In a strongly-worded statement to the Times-Newspaper, Police Chief Howard W. Ollitt Monday condemned the existing state liquor law as a "poor tool with which to control liquor traffic in Idaho" and called upon the legislature "to give our state an honest liquor law."

The legislature in 1933 enacted the present liquor law, which has since been amended several times. "The law on its face is honest," Ollitt said, "but in its operation it is dishonest. It is a poor tool with which to control liquor traffic. Unless our legislature face the law and cease trying to please both wets and drys, law enforcement agencies will still have a dull tool with which to operate."

New Camera Snaps Scene; Makes Prints

NEW YORK, Feb. 24 (AP)—A revolutionary new camera, which turns out a finished picture in minutes after the shutter is snapped, comes out in a single step after a pressing operation on an ordinary photograph, was demonstrated here.

The camera, which can be carried by any one, was announced to the Optical Society of America by its inventor, Dr. H. H. Land of Boston, the discoverer of polaroid.

Several types have been built. Land said, and announcement will be made in a few months about when the camera will be available and what they will cost.

The inventor, demonstrating a portrait type and also one of the size frequently carried by news photographers, said the process could be adapted to any camera and possibly to making motion pictures.

The camera produces a fully finished picture, of the same quality as if developed and printed by dark room technique.

It is described in the published program of the Optical Society as a "unitary" as the terms mean, in a new kind of photography as "unitary plates to daylight-loading film more than a half century ago."

The turn of a knob produces a positive print in permanent form. The camera contains no ink; the picture comes out dry, and requires no further processing.
