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## Billion Dollar Annual Blaze Cost Foretold

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—Annual fire losses in the United States will exceed the billion dollar mark within three years if losses continue at their present increasing rate, Frank A. Christensen, president of the National Bureau of Fire Underwriters, said in an address before the board's annual meeting yesterday.

"There are two factors arising out of post-war conditions, one physical and one that might be called psychological, which have increased the number of fires of all kinds," he declared.

**Warm Out Equipment**  
Christensen described the physical factor as "deferred maintenance and worn out equipment," and said high losses were due to delayed alarms, poor fire protection, negligence and bad housekeeping.

The psychological factor arises out of careless and reckless habits, the speaker asserted.

**Waste Doubled**  
"Since 1941, national waste by fire has nearly doubled," he said. "The figure was a little more than \$300,000,000. In the 12 months ended April this year it was more than \$615,000,000," Christensen said.

He added that if the monthly average increase of the last year continued it would pass the billion dollar mark in April, 1950.

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**BACK TO EUROPEAN UNION**

Back in the early thirties Winston Churchill put forward the idea of a united Europe. It was an idea foreign to the thinking of its time—a time of going fascism, dawning Hitlerism, Maginot mentality, ultra-nationalism, insincerity, and appeasement. Mr. Churchill, a Tory with a vision, saw the evils and their remedy. But no one of comparable vision and authority in all Europe answered and supported him.

It took a second World War—which a strong, united Europe almost surely could have prevented—to show the true value of Mr. Churchill's remedy. Europe of 15 years ago had all the necessary ingredients of that remedy except one—wisdom. Today such important ingredients as stability, prosperity, health, and strength are gone. And there is some question whether wisdom has been gained.

A few nights ago Mr. Churchill again appealed to Europe to unite. It was an eloquent, intelligent plea which took into account all the grim realities of the present.

Mr. Churchill urged a European federation as one of the "four pillars of the temple of peace." The others, he said are the United States, the Soviet Union, and the British Commonwealth. They would support a United Nations expanded into a world super-government to prevent war.

"Are the states of Europe," Mr. Churchill asked, "are they continuing to squander the first fruits of their toll upon the erection of new barriers, military fortifications and tariff walls and passport networks against one another?"

For the most part, Europe's answer was silence. France, which with Britain would be the backbone of any European union, showed slight reaction. Her statesmen were too busy for comment. Most French newspapers ignored his speech.

Instead the spotlight from France the voice of Charles DeGaulle, wartime hero, interim president, and now head of a new and somewhat disturbing political movement. Following Mr. Churchill by a day, M. DeGaulle made a speech in which he called for a "strong state" in France.

The former general said he meant by a strong state "what others mean in reference to themselves—for example, in Moscow and Washington—a state whose chief is a chief and in which no confusion of powers hampers or dilutes responsibility."

It is odd that M. DeGaulle should mention Washington and Moscow in the same breath—especially since he must know that in the U. S. the powers of government are delegated, though not confused, and the responsibility is divided, though not diluted.

Substitute the word "authority" for "responsibility" in the quotation above and you have a statement that might have been made by Hitler or Mussolini in the days when Mr. Churchill first proposed a united Europe.

If M. DeGaulle expresses a growing sentiment in France today, then the difficulties of adopting Mr. Churchill's plan are increased enormously. For the same reason the plan becomes even more urgently necessary.

**PLAIN TALK FOR THE GERMANS**

The German people, like all other European belligerents of the recent war, have been hit by the blight of hunger. But the defeated Germans have been making more fuss about it than anyone else. In modes varying from whining to belligerence, they have demanded to be fed.

Now James Newman, our military governor in Hesse, has told them off in no uncertain terms. As he pointed out, ours is the first conquering army in history which has undertaken to feed a people which it has conquered. If, in return, the Germans hoard, strike and refuse to cooperate, stern measures will be taken.

This is language they should understand. They have been overplaying the role of an innocent, betrayed people which only they believe. We shall feed them, not through love but through necessity. The sooner they realize this, accept it, and help themselves, the better it will be for all concerned.

A news dispatch from Washington says that Josef Stalin is having servant trouble, just like Mrs. Joe Snakes, U.S.A. The Soviet chieflain lacks a cook and has to take his meals with Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov and his family. The point of the dispatch is that when Stalin sits down at the table, the Molotovs make a fuss. "Joe, what will you have?" That's amusing, if true, but what interests us more is why Joe Stalin doesn't have a cook. Did the previous one just up and quit? Did some predatory neighbor entice him or her away with promise of two nights out and more pay? Or can one quit a job in "democratic" Russia?

**HOUSING PROGRAM IS FAILURE**

The government's subsidy program to aid new home construction, particularly for ex-G.I.s, was greeted just a year ago as a cure for the housing shortage. It has been a dismal failure. New home building is almost at a standstill and there are no immediate prospects for any change in the situation.

This was graphically illustrated by an item in Senator Ford's column in last week's News in which he reported that the U. S. housing expediter recently reported that the future was "conservatively below that" for the same month this year. The bureau didn't give a specific explanation of the slow down in construction except to note that building costs had gone up too far.

The figures show that subsidies are not going to build houses—some other solution will have to be found. It is our guess that nothing short of lower material and labor costs will solve it. Few persons, and veterans particularly, are in any position to pay between \$11,000 and \$12,000 for a five-room bungalow which could have been built for \$4,000 only a few short years ago. Most prospective builders wouldn't mind paying higher prices than in 1941, they expect that, but when building costs triple that's too much for the average pocketbook.

There hasn't been a dent made yet in the housing problem and building is creeping up all over the nation. We need a Henry Kaiser to get things rolling.—Minidoka County News.

**HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE**

The word "ham" meaning an enthusiastic actor, or a ball chucker, or a moving picture actor, originally was exclusively a baseball term and was an abbreviation of "hamlet." I think it first came into use, strictly as sports slang, about 1900.

Sports copy in those days was done almost entirely in the jargon of the game, and was as artificial as the stuff which today is written, but as the language of the one common live term, the commonest, it was unimpeachable and another slang word in current use, even by women, is an abbreviation of a dirty epithet which came into being in the AEF in the first world war.

Acceptance of several such expressions in the last 15 or 20 years has been a development that might interest a student of our morals. Concurrently we developed a tolerance, even an appetite, for humor dealing with depravity and for some other hilarity that is almost comical in historical comedies but can't even be referred to in a newspaper. We are pretty nice.

Because the idiots of moving picture people wrote so many letters to them, practically all gratuitously, mail came to be known as fan mail. This certainly is a belittling generalization, but it is a common one. Letters received by a common column, some of them are beautiful expressions of idealism and principle, some reveal important information and among them consistently are scholarly arguments.

The term "ham" meaning an actor whether on the stage, the screen or the radio, is an abbreviation of the common, slightly derisive name "hamlet."

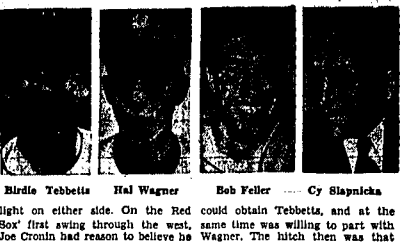
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# Feud With Detroit's Hal Newhouser Sends Birdie Tebbetts to Bosox for Wagner

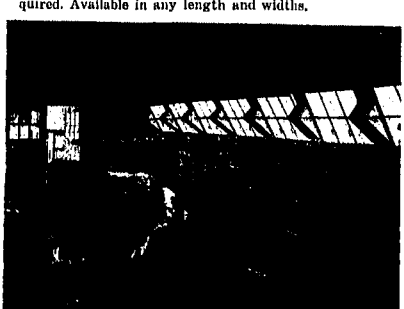

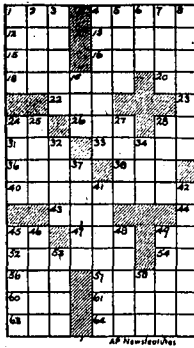
