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Former Operator of Clubs Tests Law Validity in Suit To Regain Forfeited Bond

The return of \$8,000 cash bonds of four locker clubs forfeited with their closure Sept. 30 by the city council is a possibility the city faces with the introduction into district court Monday of a civil suit for half that amount by the former owner of two of the clubs.

Should judgment be granted in this action, return of the other \$4,000 to the two other locker club owners would be required.

Notice of the suit was served on city officials by a sheriff's deputy Monday night at the regular session of the city hall. J. H. Blandford, city attorney, withheld comment.

The suit, which could have far-reaching effects regarding the status of locker clubs and laws governing their operation, seeks to test the validity of the local ordinance on its grounds in conflicts with Idaho state law, the state constitution and the United States constitution.

The action was brought by John Cristobal, former owner of two clubs, against the city of Twin Falls and the mayor, council and treasurer.

Records License Granting Cristobal's action, filed by his attorneys, Messrs. Channing and Lawrence B. Quinn, recited the granting of locker club licenses under the ordinance No. 6, 1945, for two clubs commonly known as the Perline hotel taproom and the Log Tavern. The plaintiff posted \$2,000 cash bond for each club.

The ordinance is "incongruous and repugnant to laws, chapter 222, Idaho session laws 1939," said the suit, "and is ultra vires," exceeding legal authority, "and not fairly referable to the police power of said municipality."

In declaring the ordinance "is an unreasonable exercise of the police powers" of the city, the plaintiff added it "impairs the revenue of the state of Idaho, the county of Twin Falls and the United States government, and that the sole right to raise revenue from the sale, possession and disposition of intoxicating liquors lies with the state of Idaho."

"No authority to raise revenue on account of the sale, possession or disposition of intoxicating liquors vests with said municipality," the suit contends.

"Called 'Unreasonable,'" the ordinance was assailed as "unreasonable, arbitrary, discriminatory, oppressive and unequal in its application to persons and citizens, and particularly to the plaintiff."

No under fire was the fact that under the ordinance, city officials may inspect locker clubs, making them "become a part of the business where under the laws of the state, intoxicating liquor cannot be dispensed."

The action alleged that "the city does not have the power to regulate the sale of private clubs where the sale of liquor is prohibited by the state."

Areas in Two

States Closed

By Heavy Fog

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 24 (AP)—Northern Utah and eastern Nevada were fogbound today and the U. S. weather bureau announced there was no communication with the clearing up.

"We'll have to wait for a storm to clear up," the bureau said.

Announcement said in reporting that due to lack of atmospheric circulation, the fog was at its worst levels caused the fog to form when temperatures fell to night.

From Monticello, Nev., eastward to Cache valley in northern Utah, and from as far south as Delta, Utah, the Idaho border the heavy blanket settled over the valleys and desert lands, slowing down traffic and halting airline operations.

Western and United Air Lines cancelled flights and suspended operations here. Western announced it had two flights held up at Cedar City, Utah, and one at Las Vegas, Nev. One United Air Lines plane was halted at Ogden and a Viking Air Lines charter plane was stranded here.

Coeville, Utah, and Alta, Utah, in the mountains, were unaffected by the fog.

"Visibility was reduced to a few yards in many places, but no serious traffic accidents were reported immediately."

The fog caused electric current to jump on high-voltage lines of the Utah Power and Light company, disrupting service for a few minutes in the southeastern part of Salt Lake City.

Special Reprieve

BOISE, Dec. 24 (AP)—Curtis D. King, 28-year-old prisoner, received the Christmas gift of a reprieve from the Idaho state penitentiary today.

King was granted a gubernatorial reprieve Monday when the state parole board met.

King, Twin Falls, will be at liberty scheduled to be paroled on Christmas day for a new offense.

Gov. Arnold Williams ordered the Christmas reprieve after Secretary of State H. M. Maister discovered that King was on the parole board at its last meeting.

Williams said the reprieve was granted on the expiration of his minimum sentence.

State, Buhl District Differ on Road Cost

George Wade, chairman of the Buhl highway district, Tuesday afternoon took issue with T. Matt Hally's statement that the Buhl highway district was contributing half the cost of the 5.5 miles of road between Clear lakes bridge and Banbury's manor.

Wade reiterated previous statements that the Buhl highway district was putting up "between \$500 and \$600 for fencing and the right of way."

"There is more than one paragraph in the contract," Wade said.

The right-of-way to the road was donated by Don J. Cavanagh, Democratic state chairman and owner of a large sheep ranch at one end of the road.

Cavanagh speaks of the road as the "right-of-way" and termed them "cheap political capital."

"The suggestion that the road is being built by the state is entirely false," Cavanagh said.

The estimated cost of the road was \$32,000, meaning the state's contribution was \$500 to \$600, and the Buhl highway district was contributing the balance of \$31,500 to \$31,900.

The developments followed Monday afternoon's refusal by the Buhl Chamber of Commerce to withdraw its protest on construction of the road.

The Buhl Chamber of Commerce's decision to act because of lack of a quorum.

Those recently charged the project was a "political" move, about \$50,000 to \$100,000 out of the state road funds. "Excerpts of the Buhl Chamber of Commerce's protest were printed in the Twin Falls paper forum page Sunday."

Wade Tuesday afternoon declared agitation for the road began about five or six years ago, when the county of Twin Falls sportsmen and farmers representing the 10 families in the area traveled by the road.

"We didn't have the money to build the road at that time," Wade said.

"When we received the offer from the state to participate in a project to build the road, we accepted it," Wade said.

He explained the Buhl highway district was obligated for the right of way.

U. S. Strikes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (AP)—John D. Smith, former civilian production director, called on American management today to settle their differences with labor by peaceful means.

"I am awfully sorry," he said, "but I just can't remember all the intricate details of the labor situation."

With that, the Duke of Windsor, who was accompanied by his duchess, turned back to his conversation with friends.

Smith, in a final report to President Truman, said "some better solution" should be found for avoiding labor strife.

The exercise of wartime priority and allocation powers is not the answer, he said.

"The solution must be reached by labor and management working together, in the realization that production need not cause any hardship on the part of the workers."

Smith guided the nation's civilian production through most of a year of reconstruction. He resigned three weeks ago, and the civilian production administration was absorbed in the new office of temporary control.

Small industry has had tremendous production strides since the war, and now veterans are returning to the reconstruction work.

From a wartime peak of more than 700 production centers, only a score remain.

Most of these, Smith told the president, can safely be lifted in the near future.

Chimney Toppled

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Threat of U. S. Official Says Reds War Will Old To World Within Legal Rights in Ultimatum Handed Ship

VATSIAN CITY, Dec. 24 (AP)—A Christmas message that the world is a new war hangs over a deluded and unhappy world in which the Atlantic charter has become a forgery of its original principles.

The pontiff urged the world's statesmen to find new approaches to peace making and act so that a true peace is achieved in 1947.

Pope Pius XII, in his Christmas message, described to the college of cardinals and his world radio audience "a dark and fragile" state of world peace, the lack of faith and growth of suspicion among nations and the constant threat of new conflict.

The pontiff said delusion and unhappiness filled the depths of many hearts because of "compromises and solutions based on strength and on the prestige of political power."

The four freedoms of the Atlantic charter appeared today "as a shadow and a counterfeit of a forgery," he said.

Asks Disarmament The pontiff appealed to international leaders for disarmament. He warned against new machines of destruction that could be used in modern war technique.

He warned that present troubled world conditions might even lead to war.

of way of the road, donated by Cavanaugh, and the fencing. It figures to cost about \$500 or \$600 and that's the way the contract reads.

Says Road Requested

In response to a protest by the Buhl Chamber of Commerce against the highway work, Gov. Arnold Williams emphasized that the project was asked by the Buhl highway district and that the highway commissioners in that district had requested the project.

Hally said that the work was being done under a contract agreed with the Buhl highway district in accordance with 1939 legislative law.

The contract, Hally said, provided that the Buhl highway district and the state share "50-50" in the cost of grading and draining approximately 5.5 miles of the Clear Lake-Bannock road.

Hally also called attention to a contract provision stating "after said project is completed the same will be maintained to the satisfaction of the state at the sole expense of the Buhl highway district."

Hally said the contract as also stating:

Quotes Contract

"All title of or shall be furnished by the district at its expense and all expenses incidental thereto, including abstract and recording fees, shall be paid by the district; also the district shall pay for the construction or relocation of right of way fencing, relocation of communication and power lines, removal of all buildings or other improvements except irrigation and drainage facilities within the right of way and settlement of all damages to real property by reason of the construction of said project."

Whereas the Buhl highway district has been dragged into a political controversy and emphasized that the Buhl Chamber of Commerce now was aware of the terms of the contract for the road.

Hally said that the road also would serve as a detour for traffic from Melon valley to Buhl and pointed out that the road to Laramie is always the first road in the district to be blocked in the winter.
