Potato Growers Warned to Beat Loans Deadline

Twin Falls county potato growers Thursday were reminded that all government loans on potatoes must be completed by Dec. 30 or they will be ineligible for the loan and the support price. Wilson, chairman of the agriculture conservation association committee, said that 302 potato growers in Twin Falls county have taken advantage of the federal loan. Taking of the loan makes each grower eligible for a support price of \$1.50 for U. S. No. 1 potatoes and 65 cents for U. S. No. 2s. He explained this is a net price in the cellar and that if the potatoes are sorted and loaded on a truck, an additional 50 cents per hundred is allowed on the support price. He advised all farmers who have not received notice to call at the AAA office to sign the loan to go in and make arrangements for signing the loan.

2 Burned When Explosion Starts Repair Shop Fire

Condition of two Twin Falls men, taken to Twin Falls county general hospital Thursday morning for treatment of burns received in a warehouse fire, was reported "fair" this afternoon. The men, Arlie White, 48, and Lloyd Hartley, 36, were injured in a fire at the United Oil company combined repair shop and storage building in the 1400 block of Kimberly road. The fire resulted from an explosion of undetermined origin at about 10:30 a. m. Thursday. The blast blew out one side of the building and started a blaze which destroyed the repair shop and damaged the storage building before being extinguished by the city fire department. Firemen said a tanker truck was being steamed out when the accident occurred, that origin of the fire could not be determined until the two injured men could be interviewed.

Liquor Clubs To Be Denied Beer Permits

BOISE, Dec. 26.—Idaho clubs serving liquor will not be issued 1947 state licenses to sell beer, Joe H. Williams, director of beer revenue, declined to say today.

"The law is plain," Williams said, "You can't serve beer anywhere that liquor is served."

Williams said he has already received applications by more than 30 clubs that also hold U. S. Internal revenue retail liquor or wine dealer's stamps.

"I'm not going to issue beer licenses to any place holding a federal liquor stamp," Williams said. "If the new administration wants to issue it, that will be up to them." Williams was referring to the Republican regime that replaces the incumbent Democrats on Jan. 3.

Williams said the application forms for 1947 licenses contain a new question that has been added for the first time.

The question reads: "Have you purchased or do you hold a United States internal revenue retail liquor or wine dealer's stamp?" In all instances where an affirmative reply has been received, no beer licenses has been issued, Williams said.

Although the legislature in 1945 adopted a law prohibiting companion sale of whiskey and beer, Williams said, beer licenses for 1946 were issued to many clubs holding federal liquor stamps.

Age Increase Revealed for U. S. Leaders

NEW YORK, Dec. 26—American present-day leaders are found to be definitely older than former ones, it is claimed in a study by Dr. Harvey C. Lehman of Ohio university, published today in the American Journal of Sociology.

These leaders are legislative, judicial, diplomatic, military, naval, religious and educational. Dr. Lehman says also that the leaders are more nearly the same age, in their respective fields, than formerly.

There are exceptions in some religious organizations and in new groups like the CIO.

The trend to older men appears in other parts of the world. Dr. Lehman's figures are in median ages, and fractions of years are omitted.

In the last 100 years ages of congressmen have risen from 35-40 to 55-59, and senators from 45-49 to 60-64.

Speakers of the house—prior to 1875 a little more than half were under 40 when appointed—from 1900 to 1945 their ages were 67 while serving.

Supreme court—the first 20 justices at the time of appointment were 40. In modern times the appointment age rose to 56.

Cabinet members ages have risen to more than a century, by about 14 years, to the age of 60.

American diplomats rated 42 years in 1800 and now the figures are 60.

Presidents of colleges and universities, before 1850, were 40. From 1850 to 1899 this age rose to 57.

The 131 popes prior to 1825 were men of 60. The nine popes from 1825 to 1845 averaged 72.

Top-ranking generals of the American revolution and the war of 1812 averaged 39. In the civil war the figure was 46, both sides included. In World War II it rose to 56.

CLEVELAND, O. (AP)—Charles D. Pereira celebrated his 80th birthday by ice-skating all evening with a dozen pretty girl partners at a Cleveland roller-skating rink.

"I'm practicing up on my second childhood," he says. "The management here has promised me a journal of good-skated skates when I reach 100."

Professor Pereira, who used to be a musician and is apt to whip into a quick gleeful-outburst in the middle of the rink, didn't start skating until he was 72. Now he skates three nights a week, clocks his mileage at 400 miles a month.

"My doctor tells me if I keep on skating I'll never die," he chuckles. "I'll simply dry up and blow away."

The wistful little professor stands a little better than five feet tall and weighs 100 pounds, both figures being computed when he's on skates. He also has a courtly manner and a way with the ladies.

"The girls never turn him down, and some of the younger blades can't figure it out."

"All you have to do," explains Pereira, "is go up to a good-looking girl and ask her to skate with you. The trouble with me is that I've got too many girls."

The girls say his trouble is that he skates a lot better than most of the young fellows.

Pereira occasionally accepts an engagement for a single show in which was his business when he toured the country as "The Great Pereira of Magic, Music and Mystery."

He claims he's the oldest magician in the country, too. "It shouldn't be too long before I'm the oldest roller-skater, too," he says.

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Living Costs Index Spirals Over Record

WASHINGTON, Dec. 26 (U.S.)—The government's cost-of-living index hit a new all-time high in mid-November, topping the previous peak set in June, 1929, by 1.5 per cent.

Spiraling food prices were mainly responsible for the new record.

The bureau of labor statistics said the November index stood at 151.7 compared with the prewar 1913-14 average of 100. This was 22 per cent higher than mid-October.

Uses Large Cities
The BLS index is based on the expenses of moderate income families in large cities.

BLS said the index jumped 17.3 per cent in the 12 months ending Nov. 15. During that period food items climbed 34 per cent, clothing 14.4 per cent and house furnishings 14.6 per cent. The index rose 18.9

per cent between June and November. Items showed only slight increase, the bureau said, while gas and electricity costs dropped about two per cent.

Food Increases
The report said retail food prices had risen 4.3 per cent between mid-October and mid-November. Most of the increase was attributed to changes in the price of fats and oils which rose an average of 45 per cent. This included 104 per cent for lard, 66 to 85 for shortening and 50 for oleomargarine.

Clothing prices rose 1.0 per cent during the month and house furnishings increased 0.9 per cent.

Visits Mother
Mr. Truman said he would pay a final visit to his mother, 94-year-old Mrs. Martha E. Truman, at Grandview, before taking off in the presidential C-54 plane, the "Sacred Cow," about 1 p. m. (APR).

He flew into Jackson county yesterday for a round of Christmas celebrations, which included a big

lucky dinner at his home at 219 North Delaware street.

There, he had dinner with his mother, his wife and his daughter, Margaret, his brother, J. Vivian Truman, and the Wallaces, his wife's people.

The President kept close to home on Christmas day except for an hour's visit to the nearby home of Col. Mike Peters, an old friend whom he has visited regularly on Christmas for 25 years.

Returns to Washington
Mr. Truman, already at work on the all-important state of the nation message which he will deliver to the new congress, decided to return to Washington immediately.

He still has under consideration the administration's course during the next two years on the subject of labor legislation.

In addition to his state of the nation message, the President will submit to the congress messages on the new budget as well as on employment based on a yet-to-be-delivered confidential report of his new economic advisory council.

Turkey Problem Solved

Florence M. Schults, county home demonstration agent, says it's easy to roast a turkey without losing any of the juicy turkey flavor.

Just cut the bird in two and arrange skin to breast meat on the keel bone edge to prevent shrinkage of the skin and to protect the breast meat. Tie leg just above the knuckle joint securely to the tail. No other trussing is necessary, Miss Schults said.

The wing should be left flat against the breast. The bird should be placed cut side down on a fat rack in a shallow pan, brushed with melted fat and covered with a clean cloth, preferably cheese cloth.

The turkey should be roasted at a constant, moderately low temperature. Miss Schults warned housewives not to add water and not to cover the pan.

The dressing presents the problem with a half-turkey as there's no breast to stuff it into. Mound the dressing on a well-treated double thickness of waxed paper to approximate the shape of the half turkey. When the bird is about half done (one and one-half to two hours) remove from the oven and place paper with dressing on rack. Replace the half turkey over the dressing and continue roasting until done. Miss Schults advised to spoon fat from bottom of pan to replenish oil if necessary during roasting.

Roasting a half turkey will require 25 to 30 minutes per pound at 325 degrees.

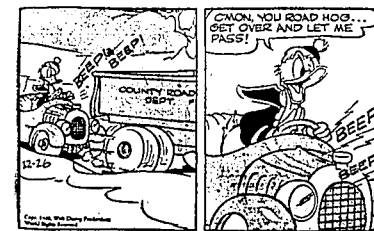

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Constitution For China to Start in 1947

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26 (AP)—China has adopted a new constitution. It is a democratic document, slated to go into effect next Christmas. A great deal can happen before then, however. It is not at all difficult to imagine that the undeclared civil war now going on may not be settled by Dec. 25, 1947, and that the constitution could not be put into effect because of it. Until it is, China's destiny remains in the hands of the governing party, the Kuomintang, which has held it since 1927.

Lacked Representation
The "national assembly" which adopted this constitution lacked communist and some third party representation, which stayed away of its own accord for its own reasons. Meanwhile the draft submitted by the Kuomintang government was practically the same as the one written by an all-party conference early this year. It was still a democratic document, and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek personally pushed it through the assembly and vetoed off all attempts by both reactionaries and liberals to write in changes.

Weakened Arguments
Thus the next time he invites the communists to come into a coalition government on his terms they will have weaker arguments for refusal. This will be even truer if in the meantime he reforms his interim government as widespread reports say he intends to do.

That the communists will refuse, however, is hardly to be doubted. Today came word from their capital at Yanan that they have expelled their powerful governing council, the politbureau, to include three new members from Manchuria.

Thus the party is presenting a solid front, which makes the likelihood of a real rapprochement with the central government that much allimer.

Fairfield to Get Appliance Store
