RUPERT, Dec. 19.—Eugene Carson has been elected to the board of directors of the Minidoka County Sheriff's posse to succeed Richard Fredrickson.

During the year, according to an audit of the posse's books by Clara B. Colwell, the organization received \$20,107.74 and spent \$18,838.08. This left a balance of \$11,269.66 on hand as of Dec. 1.

Most of the money received during the year came from donations and was used for the purchase and development of a 31-acre tract for the posse.

The President recalled that at the time when the shutdown was first announced, there were "hysterical" estimates that from 50,000 to 100,000 persons would be thrown out of work.

Jet Bomber's Giant Power Awaits Tests

MOORE LAKE, Wash., Dec. 18 (AP) The thrust power of jet engines recently equivalent to 4,000 horses is ready for use today by two jet pilots testing the new Boeing X-7 at this lake.

The maiden flight of the 60-ton, swept-back wing bomber, described by Boeing and army engineers as potentially the most powerful plane in the world, brought the big ship to its full control. Washington air force base late Wednesday.

Describing the ship as a "very easy airplane to fly" after the 30-minute flying-along 140-mile flight across the Cascades from Seattle, Phil Robert Robbins said:

"We could take right off again now, as far as the plane is concerned."

Had Bad Moments

But the 31-year-old Robbins and his co-pilot, Scott Coker, 29, had their moments—bad moments—after awaiting it out during months of waiting and then waiting again for the weather to improve before the take-off from Seattle's Boeing field. They finally got away and were accompanied by three escort planes over the mountains.

"I aged more waiting an hour for the weather than I ever did before in two years," Robbins said when he climbed out of the plane here.

Here are some of the claims made for the new-type plane, one of five such jet engine bombers now being tested or about ready for tests in this country:

500 MPH's Speed

It should carry a 10,000 pound load at 500 miles an hour, or faster.

It can travel so fast that refrigeration is provided around the crew compartments, to keep it cool from air friction and resulting heat at high speeds. The cabin is pressurized and temperature-controlled.

The crew will be provided with catapult-type launchers and auxiliary wheels under the wings.
