# Georgians Fight for Governor

ATLANTA, Jan. 15 (AP)—Rival claimants to the governorship of Georgia established offices in the state capital today and each immediately set up his own military department.

The claimants were Ellis Arnall, who has held the office for the past four years, and Herman Talmadge, who was named by the legislature early today to the office which his late father, Eugene Talmadge, won in last November's general election. The elder Talmadge died last month.

Disregards Action Arnall refused to heed the action of the legislature and in a dramatic early morning encounter with Talmadge and in the face of a yelling mob of Talmadge supporters refused to turn the office over to him.

As his first act upon arrival at the office today, Arnall named Col. W. Collins Collins as adjutant general of the state guard, as adjutant general to succeed Marvin Griffin, who was killed in action during the war. Talmadge as his adjutant general, Griffin formerly served under Arnall.

Arnall immediately communicated with Secretary of War Patterson by telephone and asked federal recognition. Collins as adjutant general, Arnall decided to ask what Patterson wanted, and when he hung up, he replied "I've got to go to work." Arnall is the adjutant general, pointing toward Collins.

It was a quarter-hour after the legislature had named him that the 44-year-old man, who his father didn't live to see.

# Meet Most Photographed Girl of Month



You'll see a lot of this busy little girl with the big eyes and ice cream expression this month. She's Nancy Drury, chosen as poster girl for the march of dimes campaign. But fame hasn't turned her head.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (NPA)—Nancy Drury, a 4-year-old curly-haired blonde with soft glowing brown eyes, is going to be the most photographed child in America this month.

Nancy is phenolgenic enough. Of thousands of youngsters throughout the country, she has been selected as the "poster girl" for the national 1947 march of dimes campaign fund to raise money for infantile paralysis.

Pollo was a vital part of Nancy's life long before she became the "poster girl." Even at her age she remembers vividly the long months she spent learning to reuse tortured muscles.

Two years ago last summer Nancy became ill. Slowly at first, her legs stiffened; she fell and couldn't get up; all at once her entire body suffered painfully rigid, by the time the doctor reached her, she couldn't bend her head enough to take a drink of water.

For the first three weeks of her long siege, she was quarantined in the special ward at Louisville's general hospital. Gradually the long processes of reeducating Nancy's muscles had its effect. Her own "stiffness and cramped spirit" contributed to her recovery.

Nancy entered into the spirit of the treatment so much, her mother says, that "she'd give her doll 'pinks' and 'physical therapy' when I'd get through with her."

Today only one muscle in Nancy's right leg still needs to be strengthened. It is tight and stretched. Otherwise she is a normal, healthy young girl.

Shy and quiet, Nancy is one of five children in a family of moderate financial means but rich in family life. Since her illness she has been the center of the family home life. She assumes herself most often by playing school and walks as far as she can with her mother when they leave for school each morning and meets them when they return in the afternoon. During the times, she "teaches" her year-old brother.

Nancy will begin her career as a "poster girl" in a few days. Her face will look out from thousands of billboards and display cards across the country. And Nancy herself will come to New York where she will officially open the campaign, visit the "poster girls" and be the center of attention at a fashion show.

Idaho's anti-fly campaign of last year DDT has received both national and international recognition. County Agent Jack Smith said Wednesday.

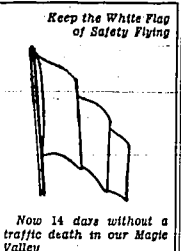

### Breckenridge Elected Head Of Wool Men

FOCALIST, Jan. 15 (AP)—John Breckenridge, Twin Falls, Tuesday was elected president of the Idaho Wool Growers' association to succeed T. H. Gooding, Reklam, who headed the organization for the past three years.

The election of officers followed a session during which Gooding told delegates they can feel assured of a good market for lambs in 1947.

Present lamb prices, he said, are high enough to justify producing and feeding, but he cautioned that these prices will do when the new crop goes to market is anyone's guess.

"The income forecast for agriculture, including livestock, for 1947 is from 12 to 25 per cent lower," he added.

Committee reports and speeches on specialist subjects marked the program today.

Chairman Andrew Little, Emmett, gave the review of the predatory animal committee.

"Feeding lambs for profit" was the subject of an address by Reed S. Culp, Salt Lake City feeder and producer.

Youngest President Breckenridge, 20, a Washington college graduate, became the youngest man ever to head the association. Breckenridge has been in the wool raising business since his youth, except for the time he was attending the Pennsylvania state university.

In accepting the post at the wool growers convention here, he stressed the need for cooperation between his organization and other groups. He also sponsored a resolution asking for closer relations between the Idaho state government and those of other lands.

Breckenridge said the executives of the organization and the director would keep in close touch during the coming year because of the number of problems which face the wool industry.

No Request for High Tariff The association at its meeting without asking for higher tariffs. Breckenridge, who was convention chairman of the general wool committee, introduced the resolution which said:

"We urge our government to take a cooperative stand with the governments of other lands. We of the Idaho wool growers are proud of our association and its activities and believe in the past year. We hope to increase the number of members and with the help of loyal non-members we will be able to do so."

The vice-presidency went to David Little, Emmett, a graduate of the University of Idaho at Moscow and a lifelong sheep raiser. Mel Clear, Boise, was named secretary.

Domestic Practises Resolved Although the resolutions passed did not criticize federal policies in connection with the importation of British wool, a measure which has characterized meetings of associations in other wool growing states, some of them scored the domestic practices of various federal agencies on grazing matters or organization.

Opposition to the proposed Columbia valley authority, "arbitrary" creation of national park and monuments and "unnecessary" federal land withdrawals was voiced in other resolutions.

The limitation of grazing privileges on national forest land was scored in a resolution introduced by Rex B. Jensen, chairman of the grazing committee. It opposed action in the number of sheep allowed to graze on public domain "except for range protection."

An anticipated shift of the regional grazing office of the interior department from Boise to Denver was opposed by the group. They said the transfer would move the office "600 miles from the nearest suitable lands it would supervise."

The interior department was criticized for "failing to keep its promises with the national advisory board" and the joint livestock committee under its program of reuniting the grazing service. Approval of fee changes was based on this agreement."

### Head of Seed Firm Replies To Complaint

Asserting that his wife called him "a dirty son of a bitch" and concealed facts about one of three alleged previous marriages, Howard L. Hammond, co-owner of the Intermountain Seed company, Twin Falls, filed an answer and cross complaint Tuesday in district court to Nancy M. Hammond's suit for divorce from him.

Declaring that he's worth no more than \$20,000, but the one-half interest of which she asked half in her action filed last August, Hammond cross-complained that when they were married April 6, 1942, at San Francisco, his wife told him about two previous marriages. Her ventures, failed to mention a third.

Concealed Marriage Hammond claims she concealed facts about her alleged marriage to a man named Frank Parker on June 14, 1927, at Ogden, "at a date prior to the granting of (her) final decree of divorce from Ryan Keefe."

Continuing his libelous portrayal of what he terms his spouse's "frivolous and malicious" conduct, he "possesses a violent and unprovoked temper and without any provocation becomes angry and abusive on said occasions uses vile and abusive language."

Allegedly by this allegedly bad temper of his wife, Hammond notes that she once tried to strike him with a telephone receiver "but in the face with her hand and then deliberately trampled on them and broke them."

Struck With Broom He also claims that during 1943 Mrs. Hammond once struck him with a broom. On numerous occasions, he says, she called him a "damned son of a bitch."

"Once last year, Hammond claims, his wife told him she hoped he'd "get killed" while on some trip. Besides that, he declares his wife "deceals, over long periods of time, she 'has refused to speak' to him and 'has pointed her fingers' at him."

To Nancy M. Hammond's allegations concerning Hammond's earnings, copiously and accumulated wealth, he replied that:

"Instead of being worth 'in excess of \$200,000' as she swears, he swears \$50,000; his yearly income is instead of amounting to \$50,000 does not exceed in excess of \$15,152.19; he owns only part, not all, of the Intermountain Seed company.

Not Sole Owner Hammond denied entirely owning a business in Salt Lake City, admits he owns a share of a seed firm there; he claims that house is worth not the \$20,000 his wife claimed, it was no more than \$20,000; their home furniture, he avers, is worth \$1,500, not \$7,500.

Despite Hammond's claim that his wife had a separate bank account totaling more than \$4,000 when he filed his answer Sept. 6, 1946, to District Judge James W. Porter's order to show cause, Hammond was ordered Sept. 13 by court clerk Day to his wife \$750 for initial attorney's fees, \$500 out money and \$350 temporary monthly alimony until the case is settled.

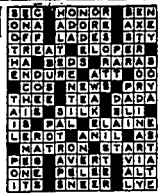
