Non-Veterans Rent Bulk of Housing Units

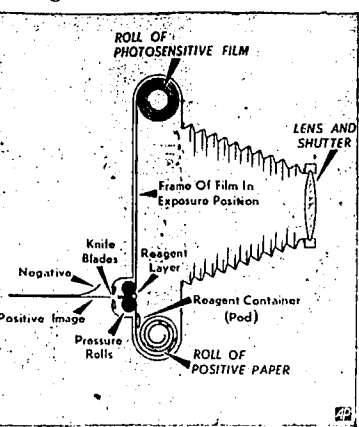

Local Option Liquor Goes to Senate Following 43 to 14 House Approval

BOISE, Feb. 25 (AP)—A bill to legalize liquor-by-the-drink in cities and towns where it is approved by local voters was passed 43 to 14 by the house of representatives today after Rep. Jess Hawley, Jr., R., Adm., declared "the legislature is charged with the duty of removing the evils we have now or you can put into effect this law which can be enforced."

Hawley declared "ugly rumors" have been flying about the gamblers and racketeers not wanting any bill at all. There's been a lot of rumors about the amount of money poured into the state to prevent any new regulation of liquor.

Under the Idaho state monopoly liquor system the serving of alcoholic drinks is legally limited to locker clubs where patrons bring their own bottles of whiskey for mixing into drinks.

That system has failed, Hawley declared "because you can go into any club in any city in Idaho and buy a drink straight across the bar."

Rep. Sterling Magleby, R., Madison, and Majority Leader Erwin Schwiebert, R., Canyon, argued for defeat of the measure because they said the per capita consumption of liquor was greater in states where liquor by the drink is permitted than in monopoly states.

Rep. Victor Ford, D., Owyhee, said "this borders on class legislation because it limits liquor-by-the-drink to incorporated cities. This will encourage the growth of the counties which have few cities or towns."

Hohnhorst in his explanation of the bill—which goes to the senate for action—said it contained these main provisions:

- 1. "Roadside" clubs outside cities and towns would be eliminated.
- 2. The state license would range from \$200 annually in cities of less than 1,000 population to \$1,250 in cities of more than 12,000.
- 3. A minimum of 200 acres licenses annually but not more than 75 per cent of the state license.
- 4. Cities could assess licenses annually but not more than 75 per cent of the state license.

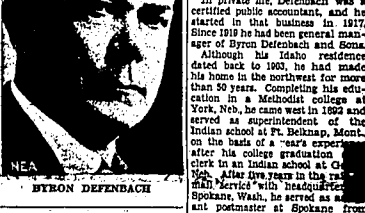

Death Claims Byron Defenbach at Boise

BOISE, Feb. 25 (AP)—Byron Defenbach, 76, the Idaho state treasurer from 1927 to 1930 and one of the state's most prominent Republicans of a by-gone era, died at his home here early this morning.

Relatives said his death was caused by a heart ailment. He had been in ill health for some time, and had been bedridden the last two weeks.

A native of Rome, Wis., born Dec. 5, 1870, Defenbach had resided in Idaho since 1903. His first residence was in the northern part of the state, and he served as mayor of Sandpoint in 1905.



He served in the state senate in 1913, was treasurer from 1927 to 1930, and was the unsuccessful Republican candidate for governor in 1932. The year that marked the advent of the new deal trends in Idaho election.

Certified Accountant In private life Defenbach was a certified public accountant, and he started in that business in 1917. Since 1918 he had been general manager of Byron Defenbach & Co., a Spokane firm.

Although he had resided in Idaho since 1903, he had made Idaho his home in the northwest for more than 30 years. Completing his education in a Midland college at Sandpoint, he had served as superintendent of the Indian school at Ft. Belknap, Mont., and as principal of the Idaho State Normal at Pocatello.

He had been a member of the Idaho State Bar, and had served as clerk in an Idaho school at Coeur d'Alene, and as principal of the Idaho State Normal at Pocatello.

Defenbach was a member of several local organizations, including a history of the state. Many Idaho newspapers had carried his weekly feature articles entitled "The State We Live In."

He was survived by his wife, Jane Adams Defenbach, Boise; twin sons, Adam Defenbach, Boise; twin daughters, John and Will, attending the University of Idaho; another son, Ralph H. Defenbach, Lewiston, and a daughter, Mrs. John N. Harston, Harston, Idaho.

Services will be held at Lewiston.

Judge to Decide If Punched Board Is Gambling Device

Whether or not Don Unangau's punchedboard is a gambling device was the decision left up to Judge J. O. Thompson at the courthouse in Boise Tuesday, when he had set for next week after the stamped justice court hearing of A. L. Kyukendall's civil charge.

This case does not involve a misdemeanor or felony but is a matter of civil law. It is the result of the destruction of the board by the state of its return to Unangau.

Kyukendall, Jerome man who claimed that the board was being used as a gambling device at Unangau's Don's Mobile Diner between 10 and 11 a. m. Feb. 7, admitted under the cross-examination of Attorney W. L. Dunn, that he hadn't seen anyone use the board or even take a single punch.

This man who brought suit alleges that the 1,000 punches on the board were to be sold—25 had been pushed out when the board was brought into court—on a "32 cents per cigarette, one punch free" basis with a \$5 cash payoff for number 13.

Only other witness called by the state was a deputy sheriff, Boyd Thielsten, who picked up the board after Kyukendall filed his complaint.

Dunn elicited the deputy's confirmation of Kyukendall's admission—Thielsten didn't see the board in use as a gambling device either.

Judge Rescinds Divorce Decree

Upon disclosing that the year-old final divorce decree which he granted Ann O. Taft on Dec. 7, 1945 "was obtained through fraud which prevented her husband from having any notice of the action," District Judge James W. Porter Monday rescinded the decree.

He ruled that Mrs. Taft had thus prevented the court "from having any jurisdiction over" Frederick A. Taft and declared her divorce "null and void." All "purported" services of summons on Taft were ordered dismissed by the judge.

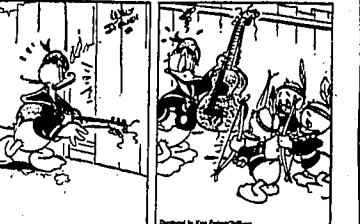

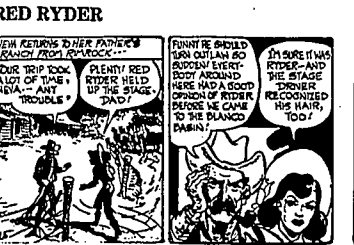

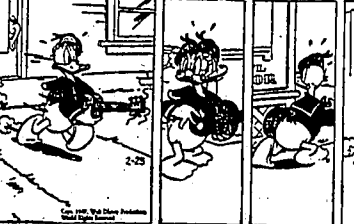

Snowfall for Hailey Light, Moisture up

HAILY, Feb. 25.—Although snowfall at Hailey is considerably under figures for the winter of 1945-46, the total precipitation in the area is greater, records of the Sawtooth forest report.
