Russian Block of Italy Membership Seen as 'Blunder'

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Oct. 2 (AP)—Diplomatic experts predicted today that Russia's veto of Italy's bid for United Nations membership would badly handicap Italian communist efforts to gain greater power and prestige in that strategic Mediterranean country.

Bulgaria Says Greek Set-up 'Exaggerated'

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 2 (AP)—Bulgaria accused the United States today of deliberately exaggerating the Russian disturbance to "supply a good excuse to transform Greece into an armed camp of the United States."

The Bulgarian attack was made before the 12-nation political committee of the United Nations assembly less than 24 hours after two important developments affecting relations between the United States and Bulgaria.

These were the granting of full diplomatic recognition to the Communist-dominated Bulgarian government by the United States and the announcement of a new treaty by the United States and Britain to bar Bulgaria from membership in the United Nations.

Bulgarian Representative Dr. Stoyanov, giving his country's reasons for charges of aggression against Greece, said the United States for alleged plans to dominate the entire Balkan peninsula and the Mediterranean area and that the United States was being used as a cloak for such plans.

Army to Hold Storage Units In California

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—The army disclosed today that it expects to continue to use its California supply depots for at least three to five years to handle food and other "quick moving" items.

An army department public relations officer told a reporter the general staff has decided against the establishment of a central supply depot for the Pacific coast area because of conservation and freight costs.

Four Are Established
Central depots to handle purchase and shipment of engineering, ordnance, quartermaster, signal, medical and other supplies for other general areas are operated at Atlanta, San Antonio, Columbus, O., and Schenectady, N. Y.

The army originally planned to establish such a supply center for the Pacific coast and Rocky mountain areas at its Ogden, Utah, depot.

The army spokesman said a monthly rate study disclosed that it would cost \$300,000 to \$400,000 a month extra to buy food, largely in California, ship it to California depots, store, and then ship most of it back to California to supply current needs.

Seemed "Silly Waste"
The spokesman said that this seemed "silly and a waste of money," and a search was made of the Pacific coast for an advantageous location.

As it stands now, the army will keep its central stock records for the Pacific area at Ogden, which also will be a general supply center for "slow moving" items. The other depots in the western area will continue to perform their present functions.

World Treaty on Radio Operations Will Be Signed

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 1 (AP)—One of the most important meetings ever held—the international telecommunications conference drew to a close at Atlantic City today as 78 nations prepared to sign a new treaty to regulate world radio operations.

Charles R. Denny, chairman of the federal communications commission and head of the United States delegation, said the treaty would be signed at 2 p. m., Thursday.

Denny, who was elected chairman of the conference, said the success of the meeting "insures the orderly use and the maximum growth of communications throughout the world."

Some 600 communications experts and government officials from most of the nations of the world sat through three separate conferences, which were begun last May 15.

The conferences were called to rewrite a 200-page book of technical regulations approved at Madrid in 1929 and revised at Cairo in 1929. Earlier meetings were delayed by the war.

Greater Speed For Irrigation Plans Desired

COLUMBIA DAM, Wash., Oct. 1 (AP)—The chairman of the house committee on interior department appropriations called today for faster development of irrigation projects for veterans and heard a report that 300 families have left the Columbia basin project because of appropriation cutbacks.

Rep. Ben F. Jensen, R., Ia., said "I am sure I speak for the majority of the committee when I say that not enough emphasis is being placed upon irrigation development and the veterans' use of the land. We want this work to get underway as fast as possible."

Touring the Columbia basin project with Rep. Iver D. Fenton, R., Pa., and Rep. George E. Schwab, R., Okla., chairman Jensen added that "it is a question of how much money we have to spend, and we want to spend it where it will do the most good and get fastest possible development."

H. A. Packer, supervising engineer of the project, replied when asked by Jensen why development was limited that the original program had been slowed down by appropriations cut.

Joseph Brown, head of the Carpenters' union Columbia dam, said a cutback affecting force account personnel had shut off the wages of 1,000 families. One-third of them, Brown said, already had left the area.

Boost in Prices Cancels Out \$4. CARE Parcels

Although curtailment of certain \$4 packages from the Cooperative for Remittances to Europe has been necessitated by steadily rising prices, \$10 CARE packages may still be sent and application blanks for them are available at the Twin Falls American Red Cross office, according to Executive Secretary Helen Ballew.

According to word from Paul Comly French, executive director of CARE in New York City, \$4 flour and \$4 yard packages have been discontinued because of price increases. Orders for \$4 packages not marked later than Sept. 15 will be returned.

"It is with great reluctance that I make this announcement," French said, "when flour and fats are urgently needed in Europe. Both of these items, however, are included in CARE's standard food package. Meats, sugar, milk, eggs and other staples are also included in this 22-pound package, designed to help feed a family of four for a month."

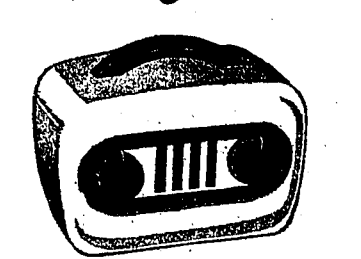

Many Angles To Denial for Solons' Tour

Circumstances surrounding the Russian refusal of entry visas to a group of senators and a representative of the state department indicate a situation which is just as well to take a deep breath before becoming too indignant.

In its old days a demonstration of ill will by one nation toward dignitaries of another could very easily have led to a break in diplomatic relations. That was before names calling and "nerve wars" became a recognized part of diplomatic procedure.

The rudeness of the Russian action in denying entry to an American party which said it wished to visit our Moscow embassy on official business is understandable whether it represents any bias or whether it represents a propaganda ploy in the propaganda conflict between the two countries. It is to be doubted.

Reasons for Trip
The members of the senate appropriations committee are going to Europe for the purpose of surveying the economic situation with regard to what this country must spend to help. Studying the operation of embassies, which they said they wished to do in Moscow, has never been a routine part of the committee's operations although conceivably it is in the purview of inquiry into state department practice also indicate strongly that the attachment of the Russian Secretary of State to the party is far more as a sort of guide for the senators than in the nature of official document business.

The strong inference, then, is that the official party will undoubtedly be headed for the American embassy, actually wanted to go to Russia to inspect business and industry as furnished. To Americans that seems like a normal procedure and nothing to which a nation with a clear conscience could object. But conscience or no conscience, the Russians never have liked to be surveyed by foreigners. It's an attitude that goes back far before the Bolsheviks, although the latter do seem to make a particular fetish of it. It's an attitude common to more than the area of the world, is now considered rather aboriginal, but is still strong in many so-called civilized areas.

Highly Confused
Diplomats in this country are highly confused over what Russia expects to gain by her ever-increasing displays of ill-temper. Some think she is venting her rage over her frustration in losing relations while at the same time trying to offend by the overbearing attitude of home to keep the noses of the Russian people to the ground. Others believe that the Russian preparations. A better view seems to be that a lot of the talk and chest thumping is directed attention from consideration in the United Nations of actual Russian activities in Greece, Korea and other trouble spots. Commercial Dairy Course at U. of I.

A short course in practical commercial dairying will be offered by the University of Idaho beginning Nov. 4 and lasting until April 4, according to an announcement by D. L. Fourn, head of the department of dairy husbandry at the university.

The course, offered annually prior to 1943 when it was discontinued because of wartime circumstances, will be open to all Idaho students who are beginning dairymaking, and that living conditions in Moscow are definitely crowded and that housing accommodations for only eight or 10 single students is available.

Face Change Found Aid to Ex-Prisoners

By CLARE COX
CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (AP)—One in four carried a new face and the way he looked as he came out of change as much as the way in which the international college of surgeons was told today.

Dr. John W. Fick, Chicago surgeon and teacher at the University of Illinois medical school, told the surgeons of the results obtained in 700 cases involving inmates of the Stateville, Ill., penitentiary. In these cases plastic surgery was used to alter a physical deformity which quirk of appearance which made the convict conscious that he did not look like other men, Fick said.

Excellent Results
"The psychological result," he said, "has been better than most outstanding feature and gain."

"The 700 cases which he discussed in particular were those who had been out of prison for three years or more. Of these, he said, only three had returned to jail. The usual rate is about one in five or better.

Pick began his work of giving cosmetic faces to those who had facial features 10 years ago at the request of prison officials.

Most of those faces which he was called upon to correct, he said, were those of the nose, ears and skin.

Prison Officials Cited Cases
Prison officials called his attention to the fact that many inmates of the prison were locked down by others because of their physical defects.

Some of those who fell they were scorned by their fellows blamed their turning to a criminal career on the fact that they looked not the same as other people; that their noses were out of line, their ears not the same, or their skin scarred or misshapen.

LEWISTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Empire air lines stands to gain \$176,000 in retroactive pay through new temporary rates on transportation of mail by feeder air lines, T. E. Robinson, Empire's general manager, said here.

Under the new decision, the pay will be 60 cents per airplane mile for the first six months of operation, 55 cents for the next three months, and on a sliding scale downward by 5 cents for every quarter back to 35 cents, or until the permanent rate is set by the board.

FOCALTELEO, Oct. 2 (AP)—The western states predatory animal control conference closed today with demonstrations on the use of airplanes in combating coyotes.

Richard Bonelli's American baritone, appeared before a capacity audience in the high school auditorium Wednesday night, opening the 1947 Twin Falls Town Hall series. The audience especially enjoyed Bonelli's handling of the Rossini number in which the cocky figure enumerates his many talents and accomplishments.

The stately Handel selection "Where'er You Walk," from "Demetrius" opened the program in contrast were Bonelli's second group of songs which were picked from the more modern compositions of Debussy, Orffice and the American Ernest Chazler.

Only Few of 'State' Ships Roving Seas

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Only a handful of state names, as represented by American battleships, can be found on the open seas today.

At one time or another between 1941 and 1945, more than a score of state-named vessels carried on the war against Germany and Japan. Of those, but four, the latest and most modern type, remain in active service with the postwar navy.

They are the Missouri—on whose deck Japan formally surrendered and which lately brought President Truman home from Rio de Janeiro; the New Jersey, the Iowa, and the Wisconsin.

Two others, the Indiana and the Massachusetts are still in service, but are held in reserve.

The remaining battleships which were in commission at the outbreak of the last war or were commissioned during the conflict, either are out of commission in reserve, decommissioned, slated for scrap, or have been scrapped.

Bear State Names

Under statute, all naval vessels of battleship designation must bear state names. Records show that at one time or another, all states have been so honored.

On the roster of state-named ships that saw service during the war was the Idaho, 33,000 tons, carrying 12 14-inch guns, which was commissioned during the first World War. The ship now is at Norfolk, Va., offered for sale as scrap.

The old Utah, converted into a target ship, was sunk in the Jap attack on Pearl Harbor; she was raised but was stricken from navy lists in 1944.

Unripe Fruit Believed One Cause of Polio

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 2 (AP)—A Syracuse pediatrician, Dr. Ralph R. Scobey, who firmly believes cyanide poisoning causes infantile paralysis, has put his finger on unripe fruit, among other things, as a source of the dread disease.

Dr. Scobey's beliefs are published in a series of articles in the archives of Pediatrics, a monthly publication. He makes a double-barreled claim:

1. It never has been proved that the "virus" of poliomyelitis can cause that disease in human beings.
2. It has been proved that polio can be caused by cyanide poisoning.

His idea of how infantile paralysis is caused departs radically from recognized polio research. He says that cyanide not only can produce paralysis in human beings and animals but that it results in a chemical imbalance in the body that may have lasting results. The functions of the thyroid gland and the liver are disturbed, Dr. Scobey says. He adds that polio is only one of a group of diseases caused by cyanide poisoning. In this group, he lists gutta and paralysis shellfish disease. He says it is possible that rheumatic fever also results from cyanide poisoning.

"I do not think," Dr. Scobey says, "that a micro-organism exists that can be associated with poliomyelitis as it affects human beings. The so-called virus of poliomyelitis is doubtless a by-product of the cyanide poisoning. This is probably a leucocaine or enzyme, which when injected into experimental animals can produce or accelerate the production of cyanide in the body and thus produce a disease similar to that resulting in humans from cyanide."

Hollywood Called Wrong Place for Rearing of Child

TORONTO, Oct. 2 (AP)—The suspicion of Hollywood, Oct. 2, over Hollywood as a place to bring up children was asserted today by Mark T. McKee, 60-year-old United States airlines executive defending his custody of his 7-year-old son Terry, against a suit brought by his divorced wife, Mrs. Evelyn McKee of Los Angeles.

Asked by his counsel, George Loehnd, about his attitude toward the boy, now living at McKee's Linwood farm, McKee said:

"I want him to grow up into the kind of a lad that's straightforward, honest, who knows what work is. At the farm Terry is learning to work. I don't want him to grow up to be a playboy, under the Hollywood influence."

During his testimony McKee said the final break between him and Mrs. McKee occurred after he returned home in August, 1941, and found in my closet a perfume bottle belonging to a Peruvian gentleman who had been occupying my bedroom and my bed with my wife and my baby.

Later, Mrs. McKee, whom McKee divorced in 1942, was named co-defendant in a divorce suit brought against Max De La Guentia, Peruvian consul at Los Angeles.

MOSEBOW, Oct. 2 (AP)—First election of officers for Vandal Boosters, Inc., the statewide organization behind the reviving of athletics at the University of Idaho, has put J. B. Halflinger, Kellogg, general manager of the Bunker Hill, in as president.

As a result of this election the Idaho-WBC football game will not be the only contest in Moscow Saturday. The nine newly elected directors of the organization will meet to decide a tie vote for the vice-presidency.

Tied for this office were W. B. Hawkins, Coeur d'Alene attorney and former president of the university alumni association, and Ed Klaffner, Boise sporting goods dealer and regular Vandal halfback in 1922-24. Guy Wicks, field agent for the university, was named secretary-treasurer.

The directors, picked by the 47 incorporators of Vandal Boosters, will hold their first meeting here on Homecoming day.

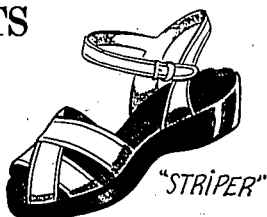
