Local Report Of Fire Week Ranks at Top

Twin Falls has received honorable mention among the cities of the report covering fire activities during "Fire Prevention Week" in October, 1947.

The mention was made by the International committee of judges appointed to review the reports submitted by towns and cities in the United States, Canada and Alaska. In all 2,427 reports were considered. Twin Falls received honorable mention along with Lewiston, the first place award in the state went to Boise and second place to Nampa, according to the committee's report.

Fire Chief E. H. Preevole Friday said this was the first report submitted to the international committee from this community. He said one will be forwarded this year. At Monday night's city council meeting Mayor H. G. Lauterbach commended Preevole for commitments received by the fire department.

"Don't Be Late in 1948," Fire Chief Urges Residents

"Don't be late in '48," Fire Chief E. H. Preevole warned Twin Falls residents Thursday.

Delay is the "villain" responsible for an appalling number of fires, he said. Preevole pointed out "it is easy to put off fire prevention measures."

He said reports from the Fire Protection Institute indicated nearly 90 per cent of last year's 800,000 fires could have been prevented or controlled with minor damage.

"Fire losses in Twin Falls can be kept to a minimum during 1948 if residents will keep two principles in mind," he said. The principles he listed are:

1. Prevent fires by cleaning out rubbish, checking electrical installation and chimneys and by using care in handling matches and cigarettes.
2. Be prepared for fire by installing and knowing how to use modern approved extinguishers and emergency fire fighting equipment.

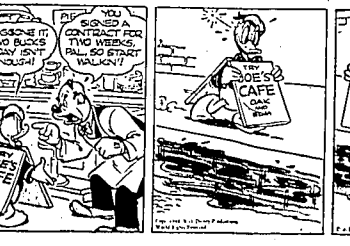

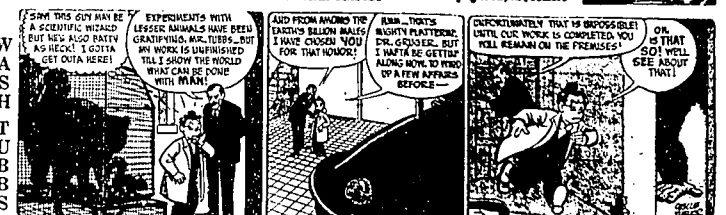
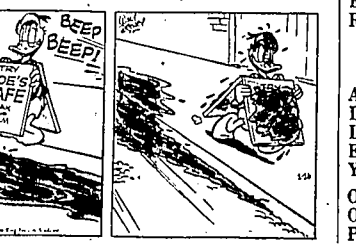
