Wallace Slates 'Rest' Before His Campaign

MILWAUKEE, Dec. 31 (UP)—Henry A. Wallace planned to go to his home in South Salem, N. Y., today for a month's rest before launching an intensive campaign to win his third term as U. S. president.

Wallace made his first address as a candidate last night. He charged that leaders in the Democratic and Republican parties were "whooping it up for a war with Russia" and outlined a seven-point program "to form a basis for world peace."

Flying Discs Labeled Main Yarn of 1947

BOISE, Dec. 31 (AP)—Flying discs, those mysterious objects which had much of Idaho and a wide portion of the remainder of the country straining skyward during most of the summer, provided the number one news story for the Gem state during 1947 in the opinion of all newspaper editors.

With the mystery of the "discs" still unsolved, the story was ranked as the top for the year by editors participating in a poll conducted by the Boise bureau of the Associated Press.

Others listed:

- Here are the others of the top 10, not necessarily ranked in order of their importance but on which there was a general agreement as to news-worthiness:
2. Nampa explosion of Nov. 15 which cost six lives and sent at least 250 persons to hospital.
3. The polio epidemic in Idaho which cost 15 lives and sent at least 250 persons to hospital.
4. The state legislature which provided year long stories through its session, including the new drink, slot machines, a school merger program and a four-year college at Pocatello while meeting numerous other controversial issues of long-standing head-on.

Howell Appointment

5. Appointment of Milton (Dixie) Howell as head coach at the University of Idaho and the "new look" in Vandal athletics.

6. The Sandpoint "gas" slaying of 11-year-old John Lavonne Plaster and subsequent sentencing to life imprisonment of Vernon Norton (Tazman) Keller, 17, and her sweetheart, Roscoe Hartley, 20, who confessed they gagged their victim with her own slacks and beat her.

7. A 67-day strike of GTO International Woodworkers of America which ended Oct. 12 after more than 8,000 workers had been affected.

8. Telephone workers' strike which paralyzed service from April 7 to May 14.

9. The long, continuing controversy involving the waters of the Snake river and efforts to control the different interests of the companies leasing water from the American falls reservoir, the bureau of reclamation and river users, actual and prospective, along a wide area of the Snake river basin.

10. Spraying of 385,000 acres of productive north Idaho timber land with DDT to end the blight by the tansy moth. The \$37,000 project was termed "highly successful" by State Forester Stanton Ready.

11. Raising right along with the top 10 was the Broadchurch trial across the border in Vale, Ore. Although detained from Oregon, it was a larger Idaho than Oregon story.

Billion Needed to Aid Europe

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31 (AP)—Six western Republican senators learned in a conference with Senator Vandenberg, R. Mich., Tuesday that the American bill for foreign expenditures outside of the Marshall plan may top \$1,000,000,000 in the year beginning July 1.

The six, who called on Vandenberg informally for a discussion of long-range European aid plans, said they were informed that Vandenberg, as chairman of the foreign relations committee, will introduce the administration's Marshall plan legislation as soon as congress convenes Jan. 8.

The group which called on Vandenberg included Senators Wherry of Nebraska, the Republican whip; Bill of Minnesota, Kefauver of California, Brooks of Illinois, Dewar of Idaho and E. V. Robertson of Wyoming.

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HOW TO SKI, No. 2: Good Boots of Primary Importance to Sport's Technique

SUN VALLEY, Dec. 31.—Before we dwell on the finer points of Alpine skiing technique, a few words in regard to the shoes of proper construction may be in order. It is a mistake to buy old boots several sizes larger than one's regular foot, thinking that half a dozen pairs of socks will take care of the loose fit. The extra wide soles, one light, the other heavier, will keep you snugly warm and at the same time assure a comfortable and yet snug enough fit.

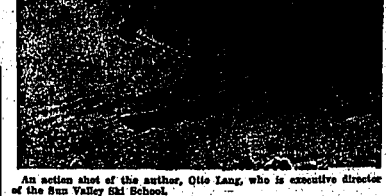
Be particular about the quality of the leather and the design of the boot. The most square-toed with metal protectors, made of either canvas or leather, and the sides are standard design—downs. After having been in use, the boots should be dried tonight and kept away from open fire, radiators, and car heaters. Apply the glue to the leather with the fingers. Ordinary shoe polish is the best preservative and should be used regularly.

Aluminum skis of good design are often made of maple, pine and other woods, hickory skis are the proven best. However, the design and construction of laminated skis has made such progress in the past few years that the use of metal is equal, if not superior, in durability.

On the inside of the boot, at the heel, the sole and the toe, you should have a "heel" or "toe" patch. A "heel" patch is a small piece of leather or rubber, about the size of a postage stamp, which is pasted on the inside of the boot, at the heel, to prevent the heel from wearing down. A "toe" patch is a small piece of leather or rubber, about the size of a postage stamp, which is pasted on the inside of the boot, at the toe, to prevent the toe from wearing down.

For proper shoeing, a pair of boots, one for the heel and the other for the toe, will give you a safe margin. The boots should be of the type that is the unit type, the sides and boots together—of important design. The modern cable binding is by far the best designed and most reliable binding for a good fit and adequate performance.

The essential clothing you will need is a pair of pants (preferably the socked-in-the-boot type) of a light weight, light-weight, and water-repellent material. A wind-breaker or parka is a wise investment, while most of the other clothing, such as sweaters, socks, etc., can be supplemented from one's regular wardrobe.
