Yet it is easy to see how an intelligent Russian, even though thoroughly indectrinated from childhood, might occas-jonally forget himself as Comrade Alexan-drov apparently did. The total remunciation and denunciation of the non-communist world must put a strain on an inquiring mind. The physical and mental isolation of the average Russian is, in theory, almost as complète as that of the average Japanese before Admiral Perry rang up the Oriental Iron curtain almost 100 years ago.

up the Oriental iron curtain aimost 100 years ago. Today's Russian is asked to believe, in effect, that thought began with Marx and life with the October Revolution of 1917. He must militantly condemn and reject all out-side political thought and aimost all foreign artistic thought and creation. Even the materialistic creations of non-communist so-clety must be admired with extreme mod-eration.

eration. The Kremlin obviously has a hard job as well as a burning ambition. While it strives to communize the world, it must also engage in the cesseless task of selling and reselling its own people on the wonders of communism. Probably the job inst made any easier by the fact that some of the boys got out and saw how the other hall lived while they were doing their trick in the army.

NO MORE AIR RACES? It has been suggested that the Cleveland air races be abandened as a speciacice whose dangers to participants and speciators alike outweight its usefulness. This year's experi-ence makes the suggestion worth considering. There were four crackups in one event at the recent Cleveland races. One fiver was killed and another badly lnjured. A third harely missed crashing into a field crowded with speciators. It was only good fortune that some of the disabled cratt did not land in the grandiand. The conventional, reciprocating - engine racing planes were souped-up models of aur-plus military alterait, so their performance proved nothing new. There may be a better excuse for the jet-plane competitions and the cross-continent races. But the mad races and stunting over a populated area and a field filled with 50,000 spectators offer an increas-ing annual heard which might sensibly be dispensed with.
