NEW YORK, Jan. 2 (AP)—Adam was convinced he was in the most troubled period of a world history.

Many people met the advent of 1942 with a certain hope as if they were resigned already to the fact that the newborn year would inaugurate them with grief from the very cradle.

Little Prospect of Change

Well, there is little prospect that any government will be elected elsewhere, but invent a bumper path from womb to tomb. But it is odd that in America, the greatest of the world's most powerful nations, the waters and outland of normal confusion of ideas are not in the flower of the plenty, there should be such a widespread philosophy of half-dependency among the people.

Half the faces you meet nowdays in this land of spreading wealth are vague as though as they are wide, and faith in ourselves ceases to be the ebb. We are like a giant living will sneak in by night and rob the sources of our strength.

Don't Know Enemy

Perhaps this is the real explanation of the initial apathy that hangs upon people's spirits—why have the worry-worries because they don't know the real enemy who is attacking them.

The cave dweller built a fire in his doorway to keep out sabre-toothed tigers. The modern man, who doesn't know what is probing outside waiting for him, but he has a vague certainty that something is out there in the nameless night is clinging on him—something besides the milkman.

Two Consolations

Whatever the hidden cause of the national blues facing us as 1943 begins, the average American has at least two things to console him:

1. He will probably live twice as long as his great-grandfather did.
2. He is more likely to die from the unknown effects of operating than he is to be killed by an automobile or a war.

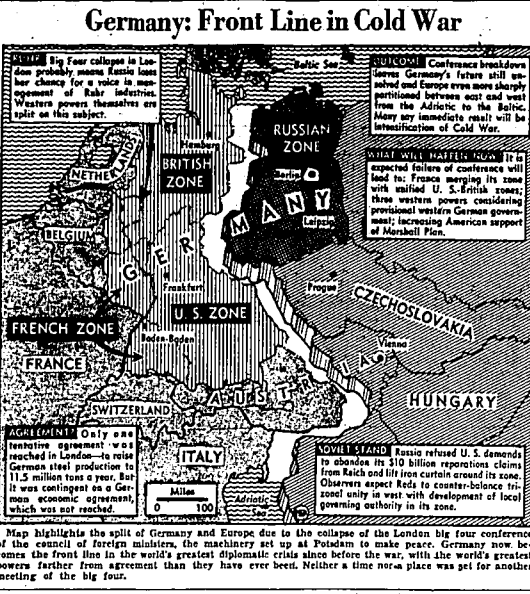
The plain truth is that now, even if the world does split in the air, ordered chaos, we never had it so easy before—and the chances were never brighter for a longer, happier existence.

**ANALYST SEES GOOD CHANCE OF WEST WIN**

Once the beginning of a new year and foreign affairs analysts do their robes of prophecy to make learned forecasts for the ensuing 12 months. Not to depart from the orthodox, here are my contributions.

As a matter of fact, prophecy isn't difficult as the uninitiated might think. I really shouldn't disclose a top-secret trade secret, but still I will tell you what to expect in '43.

**Future From Past**

And of course it's true that we must read the future from the past. The first thing we see for '43 is that the all-important item of the year will be the development of the new strained relations between the world's two dominant powers—Russia and America. The very way of life of mankind depends on the trend.

It is important phase of this conflict in '43 is likely to be the battle for western Europe. The outcome will hinge on the degree of success of the Marshall plan for rehabilitation—a program against which Moscow has declared open and bitter warfare.

**Will Give Strength**

If the Marshall plan succeeds, it will give the countries of western Europe the strength to withstand communist aggression. In short, the battle will be held along the Stalin-Adolf line which they now plan. This will mean that the dangers of another world war have been vastly lessened.

On the other hand, failure of the plan will permit the communists to sweep through to the English channel. That, in my view, would make global conflict inevitable.

**Chance Good**

As this is written the chances are good for success of the Marshall plan.

Hard-hit Italy and France—both key countries in the rehabilitation program—are picking up.

The signs read that America and Britain will have to take more decisive action to save Greece from real aggression. The fate of this ancient and liberty loving Balkan state probably will be decided this year.

### Death Claims Van Heffner; 72, Hagerman

HAGERMAN, Jan. 2 — Van A. Heffner, 72, village clerk, justice of the peace and police judge of Hagerman, died Wednesday night following a heart attack.

Heffner, a well-known Hagerman resident, suffered a heart attack in his office and was taken to the Hagerman hospital where he was pronounced dead upon arrival.

He spent a number of years in the employment of the federal government with the bureau of fisheries. In 1910 he worked in Leadville, Colo. Then in April, 1911, he was transferred to Hagerman, Idaho. He established two fish hatcheries at Trail and Grand Park, Ore. In September, 1916, and in 1921 he moved to Hagerman where he established another fish hatchery.

After being transferred to Hagerman valley in 1922 he was placed in charge of construction of a federal fish hatchery. He served as the Hagerman valley hatchery until 1929 when he retired from the fisheries service.

Born in Neola, W. Va., Dec. 15, 1870, Heffner married Lucie Bernhardt Oct. 23, 1908, at Hinton, W. Va. After teaching high school for 14 years in Idaho, he served as district school superintendent for one year in the same town. His last school position was as superintendent of Parkburg College in West Virginia. He is a member of the Moundred church and served as superintendent of the Sunday school at Salmon for 10 years.

## FOR FUTURE RECORDS

The great man has spoken. "We are never going to make records again—ever," he said. "I want you to emphasize the word 'never'."

James Caesar Petrillo was talking about the contract between his union of musicians and the recording companies, which expires Dec. 31. Some weeks ago Mr. Petrillo said that the contract would not be renewed. It was thought then that the great mogul of the music-makers was now prepared at the time Hartley law, which prevents him from having exclusive control of the millions in record royalties that the union collects.

But now Mr. Petrillo says that even if the law is repealed and the record companies increase their royalties it will do no good. The great man is good and mad. So "we" are never going to make records again.

He isn't worried about royalties, anyway. For he says he will collect on all records made in the rush to beat the deadline since he issued his ultimatum. Several years' supply of both popular and classical music is reported to have been put on wax during the rush. Mr. Petrillo estimates that its sale may bring in as much as \$10,000,000 in royalties.

We suspect that Mr. Petrillo may not be as stubborn as he seems. But if he really means no more records, he can probably make his ban stick. The recording industry is not "essential," so his musicians can't be forced to work for it.

This must give Mr. Petrillo's sense of self-importance a tremendous boost. He can make himself a big investment in his own industry and equipment. He can command considerable employment by wiping out a whole complicated line of work. He can throttle research in sound recording, just when developments in the electronics field promised some interesting improvements.

Mr. Petrillo also does some of his countrymen a dis-service in a way that his countrymen beyond his comprehension. There happen to be many people who feel that their lives would be poorer without the enjoyment of good music. Yet they cannot often hear fine records in person because their budgets are slender or because they live too far from the cities those artists visit. Recorded music fills a real need for them. Even those who have the means and opportunity for concert-going find records a special joy.

Mr. Petrillo is not a music-lover. He considers a musician about the same as another as long as both pay their dues. So if he has his way, great artists yet unknown will remain unknown to thousands of Americans, and great compositions yet unwritten will remain unheard by them. Unless those artists avoid America—where they must come to the union in order to appear with union musicians—and record elsewhere, Mr. Petrillo will have them stymied.

Against this loss will be the gain that every 9- by 12-inch club and high school get-together will have to hire live musicians if they want music.

# POT SHOTS

**WASHINGTON**—The Truman administration has presented several New York wishes to the American electorate which are expected to contribute to a Democratic landslide in 1948. Nevertheless, they are aimed to make happier millions of people, and the Truman administration is not to be denied power in such states as New England's six, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Ohio and Michigan, to mention only the most important.

# HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE
