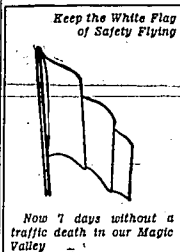

duential training; second, by consolidating the state employment service; and third, by wiping out race and religious discrimination among workers.

Expanding production. This can be "entrusted mainly to the initiative and inventiveness within our business system." Mr. Truman said, if the government helps by removing the threat of recurrent business slumps.

The government can do this, he said, by helping keep farm incomes up to the rest of the nation standard, and developing new farm markets; building up undeveloped areas and depressed regions; and making careful use of federal public works.

Encouraging free enterprise. Mr. Truman said he was asking more money for anti-trust law enforcement, and urged help, including easier credit, for small business.

Expanding the welfare, health and security programs.

Improving international trade.

Combating a boom and bust cycle.

Postal Receipts Increase in 1946

Receipts at the post office increased to \$145,945.98 in 1946 from \$143,851.26 in 1945. Receipts for 1945, however, would be much higher, Postmaster M. A. Strunk said, with the inclusion of \$11,800.85 received at the branch office at Hunt, which closed a year ago.

Mr. Strunk said that the increase in postage revenue in 1946 was the result of increased holiday mailings was the boost in stamp sales from \$38,948.30 in 1945 to \$40,723.54 in 1946 for the last three months of the year.

Total receipts for the last quarter of the year were also swelled from \$41,973.12 in 1945 to \$44,829.58 in 1946.

Widow Faces Murder Trial Set Feb. 24

WIFE OF ONE, Jan. 8—Mrs. O. H. Broadbent will go on trial in Malheur county circuit court Feb. 24 for the first degree murder of her sixth and wealthy husband, W. D. Broadbent.

The chic, 40-year-old woman pleaded innocent yesterday in charges of murder and in the accessory after the fact in the slaying of her demure husband. The charges were overruled by Judge M. A. Blegg.

Blegg postponed the trial of Alvin Lee Williams, 23-year-old chauffeur of Mrs. Broadbent, who reportedly confessed the actual slaying of Broadbent, until March 10. His trial originally had been set for Feb. 5.

Mrs. Broadbent is charged with conspiring with Williams in the slaying of the wealthy Idaho and Oregon rancher last Oct. 14 on a lonely stretch of road near Jordan Valley, Ore.

POLITICAL EARLY BIRD

The longer the journey, the greater likelihood there is of accidents. This holds true in politics as it does in motoring or airplane riding. So it is a perilous journey of 18 months' duration that will take Harold E. Stassen to the summer of 1948, when he hopes to obtain the Republican presidential nomination.

In announcing his candidacy so early, Mr. Stassen has defied practical considerations as well as tradition. In fact, the tradition is probably the outgrowth of practicality. It is almost axiomatic that smart politicians don't do what the former Minnesota governor has done.

Nothing in that program to brand new. It embraces a number of bipartisan views which form a legislative basis conforming to Mr. Stassen's definition of liberalism. His views are certain of majority support in the new Republican congress. Others will probably be opposed. But in the unlikely event that his whole program is adopted, and if so, how would his own party in congress react?

At present Mr. Stassen seems to have a good deal of popular support. He does not, however, hold public office. He has not tested himself since 1942, when he was reelected mayor of Minneapolis. Mr. Stassen supported then as senator and governor last fall, but that is not the same thing. Furthermore, there is little indication that the Minnesota has great financial backing to offer in place of a guaranteed bloc of votes.

As we said above, Mr. Stassen's views don't do what Mr. Stassen has done. But Mr. Stassen has proved himself a knowing politician in the past. Why, then, has he taken this unconventional step? The apparent reason is that he is as determined as was Wendell Willkie that old guard conservatism has no place in present-day America. Politically wiser than Mr. Willkie, he seems to be making an early and direct bid for that same popular support that carried his liberal predecessor to the top of the Republican party.

But first he must hurdle some formidable opposition within that party. It is already apparent that, in the 1948 convention, he will have to match his political achievements with the more recent and equally distinguished public service of Senator Vandenberg, the impressive election victory of Governor Dewey this year, Senator Taft's powerful organization in congress and his control of the southern Republican delegations, and Governor Warren's great popularity on the west coast.

Harold Stassen is on to prove that the proverb about the early bird holds good in American politics. Whether he succeeds or fails, he is certain to provide a great deal of interest, an example serving of food for speculation, and an instructive experiment which future candidates will study with interest.

THE RACE IS ON

On the day that President Truman announced his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination in 1948, there came a report that President Truman might propose some changes in the Wagner act to the new congress. The coincidence might serve as a definite reminder that Harry Truman seems to be a candidate for President.

Several of Mr. Truman's recent actions indicate that he has taken stock of the November vote and its implications, and that he will strive to take the initiative away from the Republican congress in giving the people what they obviously want.

As a result, Mr. Truman is being spoken of in decidedly less hopeful or plying tones than he was a month ago. At the moment his stock seems to have bounced back. Of course November, 1948, is a long way ahead. But right now, with the Federal Democrats apparently drawing together and the vigorous Republicans beginning to wrangle over power and privilege, the 1948 race shapes up as the hottest and closest in decades, with each side strong enough to worry the daylight out of the other.
