

### Billion Dollar Annual Blaze Cost Foretold

NEW YORK, May 22 (AP)—Annual fire losses in the United States will exceed the billion dollar mark within three years if losses continue at their present increasing rate, Frank A. Christensen, president of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, said in an address before the board's annual meeting yesterday.

Christensen described the physical factors "deferred maintenance and worn out equipment," and said high losses were due to delayed alarms, poor fire protection, negligence and bad housekeeping.

The psychological factor arises out of careless and reckless habits, the speaker added.

Waste Doubled "Since 1941, national waste by fire has nearly doubled. The average home has a little more than \$300,000,000.00. In the 12 months ended April this year it was more than \$165,000,000," Christensen said.

He added that if the monthly average increase of the last year continued it would pass the billion dollar mark in April, 1950.

### Sweeley Wants Parole Revoked

A motion to revoke and terminate the parole of Wayne Koch was filed Tuesday in district court by prosecuting attorney Everett M. Sweeley on the ground that Koch has violated the terms of his parole by allegedly repeating disturbances at the scene at Twin Falls junior high school.

Koch's motion was accompanied by affidavits signed by Vera C. O'Leary, junior high school principal, and Betty French, her secretary, describing the disturbances.

Hearing on the matter was set for 10 a.m. June 3, by District Judge James W. Porter.

Koch was found guilty of first degree burglary by the court on April 23. The court ordered sentence be withheld one year and placed the youth on parole to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Koch.

### Youth Denied, Dog Receives School Honor

PITTSBURGH, May 22 (AP)—Spot, a woolly black and white dog devoted to his master, was honored in suburban Wall, Pa., as the proud owner of a grammar school diploma today.

But in another section of southwestern Pennsylvania a broken-hearted boy who wanted a diploma more than anything else in the world lay gravely wounded, because he wouldn't get one.

Jimmy Franks, 14-year-old eighth grade student, was found lying in the hallway of the Bobtown high school yesterday with a bullet in his chest and a pistol clenched in one hand.

Needed at Home Jimmy, son of a coal miner, had to drop out of school last November because his mother was critically ill and he was needed at home to take care of several young children.

A teacher, Geraldine Donley, said Jimmy, a bright boy, grieved because he wanted to enter high school and figure was his main ambition.

The hard blow fell when Jimmy was told his many absences would make it impossible for him to take the entrance examination. Yesterday was the last day of school, and the boy's hopes died.

Gun Triggers During a recess Jimmy slipped into the school auditorium—where graduations are held. It was too much for him—the gun triggered and trailing blood, he crawled out to the hallway. . . away from the site of the graduation scene he thought would never be his.

Jimmy's condition was reported "fair" at a Wayneburg hospital today.

At graduation exercises at the Wall grammar school yesterday, Spot—infirm and nearly blind—received his diploma along with his young master. Spot had attended school sessions without one tardy mark in 10 years.

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HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

The word "fan" meaning an entertainment, as for a ball game or a moving picture show, originally was exclusively a baseball term and was an abbreviation of "fanatic."

Our acceptance of several such expressions in the last 15 or 20 years has been a development that might interest a student of our morals.

Because the majority of moving picture people wrote so many letters to me, practically all gratuitously, I called them "fan mail."

Until a few years ago, "hammy" was the word for a stage or screen dramatic play. It gave way to "corny," "I can't trace 'corny' to any origin and, like "baloney," which formerly was a circus term only, and "stogie," it just moved into our current speech and writing and is a probationer for acceptance into the American language.

One old baseball term that qualified as good Americana is "boner." This is an abbreviation of "bonehead play." The first man to use this term was T. A. Dorgan, or, I think, the sport-page cartoonist of the Hearst papers who had a baseball character called Bonehead-Barry, the bush league bear.

We owe "bonehead" and "boner" to him. We gave very little space to sport stuff in the early 1900's for comparison with today's elaborate coverage and, although we did have some pretty good writers, actually most of the copy was awful.

A left-hander was and still is called a southpaw, but "portlander" is strictly newspaper and I never heard it used by ballplayers. Ring Lardner sometimes called a left-hander a cock-eye in his fiction pieces and he probably heard some ballplayer use it, because he had a fine ear for their talk.

BACK TO EUROPEAN UNION Back in the early Thirties Winston Churchill put forward the idea of a united Europe. It was an idea foreign to the thinking of its time—a time of going fascism, dawning Hitlerism, Maginot mentality, ultra-nationalism, insincerity, and appeasement. Mr. Churchill, a Tory with a vision, saw the evils and their remedy. But no one of comparable vision and authority in all Europe answered and supported him.

It took a second World War—which a strong, united Europe almost surely could have prevented—to show the true value of Mr. Churchill's remedy. Europe of 15 years ago had all the necessary ingredients of that remedy except one—wisdom. Today such important ingredients as stability, prosperity, health, and strength are gone. And there is some question whether wisdom has been gained.

A few nights ago Mr. Churchill again appealed to Europe to unite. It was an eloquent, intelligent plea which took into account all the grim realities of the present.

Mr. Churchill urged a European federation as one of the "four pillars of the temple of peace." The others, he said are the United States, the Soviet Union, and the British Commonwealth. They would support a United Nations expanded into a world super-government to prevent war.

"Are the states of Europe," Mr. Churchill asked, "continuing forever to squander the first fruits of their toil upon the erection of new barriers, military fortifications and tariff walls and passport networks against one another?"

For the most part, Europe's answer was affirmative. France, which with Britain would be the backbone of any European union, showed slight reaction. Her statesmen were too busy for comment. Most French newspapers ignored his speech.

Instead of the calm from France the voice of Charles DeGaulle, wartime hero, interim president, and now head of a new and somewhat disturbing political movement. Following Mr. Churchill by a day, M. DeGaulle made a speech in which he called for a "strong state" in France.

The former general said he meant by a strong state "what others mean in reference to themselves—for example, in Moscow and Washington—a state whose chief is a chief and in which no concentration of powers hampers or dilutes responsibility."

It is odd that M. DeGaulle should mention Washington and Moscow in the same breath—especially since he must know that in the U. S. the powers of government are delegated, though not confused, and the responsibility is divided, though not diluted.

Substitute the word "authority" for "responsibility" in the quotation above and you have a statement that might have been made by Hitler or Mussolini in the days when Mr. Churchill first proposed a united Europe.

If M. DeGaulle expresses a growing sentiment in France today, then the difficulties of adopting Mr. Churchill's plan are increased enormously. For the same reason the plan becomes even more urgently necessary.

PLAIN TALK FOR THE GERMANS The German people, like all other European belligerents of the recent war, have been hit by the blight of hunger. But the defeated Germans have been making more fuss about it than anyone else. In moods varying from whining to belligerence, they have demanded to be fed.

Now James Newman, our military governor in Hesse, has told them off in no uncertain terms. As he pointed out, ours is the first conquering army in history which has undertaken to feed a people which it has conquered. If, in return, the Germans hoard, strike and refuse to cooperate, stern measures will be taken.
