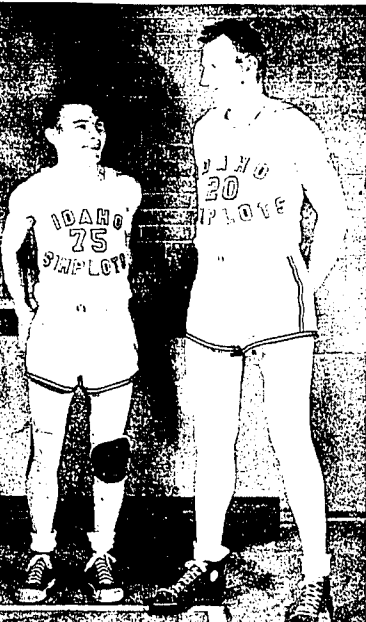

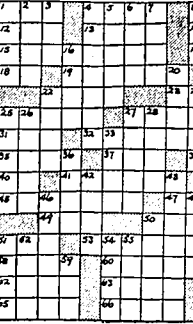
