Budgets for County Raised 35 Per Cent

RAISED MORE THAN 35 PER CENT—\$200,829—over last year's finally approved budgets were expenditures of \$776,564 (not counting the future \$1,250,000 hospital bond issue) noted in tentative budgets approved for the county's officials and institutions late Monday by the commissioners.

Heavy increases in appropriations was seen in the hospital budget which is calculated to reach \$336,000 during 1947, a gain of \$96,455 over last year's final outlay of \$240,545.

A large chunk of this boost is due to increased nursing salaries. Last year's final outlay of \$240,545 was increased to \$275,000 in the final hospital budget for 1947.

On the salaries side, provision is made for nurses, cooks, engineers, dietitians, anesthetists, lab technicians, a surgical supervisor and nurses, supervisors, maids and office clerks.

All six personal defendants, and the impersonal city of Twin Falls Monday filed two demurrers in district court to John Cristobal's suit to recover the \$2,000 lawyer-keeper's bond he forfeited to the city last fall.

Defendants in the case are the City of Twin Falls, Mayor Bert A. Blandford, Councilmen O. H. Coleman, Dr. P. Greenhalgh, W. W. Thomas, Kenneth Shook, and City Treasurer Dorothy Reynolds.

Through City Attorney J. A. Blandford, the mayor, the councilmen and the city treasurer declared in their first demurrer that Cristobal does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action against the defendants.

In their second and special demurrer, the city officials state that Cristobal's suit against them "purports to sue the defendants both personally and in their official capacity." "A misjoinder of parties defendant," read Blandford's brief.

The former Twin Falls proprietor of the Trophy Club and Club Man is suing to regain his forfeited bond on grounds that the city ordinance by which he lost it "violates state liquor laws" and is "arbitrary."

### Democracy in Two Elections Takes Beating

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14 (AP)—Democracy appears to be taking a beating in two elections now in the news.

One is in Poland. The other is in Iran. Both countries are near Soviet Russia. Poland is in the Soviet zone of influence, but Russia in 1939 recently suffered a setback in Iran when the Azerbaijan independence movement collapsed in the north under the military blow of the Tehran government.

Neither Democratic nor Republican election looks even remotely democratic from a distance.

Before getting steamed up about either, it is well to remember that neither country ever has been precisely a stronghold of what westerners think of as democracy.

Under old Marshall Pilsudski, Poland evolved one of the first dictatorships after World War I and knew nothing else until the Nazis provided their version of a change in 1939.

Iran has been ruled by a concentration of power around the shah when that person didn't monopolize it.

Never Succeeded  
Democracy may have been a gleam in the eye of a good many Poles and Persians in the past, but it just never got very far.

The scenes in Poland and Iran may be different, but not too fundamentally different in this respect: Without Soviet friendship the Polish government might not be nearly so confident, and without the friendship of Soviet Russia's opposition the Iranian government might not either.

That's something to keep in mind as you shed a tear for these two cases of arrested democratic development.

### \$2,011 Average School Salary, Board Declares

A table of averages on salaries of classroom teachers in Twin Falls Independent school district No. 1 was released for publication Monday night by the board of trustees. The figures do not include salaries of principals or administrative officials according to E. E. Jellison, chairman pro tempore of a meeting at the high school attended by a quorum of trustees.

The report reveals that the overall average salary of high school, junior high and elementary school classroom instructors is \$2,011. The average was arrived at by totaling up the following breakdown of wage brackets: \$2,264, average salary of high school teachers; \$2,088, average salary of junior high teachers; \$1,813.50 average salary of elementary teachers.

The board received notification, a yearly renewal, that Twin Falls high school has been fully approved by the accreditation committee of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools.

Mrs. Grace Hicks was hired to teach the second grade and Mrs. Jean Russell the fourth grade at Bickel school. Reassignment of Mrs. Aherne C. Henson, former girls' physical education instructor in the junior high school, was accepted.

Bills were approved in the amount of \$3,328.

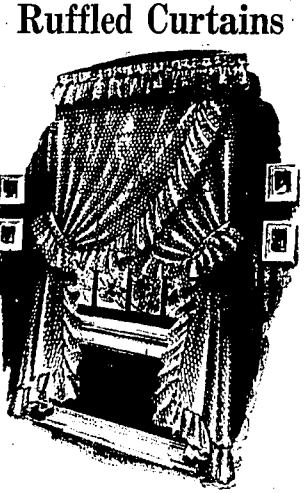
