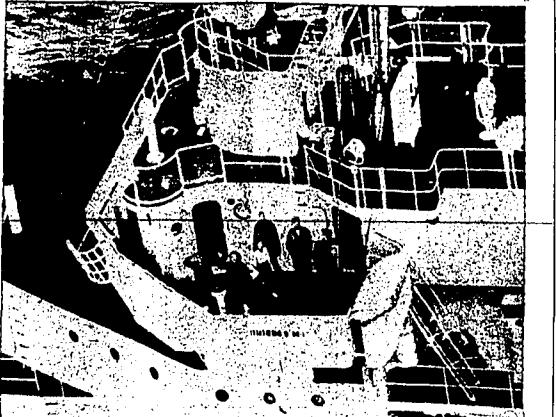

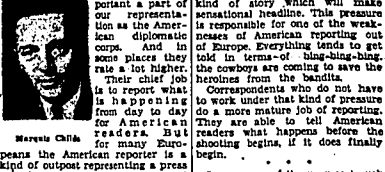

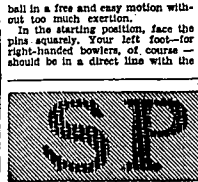

His brother Gilbert, C. P. X., died Sunday from a cerebral hemorrhage while kneeling in his new during services at St. John's academy, Roman Catholic boys' high school where he had been superior for nine years.

In New York, Ruth said "his death comes as a great personal shock. It deprives America and the young kids of a great man."

It was back in 1914 when Brother Gilbert, interested in athletics and boys, took time off from his baseball coaching at Mount St. Joseph's college in Baltimore, Md., to look over a couple of proteges at nearby St. Mary's industrial school.

Standing near the sidelines, Brother Gilbert spotted a gangling, left-handed catcher with a great throwing arm. The kid looked awkward, catching in only a pair of blue overalls and a mask.

"Gosh," I said to myself, "that's a great left handed pitcher they got catching in there."

That was the first time Brother Gilbert saw George Herman Ruth, who went on to become baseball's greatest home run hitter.

On the strength of the 19-year-old's performance that afternoon, Brother Gilbert took him to his friend, Manager Jack Dunn of the Baltimore Orioles of the International league. The world knows the rest of the story.

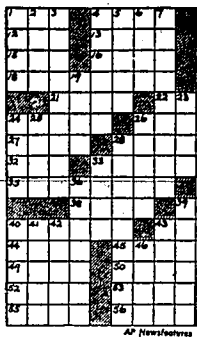

High Pay for Farms' Labor Fails to Lure

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The highest farm wages in the nation have failed to lure many workers back to the orchards and farms of the west.

The agriculture department found that the average wage paid on farms in the Rocky mountain states and eight per cent more in the Pacific states on Oct. 1, this year than last but it added that, in Idaho, schools and even towns have declared holidays, as in wartime, to help with the late sugar beet harvest.

500,000 in Booklets
The department, making public a study of farm labor conditions as of Oct. 1, said there were 506,000 agricultural workers in the mountain states, compared with 454,000 on the same date last year and that there were 678,000 in the Pacific coast states, compared with 654,000.

The number of family workers increased in the mountain states from 205,000 to 210,000 but in the coast states dropped from 307,000 to 291,000.

Number is Larger
The number of hired workers was larger than a year ago in both areas. In the mountain states, compared to 159,000; coast 387,000 compared with 357,000.

While farm wage rates in the mountain states were \$127 a month with board, and \$131 a month with board in the coast states, the report indicates that the attraction of factory wages and city life is still holding many former agricultural workers who went into war industries or into the services a few years ago.

The national average farm wage is \$27.80.

Mrs. Mary H. Ward, Palm Springs, Cal., national president of the organization, said if the rest of the were agreeable, the bodies of the luckless 98 will be placed in a special cemetery and a monument erected.

The 98 workers were among the 1,200 civilian workers on Wake captured shortly after Pearl Harbor in 1941. They were kept on the island to work for the Japanese and were

executed Oct. 7, 1942.

The 1947 national convention of the Workers of Wake will be held Dec. 3-7 in Reno, Nev. The 1945 and 1946 meetings were held in Boise.

Mrs. Ward told Idaho members of the group Sunday that hearings have been completed and plans made to introduce a bill in the next session of congress to force Japan to make reparations for the death and mistreatment of the civilian construction workers.
