Nation's Wholesale Food Prices Set All-Time High; Grains Pass Record for Third Straight Day

CHICAGO, Sept. 10 (UP)—Wholesale food prices throughout the nation and grain prices on the Chicago board of trade soared to new all-time highs today, and the U. S. department of commerce reported that personal incomes also had climbed to a new record. Dun and Bradstreet, Inc., reported at New York that the index of wholesale food prices rose 31 cents in the past week to \$7.02, a new all-time high. Twenty of the 31 basic food products used in compiling the figure showed sharp increases. The only price dips were in peas, raisins and rice.

September wheat futures closed at \$2.84 1/2, the Chicago board of trade and milling industry said. The wheat continues to climb. The starting wheat price of \$2.73 1/2, barely topped the previous peak of \$2.73 1/2 set yesterday. May and December wheat futures jumped the 10-cent limit in the first hour of trading. May wheat sold at \$2.80 1/2, a bushel, closing at \$2.76 1/2. December wheat went at \$2.84, a new all-time high for that contract, and closed at \$2.80 1/2.

The commerce department announced at Washington that personal income reached an unprecedented annual rate of \$197,000,000 during July. This was almost \$2,000,000,000 higher than the June rate which was the previous peak. The department said the income rise was brought about by "higher farm income, increased wage and salary receipts and a larger number of World War II veterans receiving state bonuses." The annual personal income rate for July compared with actual personal income payments of \$177,217,000,000 in 1946. Personal income means money paid out in wages and salaries, dividends and interest, the income on bonds, and the income on stocks.

Third Postwar Round of Wage Boost Demands Seen by AFL

CHICAGO, Sept. 10 (AP)—The AFL executive council hinted today that a third round of postwar wage demands could be expected if the cost of living continues to mount. Wage boosts were granted to most major unions in the first year after V-J day. Generally, they amounted to about 18 1/2 cents an hour. A second increase, ranging from 11 to 15 cents an hour, was passed on to most big unions this spring and summer.

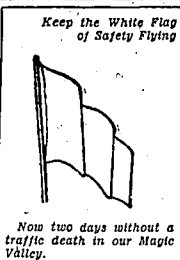

Revised Method, Research Called Need in Housing

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 10 (UP)—The United States needs a research program to determine new manufacturing methods to solve the current shortage and reduce costs, Ray Sawyer, Washington, national committee member of the American Institute for Housing, said today.

Sawyer blamed the critical U. S. housing shortage on an antiquated construction industry. Other industries, he said, have developed and progressed by new methods and new ideas but "except for a few pioneers in mass production there has been no major changes in the housing industry since 1783."

So far, he declared, "the U. S. has spent a million dollars on either one of the already known methods of mass-producing houses—by the factory or on the site—could solve the current shortage."

Sawyer, on a tour of state apartment departments, will inspect the Utah department today and tomorrow. Tomorrow, he will present a charter to the new Provo post. During his visit he will tour Hill field and Geneva.

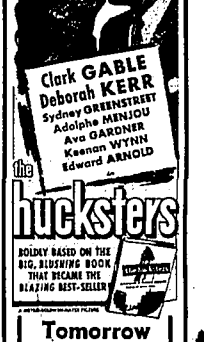
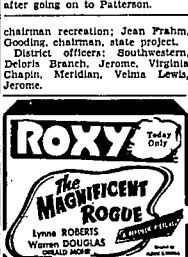

Courts Acquittal of Nazi Guard's Chief Is Flayed

NUERNBERG, Germany, Sept. 10 (UP)—War crimes attorneys said today that yesterday's acquittal of towering, scar-faced Otto Skorzeny and his seven aides on war crimes charges may well lead to a reworking of the laws of war.

A court of American colonists at Dachau ruled the giant SS (elite guard) officer—described by some Americans as "Don Quixote of war"—and his mates innocent of crimes when they infiltrated U. S. forces during the battle of the Bulge in 1944 and spread havoc while wearing American uniforms.

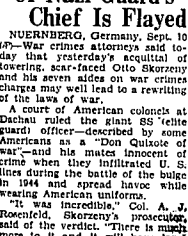
"It is a disgrace," said the U. S. prosecutor, "that Skorzeny's seven aides went free. He is an SS officer and as such, under the ruling of the international military tribunal here last year, is subject to 'mandatory arrest.'"

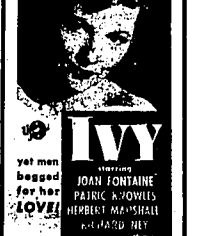

Advocates of Cooperatives To Be Heard

TWATTLE, Sept. 10 (AP)—Representatives of cooperatives and private business will testify in support of their business before a congressional committee here today and Thursday.

Rep. Walter House, R. Mo., chairman of the House small business committee, said 15 witnesses from cooperatives and 10 from private business have been called for today. The committee will hear testimony from the witnesses on the status and practices of cooperatives.

W. J. Ballinger, committee counsel, Tuesday listed four private business witnesses summoned for today. They are William H. Wood, Missoula, Mont.; Edward L. Palla, Jr., Dabman, Wash.; James Chastain, Spokane, Wash.; and George Dixon, Fargo, N. D.

The cooperative witnesses will represent 19 organizations in Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Conflict Lines Drawn

Lines of conflict were drawn today in prelude to the two-day hearing.

At a press conference, House reported "thousands of protests against cooperatives privileges had been received by the committee, and Rep. Henry M. Jackson, D. Wash., responded with a charge that most of the mail from his district on the subject was "organized," mainly by the Tax Equality league.

House asserted:

"Our task is studying a competitive pattern. Our job is to look after 1,000,000 small businessmen. The committee doesn't consider cooperatives anything but an object of study at the present time. We have not come to any conclusions."

Support Talks Given

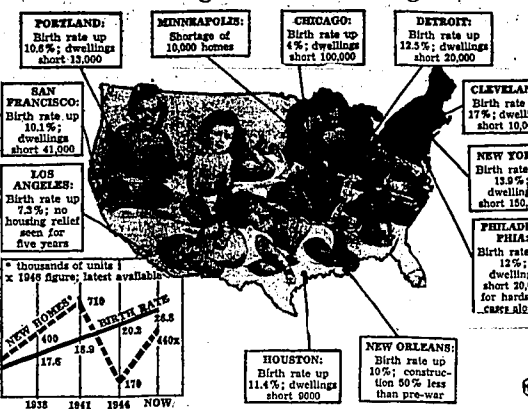
Cooperative spokesmen spoke in support of the procedures and privileges of their organizations at a luncheon gathering.

Karl Loos, Washington, D. C., chairman of the legal and tax committee of the National Union of Farmer cooperatives, declared that if the hearings "are fair, they will show the reasons for why farmer cooperatives' tax exemptions and patronage refunds."

Other speakers were Paul Blosser and Committee Counsel Ballinger who had strong critics of cooperatives in the past.

Harry B. Carroll, executive secretary of the Washington state council of farmer cooperatives, asserted that the approximately 125 farmer-owned-and-controlled cooperatives in the state are doing a bona fide business with their members and are not a threat to private business.

LAS VEGAS, Nev., Sept. 10 (AP)—Police Chief George Thompson said he has asked San Diego, Calif., authorities to hurry here to get William Kmetz, 28, arrested on bad check charges, "before he eats up the jail."

Chief Thompson explained that Kmetz swallowed a dozen small pills and the price of a cell bunk. After treatment, the prisoner was returned to jail. Shortly afterward, Thompson said, Kmetz was again in the hospital after swallowing a quantity of glass from a light fixture. Still later, Thompson added, jail officials found a noose made from a quilt on his bunk.

Kmetz remains in the hospital, but is out of danger, the chief said.

Game Officers Asked to Back Forest Group

DENVER, Sept. 10 (AP)—Fish and game officials in the United States and Canada were told "there is no need to lock up forest and grazing lands" and also that a community's natural resources often are reflected in the salaries paid its school teachers.

The current dispute between the federal forest service and livestock owners over the number of cattle and sheep that may be grazed on public lands was introduced into the session of the International Association of Game, Fish and Conservation Commissioners' convention.

"No vested rights"

Lyle F. Watts, chief of the forest service at Washington, said "grazing permits do not give vested rights to stockmen exclusively."

A Colorado fish and game department official, Gilbert N. Hunter, urged the association to throw its support to the forest service in the land control controversy.

Watts in his address commented that many discussions over public land control "have produced more heat than light."

"Separate selfish interests"

"It is time to separate personal selfish interests from consideration of problems for the long time good of America. There is no need to lock up forest and grazing lands but there can be improved through wise use."

"I am not implying that none of the public lands should be in private use. I recommend blocking out land areas for better administration by both government and private interests. Our policy should be based on conservation of natural resources of which water is the most important."

Mouse Puts Out Lights in Manila

MANILA, Sept. 10 (AP)—The lights went out last night in this capital city of more than 1,000,000 residents. Manila electric company servicemen were looking for the cause, but a mouse had wandered into a main circuit breaker and caused a short circuit.

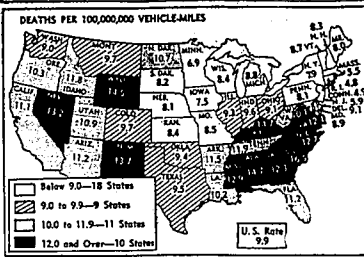
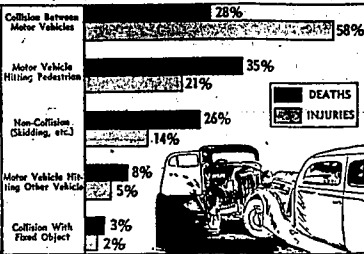

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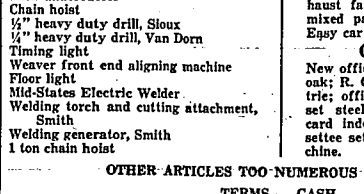

RUPERT, Sept. 10—Need for further storage facilities on Snake river was stressed in a statement presented by members of the house public lands committee in Salt Lake City by a delegation of Cassia and Minidoka county irrigators.

Progress of irrigation and reclamation practices in the river valley since the passage of the reclamation act of 1902 were included in detail in the statement and urged investigation of more storage facilities.

The delegation, representing the Minidoka North Side Extension Association, was made up of E. M. Killon, secretary, Rupert Chamber of Commerce, H. W. Moffett, Rupert chamber vice-president; A. C. DeMary, Minidoka North Side Extension association president; George V. C. Brazel, Minidoka Irrigation company president, and Don Chisholm, Burley businessman.

The statement presented the house committee pointed out that the only basis for the expenditure of government money in construction of the American Falls reservoir in 1923 was specific reference to the Minidoka north side pumping unit as the land to be reclaimed by such surplus water.

Supporters of the extension had not insisted on expansion until additional supplemental water was made available to lease but they have urged many times that the bureau investigate storage possibilities on the river to conserve the tremendous amount of water that runs to waste over Minner dam each year," the statement said.

Nation Above 143 Millions, Census Shows

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10 (AP)—The nation's population passed the 143,000,000 mark in April, the census bureau reported.

It estimated the civilian population at 142,061,000 and said there were 1,200,000 in the armed services.

The report said that in the seven-year period ending April 7, 1947, the total population increased 27,300,000. In April, the civilian population was 142,061,000, an increase of 12.7 per cent. The rural non-farm population (58,890,000) grew at an average rate, 14.2 per cent or 3,877,000.

The non-white population (18,017,000) grew faster than the white population (127,044,000).

The white rate of growth was 7.5 per cent, compared with a non-white rate of 11.8.

Because of a high birth rate, the number of children under five years old increased by 36.2 per cent. Nevertheless, the median age, or dividing line age of the population, rose from 29 to 30 years. Half the population is over 30, half younger.

The west grew faster than any other section of the country, increasing by 1,107,000 or only 27 per cent.

Dependency Dips, Utah Solon Says

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 10 (AP)—The American nation never again be as dependent on other nations for critical war materials as they were at the outset of World War II, Sen. E. B. Thomas, D., Utah, declared today on his return from a tour of Central America.

Thomas said the countries of Central America are now raising rubber, hemp and other critical materials on a large scale which gives the western hemisphere a new self-sufficiency.

Utah's senior senator plans to be in Utah for about two weeks before he returns to Washington.

The key to peace and many of the most pressing problems of the world, he opined, is international thinking. He declared that the greatest progress in the fields of health, labor and economic problems is being made by men and organizations who recognize that those problems are not respects of national boundaries.

When Mrs. Banford returned, Rita told about the call. Her mother expected a gag and checked the phone company.

It wasn't a gag, not by \$35.50 worth, said Rita's mother.

'Test' Vote Gives Win to Adherents Of Labor Curbing

ALLENTOWN, Pa., Sept. 10 (AP)—Supporters of the Taft-Hartley law today claimed their first victory at the polls in a special congressional election won decisively by a Republican candidate over a Democratic opponent of the labor measure.

Voters in Pennsylvania's eighth district yesterday gave an overwhelming majority to Franklin H. Lichtenwalter, 27, house speaker of the Republican-dominated state assembly, over Democrat Philip H. Borch, 34, CIO newspaperman who had the support of top union leaders.

The hotly-contested election held the national political spotlight because organized labor chose the district to test public sentiment on the controversial labor law. Political observers also considered it a preview of the 1948 presidential and congressional elections.

Returns from 198 of the district's 214 precincts gave Lichtenwalter 64,000, Borch 27,854.

Organized labor has waged an all-out campaign in an attempt to put Borch in congress as the successor to the late Rep. Charles L. Gerlach, Republican, who died last May while serving his fifth term.

Ring Rot Disease Threat for Idaho Killed by Seed Method

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Sept. 10—Ring rot disease, which suddenly swept into Idaho a few years ago and loomed as a serious threat to the state's big potato industry, has been successfully controlled, seed piece cutting and handling methods coming out of research by the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station, plus lightening up on seed quality, have been responsible for victory over a disease which achieved some sort of a national record for fast spread.

"Actually there is no known cure for ring rot," explains J. M. Raeder, associate plant pathologist at the agricultural experiment station. "But we haven't been trying to cure sick fields. We have been trying to prevent them. First emphasis has been on seed quality. Second emphasis is on seed cutting and handling methods that will prevent the spread of a trace of the disease should it get by the certification inspectors."

Idaho has become so hard-bitten in its campaign against ring rot that no field with even one diseased plant can get a blue tag. Field trials at the university branch experiment station at Aberdeen showed why this strict ruling was necessary.

"In our trials to determine ring rot rate of spread, we found that if seeds containing only one per cent of diseased tubers were planted you could expect the following crop to be 50 to 60 per cent diseased. When the seed infection was three to five per cent, the crop will be at least 85 per cent bad. Ring rot spreads so fast in potatoes you can't afford to gamble even with a trace of it."

Following are some of the basic points stressed in Raeder's review of practices that will keep ring rot under control:

1. Clean out seed potato storage cellars after each planting season.
2. Spray cellar floor and side walls with a copper sulphate solution—one pound to 10 gallons of water. Clean sprayer out thoroughly after use, as copper sulphate is caustic on metals.
3. When using borrowed equipment—planter or harrower—thoroughly disinfect it before using. A good strong solution of BX will kill 5,000 parts per million—will do it.
4. If you loan your equipment disinfected it thoroughly before using it.
5. In all tests comparing the picker type planter with the assisted feed type, the crop from seed planted by the former always contained more ring rot.
6. The ring rot organism does not overwinter in the soil. Hence, if growers concentrate on disease-free seed and then handle planting to prevent spread of any trace of the disease they can keep it under control in Idaho.

U. S., Soviets Far Apart on Atomic Plan

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR., AP Foreign Affairs Analyst For the second time within a year the United Nations atomic energy commission is forced to report progress. The United States, which proposes the plan and the knowledge, and Russia, whose scientists are working desperately to obtain them, are no nearer agreement.

The Russians will not agree to a control commission with authority to apply sanctions against violators except through the security council with its big power veto.

They will not agree to international control and licensing of atomic development for peaceful purposes.

They will not agree to anything until a treaty is signed outlining atomic warfare and the supply of bombs has been destroyed.

In other words, they want the U. S. to strip itself of the power to make atomic war before there is any guarantee that it will not be used against us.

Try to Rationalize Position Putting aside all talk that Russia is devoted to a communist world crusade which, when she is able, she will be willing to advance by aggressive war, observers have sought to rationalize her position on other grounds which might offer some basis for assurance.

Some attribute it to fear that Russia will be outwitted in any capitalist control arrangement, and that "monopoly" will capture the atom, thereby preventing its full development in order to protect investments in outmoded systems. Could this be a vital consideration to Russia, desperately in need of industrial development? The venality occasionally revealed by capitalism has been built by the Soviets into a great bogeyman, to be sure. And so has the fear that central licensing and management would be used by the industrial west to discriminate against the development of Russian economic competition.

But taking such things into consideration, and including the possibility that Russia hopes to fight the western powers into disrupting their economies by greater arms expenditures than they can afford, these reasons still seem insufficient.

The best bet still is that Russia is intending to prepare herself with traditional secrecy, for whatever the military future may demand, whether for defense or to further the revolution.

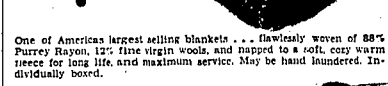
