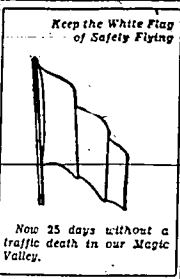

U. S., Britain Act to Merge Rulein Reich

FRANKFURT, Jan. 7 (AP)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay announced today that military government organizations in the American and British zones will be merged into a single unit, as part of a reorganization establishing a central government for western Germany.

Clay arrived in Frankfurt by train to attend a two-day conference with British and German officials during which he is expected to announce formation of a central government as the answer to the breakdown of the London foreign ministers conference.

Special Meeting
Reorganization of the British and American military governments will be worked out in a special meeting tomorrow with Gen. Sir Brian Robertson, commander of the British zone, Clay said.

He said the new organization will follow the pattern of supreme headquarters (SHAPE) established during the war by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

However, Clay said there would be no single command. He and Robertson will retain their co-equal positions, but the system of co-decision for each department and division will be abolished in favor of a single lead for each unit.

Most Posters
Officials were unanimous in predicting that most of the important jobs will go to Americans because the United States now is bearing the major share of expenses in the two zones.

All minister-presidents of the two zones were in Frankfurt to hear Clay tell them about all his plans for the future of Germany.

The central government, Clay was scheduled to tell the Germans, will be built upon the basis of the existing bi-zonal economic council and will have authority over all eight states of the two zones.

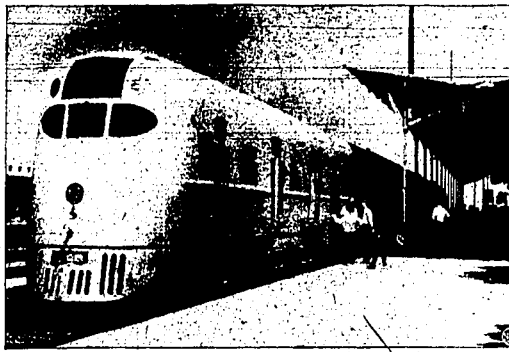

Boyle Laments Mournful Life And Tribulation of Godfathers

NEW YORK, Jan. 7 (AP)—Child guidance experts never bother to give advice to the people who need it most—godfathers.

They look on the care and feeding of ordinary children have more rules than a modern landlord's lease. But they are all written for parents—the people who have children.

You can find therein how to burp a junior, how to decide whether he has colic or a cigarette cough, or how to tell him about the stock market and who brings Santa Claus.

But a man will be able to help a junior for the slightest hint on how to get along with his godfather. This is unfair and undemocratic and discriminates against a large and little appreciated class of people.

Thought to the matter, but actually there are probably more godfathers in America than there are fathers.

Take a family of four children, for example. They all have the same godfather—unless mama took a trip to Reno along the way—but each has a different godfather, four in all.

You'd think that with the adult population simply crawling with godfathers someone would write a book for them. But no! Their duties, privileges and responsibilities are usually listed off vaguely by the proud father in this manner:

Revolt Flares In Utah CIO Mining Union

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 7 (AP)—Twice-defeated within the past five years but never thoroughly beaten, a "mass secession" move by Utah and Nevada locals of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter workers is under way again, threatening a schism which would pull the under-pinning from the Utah CIO.

Three locals—two at Bonanza, Utah, and one at Pioche, Nev.—already have broken with the 400-member district No. 2 of the IUMMSW. There were indications that a fourth local may follow suit, although McColl, Nev., local officials would not verify unconfirmed reports that McColl members had disaffiliated with the district.

Officials Claim up
Without confirming or denying that the ideological battle which long has torn the district threatened to flare anew, Utah CIO officials and available IUMMSW leaders claimed up when approached on the subject. They confessed only that there had been some conferences on "serious matters."

The long-standing ideological feud first broke into the open with the resignation of J. Frank Marble of Bonanza as district president. It broke out again several months ago when Dan Edwards, now a member of the Utah state industrial commission, scathingly denounced what he called "the communistic element in the unions."

Analyst Sees Europe Fear In Aid Action

The administration has done what it had to do in accepting Senator Vandenberg's suggestion that appropriations for the European recovery program be kept on a year-to-year basis, but it's going to take a lot of explaining in Europe.

First reaction there is bound to be a fear that United States aid is only tentative. Diplomats and business men alike will worry about basing their own long-term planning on such a commitment.

Clear explanation Needed To avoid a serious psychological reaction and at least partial reversion to the hopelessness which for two years has been a major crippling factor in western Europe—to keep the Europeans from trying once again with the idea that Russia is the most permanent power on the continent—will require a very clear explanation of our congressional processes.

It is the usual thing, when congress authorizes an important continuing project, for it to appropriate only on an annual basis as the work progresses. But to Europeans who have been accustomed to five-year, four-year and two-year plans, this may be hard to understand.

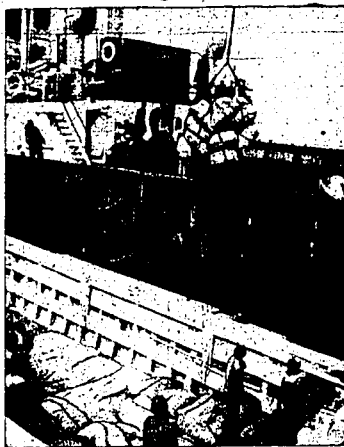
If Europe can be made to realize that one congress cannot commit future sessions to specific figures, but that the U. S. is fully determined to win the cold war, this installment business will turn out all right.

May Aid Plan By leaving the appropriations for future years to be determined in the light of events, the ERP may actually be aided. It is not inconceivable that the program will cost more than presently contemplated.

There has been a vast change in the world situation since it was believed that a big loan to Britain and some help to other countries would tide Europe over. Wonder whether Russia could be brought into collaboration with the democracies has given place to the conviction that world-wide communist conquest is her fixed aim.

The cold war still is not recognized as all by many people. Like the Europeans war of 1917, it may take some shock to convince America that the urgency of winning now is comparable to a time of military war, and worth a comparable outlay.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 7 (AP)—There are five million crippled and disabled American housewives, Dr. Howard A. Rusk of New York told the American Medical association, who can be helped by the same "miracle treatment" given crippled Ois.

He told of plans to extend this form of treatment, which he called the third phase of medicine, to the women in their homes.

23,000,000 Disabled And he said there are 23,000,000 Americans disabled or crippled who also can benefit from this new medical concept.

Ois who before the last war would have remained hopeless cripples for life are returning to work due to studies which find out what motions or strains their muscles still will stand, and then training this partial physical.

1,000,000 on Crutches Dr. Rusk said 1,000,000 of the disabled women are on crutches in wheel chairs and that household utilities can be modified so as to fit the limited reach of these and other disabled women. He said plans for treatment already are being drawn.

The benefits are not merely a rise in morale when a woman finds she can again be useful in her own home, or return to a specially picked job, Dr. Rusk said these people actually recover in some degree from their deformities or their disabilities.

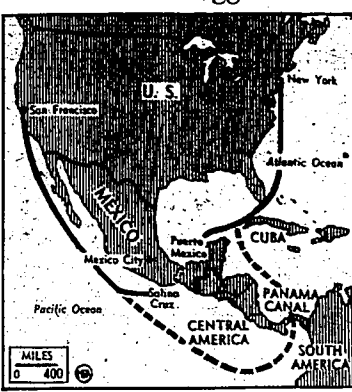
Forrestal Seeking Economy By-Pass

Power Dearth Called Threat To Northwest

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 7 (AP)—The Pacific northwest, long considered the nation's power center, faces a critical electrical shortage, a possible power famine that may drive potential industry from its doors.

That was the blunt warning contained in a prepared report submitted by the Pacific northwest utilities conference meeting here yesterday.

Group Reports
In its opening effort to obtain increased funds to bring power supply into balance with demand, the conference, representing both public and private power groups under the chairmanship of C. A. Erdahl, Tacoma commissioner of public utilities, said in the report:

"It is obvious that we are now in a position such that new large power-producing customers coming to the territory would not only jeopardize their own opportunities to continue to operate, but would also deprive present customers of power supply. Therefore, failure to provide additional generating capacity will retard development of the area."

"We don't catch up" warned the power group earlier, warning that even with rapid completion of approved federal power projects, installed capacity will not catch up

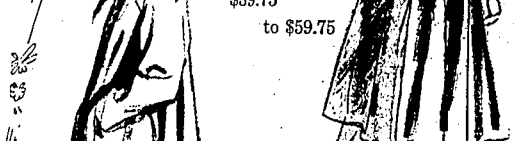

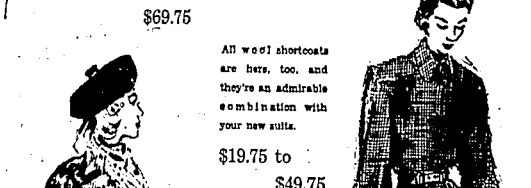

HOW TO SKI, No. 6: Famed Sun Valley Authority Tells How to Apply "Snowplow"

By OTTO LANG
International Skiing Authority
SUN VALLEY, Jan. 7 (AP)—The snowplow, besides being the fundamental basis for almost every turn which the skier makes, is also the first and most important technique to check your speed and regulate it to a certain extent.

Of course it would be ill-advised for a novice to think that a snowplow will take care of everything in any and all circumstances. It would be very dangerous, in fact, to break into a snowplow on excessive speed. On an absolutely hard-packed surface you might get away with it, but

I plead with you not to try it at high speed in deep snow.

The speed of the snowplow is the "V" shaped position which both skis are made to assume and hold the skis close together and keep them touching each other, while

the ends are spread apart. How far apart will depend upon your individual and structural physique, as it is easier for some people to fall into an absolute position, with the weight equally distributed on both skis.

In order to achieve the maximum breaking effect with the least effort, the knees must be pushed forward purposefully, as only then will it be possible to press the heels but slightly and obtain that feeling of firm control in both ankles. The upper body leans slightly forward with the feet well together and the knees well away-back.

The proper amount of edging required with the two edges between your legs seems to be the primary difficulty encountered by beginners. The more edging you get, the better as holding the skis absolutely

flat. You must have the feeling you are gently scraping the snow surface away with the inside edges of your skis.

Your knees actually control the correct amount of edging to be applied, and not your ankles, as is commonly believed. The slightest motion of the knees toward each other, or apart, will produce a multiple effect upon the position of the edges.

With a correct snowplow you should be able to descend a moderately pitched slope and keep your speed under control.

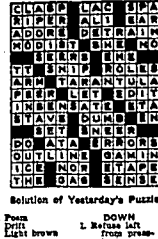

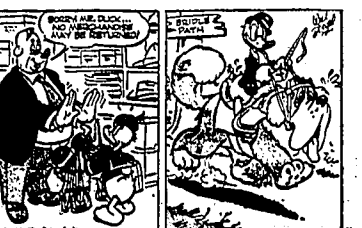

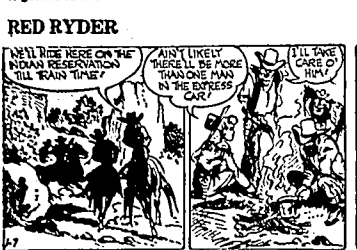

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Half of Town Gone as One Woman Dies

SUFFERN, N. V., Jan. 7 (AP)—Eighty-year-old Gracie Pitt is dead and the population of lonely, windswept Half Moon mountain in the Ramapo has been cut in half.

Gracie died Sunday in her little cabin overlooking Peaceful valley, and her frail body was brought down the mountain Monday by five men who sloged through snow drifts three to five feet deep.

She had lived alone in the rustic cabin since her husband, Albert Pitt, died about a year ago. Just twice since then had she come down the mountain to town. On those occasions she stood for an hour or two in front of a Suffern bank—a "witchy" folk; and then returned to her cabin.

Preferred Existence

Half Moon mountain's only resident now is Maggie Gannon, 72, housekeeper for Albert's brother, Gilbert, who died last May at 82. Ancestors of the Pitts and the Gannons

look up residences on the mountains in pre-revolutionary days. The two women had shrouded off all attempts to induce them to leave their isolated surroundings.

Maggie's cabin is 250 yards from the Pitt place. The five men found her in bed, snuggled under a half dozen blankets. They told her of Gracie's death.

Peers Over Blankets

"So?" she replied, peering over the blankets at them. "Ah!" seen her niece tore Christmas.

The men appealed to her to leave the mountain, now that she is alone, but she was adamant.

"You take Gracie and bury her; I'll stay in my mountains," she snapped.

Gracie's body was discovered by a former resident of the mountain who had made one of his periodic trips to see that the women were supplied with food and firewood.

Water Project At Preston Is OK'd by Krug

BOISE, Jan. 7 (AP)—A reclamation bureau recommendation for a \$453,000 Preston bench irrigation project in southeastern Idaho has been approved by Secretary of the Interior Krug. Mark R. Kulp, state reclamation engineer, said today.

Kulp said he had received a telegram from Sen. Glen H. Taylor, D., Idaho, informing him of the approval. The telegram said the bureau's report on the approval will be sent to governor of Utah, Idaho and Wyoming and Secretary of the Army Kenneth C. Royall with a request that they express their views. The project has been previously urged by Gov. C. A. Robins and water users of the Preston district.

Construction has been urged by Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Struss because of the precarious water supply situation of the Preston bench area in the Cache valley of Utah.

The structure would replace the

Preslon, Hiberdale and Mink creek canal, which serves a 4,000-acre area. Originally constructed with crude machinery and now threatened by landslides.

The new project calls for a canal 1 1/2 miles long on stable terrain. The project also includes a 1,200-foot tunnel.

In Salt Lake City the reclamation bureau's regional office said the three states are concerned because the project utilizes water of the Bear river which flows through Wyoming, Idaho and Utah.

Son of Local Woman Wins Debate Honors

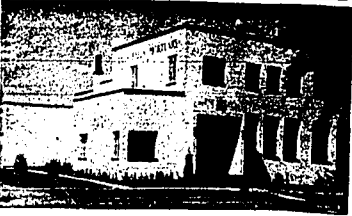
