Jap's Geishas Find Freedom Is Big Worry

TOKYO, April 30 (AP)—Japan's "liberated" geisha girls, according to reliable sources, are finding demoralization an expensive and worrisome process.

Before the surrender those night life entertainers were content with their elaborate oriental kimonos and their thickly plucked hair. Now they have to get regular permanent waves and wear western style clothes in order to please some of the customers. Sometimes they even have to rent wigs.

Job Defiant

A geisha's job, according to their official lexicon, involves pouring wine, singing, dancing and playing musical instruments at banquets, and otherwise, by their department and conversation, striving to please the customers.

If the customer happens to be blonde hair, the geisha must rent a wig at about \$10 per night. Wigs with fancy coiffures cost more.

The geisha entertainment fee is limited officially to 30 yen, or about 60 cents an hour. Most geishas say their busiest hours are between five and nine in the evening. Geishas are not to be confused with prostitutes.

Best Make Small Pay

The Nippon Times estimated recently that the best geishas in Tokyo made only about \$100 a month. A complete geisha outfit—with clothes to please both old and new customers—costs about \$400. Geishas still must depend on "sugar daddies," who are becoming increasingly hard to find.

own rules—abide by those already intended by the state and city.

2. Be sure to stop at stoplights and stop signs.

3. Never pass another vehicle on the wrong side.

4. At intersections, give the right-of-way to traffic coming from the right.

5. Do not make U-turns between intersections.

6. Always give the proper signal before turning or stopping.

7. Do not enter the lane of traffic from a parking space until the lane has cleared of all traffic.

8. Drive in single file, never abreast of other vehicles.

9. Always keep to the right.

10. Operators with night-driving permits are required to have live headlights and live taillights—not reflectors.

11. In the business district, park bicycles and two-wheeled motor vehicles in the safety zones near alleys and at the ends of blocks.

12. Never ride on the sidewalk.

13. Be courteous in your driving and a matter of simple sportsmanship always give the right-of-way to pedestrians.

14. If driving on a highway, never pass another vehicle on the crest of a hill or on a curve.

15. Before passing another vehicle, be sure the visibility is clear and that there is no oncoming traffic.
