

# Officials Couldn't Know of Deals, Pauley Declares

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—E. W. Pauley testified that neither President Truman nor Secretary of Agriculture Anderson could have known when they criticized speculators that Pauley was operating on the commodities market.

Pauley, a special assistant to Secretary of the Army, Royal, made the statement before a senate appropriations committee as he testified he is \$100,000 "worth off" because he started selling his holdings in commodity futures after taking over the post last Sept. 8.

Mr. Truman in a radio address Oct. 6 criticized the "greed of speculators who gamble on what may lie ahead in our commodity markets." Later, laying his 10-point anti-inflation program before congress, the President asked legislation to regulate speculative trading on the exchanges.

Pauley testified he held "more than a million dollars' worth of commodities when he took the army post."

In a statement to the committee he said that he had liquidated approximately 90 per cent of those commodities, reducing the amount of grain from 500,000 bushels to approximately 50,000 bushels.

Pauley testified he had "traded this year."

In a statement under questioning by Senator Ferguson, R. Mich., that President Truman could have "conceivably known of Pauley's activities on Oct. 6 when Mr. Truman declared that the cost of living must not be 'foolishly kicked around' by speculators in the market."

He Prepared Report

Reading a brief prepared statement to the senate appropriations committee, Pauley testified that he had prepared a report on the commodities market in Idaho.

# Petition Filed To Gain Test On Drink Act

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—A petition for a writ of prohibition was filed in the Idaho supreme court yesterday against the issuance of any license for sale of liquor by the drink and challenged the constitutionality of the law which became effective July 1.

G. Stauch, prosecuting attorney of Bear Lake county, asked that the action not only apply to Bear Lake county but to all counties in the state.

Petitioners named in the case filed by R. A. McDevitt, Pocatello attorney, were Robert O. Lewis, state law enforcement commissioner, and Robert E. Smiley, attorney general.

In the action McDevitt charged: "Business establishments within the city limits of incorporated villages and cities lost their business."

"The act forbids women bartenders... and by the act they can not procure the jobs they are trained in."

"There is no provision in the law for the return of the license to the licensee in the event the statute should be declared unconstitutional."

The title of the act is "Prohibitive and Insufficient and violates provisions of the constitution of the state of Idaho."

Under Idaho law the earliest date the case can be heard by the supreme court is Dec. 22.

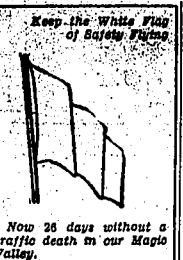

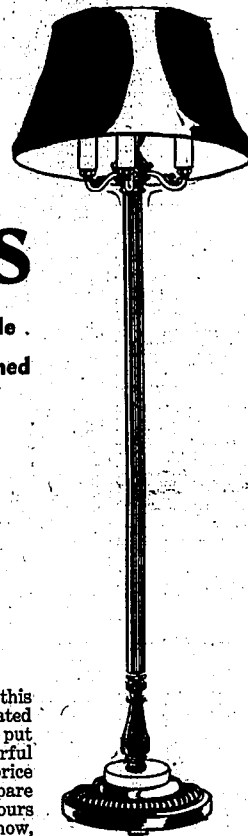

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Edwin C. Tucker, chairman of the House Committee on Appropriations, admitted that he made a major mistake in his presidential report setting forth this country's capacity to supply aid to Europe and also to supply domestic needs.

Constitutional awareness of his error is long behind the sharp criticism which congress is giving the long-range program. Tucker's report, known as the Truman anti-inflation program, Dr. Tucker is the chief executive's top economic adviser. He is in charge of the agency which was created by the employment act of 1946. Although Tucker has been a witness before the House, W. Averell Harriman for congressional hearings on the President's remedies for high prices, he has refused to appear.

In view of his admitted error, he may be subpoenaed, despite congressional reluctance to adopt such extreme methods.

TOOLS—Dr. Tucker was checked up by A. W. Tucker, president of the Tool Owners union, with headquarters in Seattle, Wash. Tucker's contention that this nation's supply of private tools—the instruments which produce the machines that are essential to the production of goods—was smaller than it was in 1930, due to failure to replenish them during the depression and the war.

But it (our postwar grants to Europe of approximately \$10 billion) is not to be viewed as the tremendous increase in American productive capacity during and since the war, prevented the American economy from prospering based on high wages and increasing output.

DATA—On Nov. 3, Tucker wrote to Dr. Tucker, asking him to furnish the data on which he based his statement that there had been a "tremendous increase in American productive capacity during and since the war." On Nov. 7, Chairman Tucker replied: "The phrase which you understood was a somewhat unfortunate one in a particular context, and I am sure you will understand it in the light of the fact that we do not have, and we do not think it would be desirable to have, such an increase."

CAPACITY—Now, as all practical industrialists, who Dr. Tucker is, know is that there is a tremendous difference between "production" and "productive capacity." There is scant hope of any dollar repayment under the Marshall plan. But the American people can replace dollars, though the task will not be an easy one, by replacing natural resources that are given as part of the European aid program.

And suggestion that this country be compensated for the loss of natural resources will probably raise a cry of "Uncle Shlyok" in some quarters. But it is safe to assume that the criticism would come from responsible quarters. At least it shouldn't. For just as it is freely admitted that the American people are going to help Europe because of enlightened self-interest, as well as compassion, it should also be admitted that Europe's indebtedness to us depends on our ability and willingness to help.

If the ERP cannot be put on a business basis, it can at least be put on a realistic one. We hear less talk today about America's debt to England for standing alone in the present war than we do about the debt we owe if it never were heard again. The English did stand alone—for which eternal praise to them—but they did it to defend their country and its institutions, their families and themselves. They didn't fight with their backs to the wall, as it were, in a continental America unscathed, even though that was one fortunate result of their brave stand.

This country was lucky, but so were its allies. Without full production, unhampered by bombings, the strengthening bloodstream of aid to Europe would have dried up. Victory might have been lost. America contributed much of her natural wealth to that bloodstream, and she continues to do so today. Too great depletion of that wealth can seriously delay Europe's recovery.

American citizens and their government can be humanitarian in their decisions. It is to the free world's advantage that we look to our own future strength, even as we give of our present strength to assist others.

FUNDAMENTAL DEFICIENCIES

The Arab government's defiance of the U. N. decision on Palestine is indefensible, but it is not without precedent. They can cite the mighty Soviet union's several boycotts, notably that of the "Little Assembly." It can point to the mutual assistance treaty between Yugoslavia and Bulgaria, signed the day before the Palestine decision, and to the fact that both parties agree to bar the duly-constituted U. N. Balkan commission from their territories.

All this makes even more glaring two great shortcomings of the U. N. There is no real code of law to guide its organization, and there is no means of enforcing its decisions. These shortcomings, unfortunately, are very real. And the U. N.'s future is not secure until they are corrected.

### British-Soviet Trade Pact Is Barter Accord

By J. M. BARNETT, JR., AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

Preliminary reports on the new agreement between Britain and Russia indicate that it is largely a barter arrangement, one which will give a little to both sides who are fighting a hard living standard.

It is difficult to avoid the feeling that any deal Russia is willing to make with the western powers is one in which they will have to go through the nose or which the reds calculate will weaken Anglo-American cooperation.

In this case, however, some discomfort will be largest if it will be a people who have been suffering for their lives and their economic existence for eight long years. A little increase in the bread ration in Russian grain makes it possible, might go a long way toward keeping up British morale until the tide turns.

**Black Market**

The announcement that Britain will trade steel, electrical and engineering equipment for wheat and timber from Russia comes simultaneously with London reports of an increasingly serious black market situation among people who have clung to that particular field, more characteristic than any others in the world. Only the extreme exhortation would cause them to turn to black market.

This new turn in Britain's situation, although it probably will prove to be only a minor thing in the general picture, is added to other signs that the curve of her economic recovery is turning upward. There has been a different slant where there have been since coal production took a decided upward turn in October, after it already had risen in the first eight months of the year. It is now 10 percent higher than a year ago. Production now is about 100,000 tons a week above minimum requirements.

**Improvement**

There has been an improvement in textile production, which has been the only manufacturing industry still behind prewar levels. Textiles continued at a record high.

A normal balance in agriculture production will be one of the coming year. The wartime emphasis on production for human consumption resulted in a drastic livestock cut. The weekly meat production last summer was just about half of 1938. Small amounts of them, that some people will buy a bottle of 40-cent wine for \$1 with the understanding that a meat will be delivered on the side.

But in general Britain's outlook seems brighter than it did last summer. There is hardly any hope that she will ever regain her former economic position. The measures tend more and more to insulate her position. But as America's greatest ally in an increasingly tough world, any improvement in her economic health is of primary importance.



### Vets Move to Beat Deadline On Insurance

Washington, Dec. 11.—The deadline for reinstating national service life insurance without a physical examination is less than three months. As the deadline nears, many veterans are rushing to get their service insurance back in force. The Department of Veterans Affairs administration, congressional representatives, said Friday.

After Dec. 31, a physical examination will be required to reinstate GI insurance if it has lapsed 90 days or more. At present time, term insurance may be reinstated without a physical examination with the payment of two monthly premiums, Duvall said.

He pointed out that in November 230 Idaho veterans reinstated insurance with a face value of \$1,250,000 while in the four Pacific northwest states and Alaska, 2,640 veterans reinstated \$10,000,000 in policies.

The veterans administration emphasizes that GI insurance is a special benefit available only to World War II veterans and offers the best and lowest cost protection. Veterans who have dropped their insurance are urged to call at the Twin Falls office, Duvall added.

### Editor Tells of High Life While Student

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—The editor of *Walden*, describing his life as Prince of Wales in an autobiographical article, said today that he had university during his student days there "tailed to break down the resistance to learning that was the legacy of my unbookish ancestors."

"It is a little discouraging to realize how little I learned," he wrote in the second of a series of his youth published in *Life* magazine. "That the fault does not lie with Oxford."

"In retrospect it seems a pity that I did not have the imagination to realize that in those difficult studies which I treated so cavalierly were the keys to many of the problems that beset the present world."

The duke said "it would be wrong to give Oxford credit for having made me too drunk" but "all the same, it certainly furnished me with opportunities for 'entertainment' beyond the art on myself, as well as for observing the dubious programs and occasional disasters of others."

He described parties climaxed by bonfires "fed with furniture tossed out of the windows" and "regimental dinners" which "dissipated" and "displeased" and "brought down" the ceremonial assemblage of glasses against the fireplace, and, eventually, the carrying out of those who could no longer walk by those who thought they could.

However, he commented "it is characteristic of the British that the ball-crashing side, in moments of remembrance, momentarily overflows." He described "the drudgery which I always associated with study."

The duke drew on his diary notes to describe fully ceremonial occasions in which he participated, including the funeral services for his grandfather, King Edward VII, the coronation of his mother and father, King George V, and the wedding of his own invention as Prince of Wales.

### Canada Will Backup Gold Next 3 Years

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—The Canadian government announced a new plan last night to subsidize gold production for the next three years in order to build up its depleted gold reserves as a means of paying for more imports.

The Finance Minister Douglas Abbott made the announcement in the House of Commons.

Under the new system, as Abbott outlined, the government will pay half the amount by which a mine's current cost of production tops \$18 a ounce. The balance will be paid back on each fine ounce produced in excess of two-thirds of the output for that year.

Both the United States and Canada buy Canadian gold at a fixed price of \$35 an ounce. The fixed price limits profit when production costs run to more than \$18 an ounce.

In Washington, the monetary fund issued a statement expressing approval of Canada's new subsidy plan, but saying the fund would not necessarily approve similar gold policies which might "undermine or threaten to undermine" monetary stability.

### New Pullmans Permit Sleeping

CHICAGO, Dec. 10.—The post-war definite coach is appearing on the Pullman-Standard had provided the new coaches with individual spot-type lights for each seat. The fixtures throw a cone of light about 30 inches in diameter at the reading level. As they are individually controlled and focused, the light from one seat will not disturb the passenger in the adjacent seat if he wishes to sleep.

The day-nite coach, a postwar innovation of Pullman-Standard Co. Manufacturing company, is being featured on four of the nation's steamlines—the Great Northern, Northern Builders, the Illinois Central's City of New Orleans, the Rock Island's Golden State limited, and the Northern Pacific's crack train.

Seating 48 passengers, instead of the usual 60, the day-nite coach has been designed with seats farther apart. That means seats can have an extra degree of recline, enabling travelers to assume a comfortable sleeping position. At night the passenger gets a full-length sleeping surface by pulling down from the seat ahead a large upholstered bed rest.

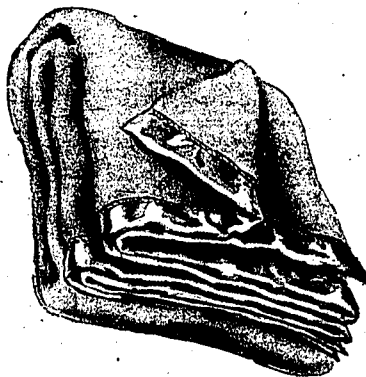
