

10 Per Cent Hike On Freight Rates Rejected by State

BOISE, Jan. 19 (AP)—A temporary interim increase of 10 per cent in railroad freight rates on intra-state traffic was denied by the Idaho public utilities commission in a decision made public today.

The increase, previously granted on interstate freight by the interstate commerce commission, was requested by railroads on an emergency basis as a result of increased operating costs.

The commission, in its decision, said that the carriers' increased costs, not covered, nor will they be in the immediate future, are an emergency of such gravity and magnitude as to justify an interim increase pending hearing and decision on another petition filed by the carriers.

Declaring that the requested increase was "without prejudice," the commission order indicated that the proceeding further requested at a later date for reconsideration.

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Threat of Soviet War Discounted By GOP Expert

He added, "No results are guaranteed. It is not possible, even with \$17,000,000,000 to buy peace. We shall have to make ourselves intelligent and friendly offers, backed by money and goods."

Couple Starved, Ill, but Had \$27,000 Cashed in Residence

WALWORTH, Wis., Jan. 19 (AP)—Doctors fought today to save the couple, about 70, who were found starved, sick and freezing in their sparsely heated home with \$27,000 cash in the house and pockets of their clothes and hidden in the house.

The couple, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Warhams, about 70, were found in their one-story frame cottage last Wednesday, but authorities did not reveal the facts of the case until yesterday.

Hospital attendants said they were in "poor" condition.

Officials were mystified by the fact that the Warhams apparently hoarded their money with meager food supplies in the house, but became freezers during the annual winter vacations in Florida.

The Warhams were found in their home by Village Marshal McCullough, who was exploring the house and looking for the place "where the couple was found dead."

When the Warhams were taken to a hospital, authorities began examining the place where McCullough discovered the couple, a "believable" find.

They found \$25,000 in cash in the pockets and lining of the house, clothing scattered about the house. Elsewhere in the house they found \$2,000 in cash and several bank and post slips.

McCullough said the house was piled with hundreds of yards of new dry goods, old rag, new and old shoes, battered hats and yellowed newspapers. Hundreds of paper bags filled with feathers hung in the attic.

Mrs. Warham never threw a thing away, McCullough said.

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Fine Weather Is Backfiring On California

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 19 (AP)—The silver lining that southern California has been bragging about for years has backfired into a disastrous drought.

Two coastal cities are rationing water, the \$23,000,000 agriculture industry is threatened and there is extreme danger of forest fires.

All over the lush valleys that once were desert, the land hasn't been so dry since it was first whittled into bloom by irrigation.

Drest on Record

The year 1947 was the driest since the weather bureau began keeping records 70 years ago. It also was the year in which southern California used the most water in history.

Just when the parched land was expecting rain, the weatherman produced two heat spells. The mercury hit 87 degrees during Christmas week and has remained near that point—ever since. It has not rained yet this year.

The water shortage was severe in cities which rely on rainfall and wells. Santa Barbara, a city of 20,000, and Ventura already were distributing water by rationing and household use only.

Wanted to Irrigate

Thousands of farms and citrus groves were forced to the expense of irrigation this year before being drest in winter.

Los Angeles county's \$3,000,000 herd and grain industry and \$10,000,000 deciduous fruit industry—apples, peaches and walnuts—are entirely dependent on rain water.

County Agricultural Commissioner Harold J. Ryan said they suffer heavy losses if it doesn't rain soon.

The forest fire danger was as great as in any summer month, forest officials said. A 1,000-acre fire this week was blamed on the dry weather.

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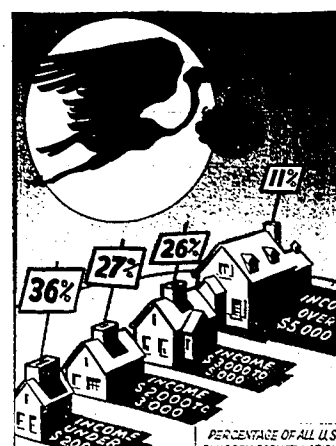

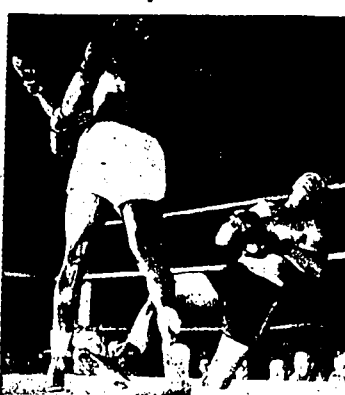


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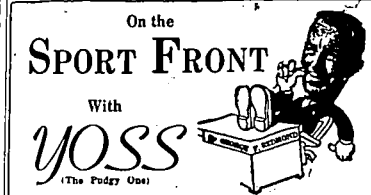

4 of 30 PCAs In Northwest 'Home-Owned'

SPOKANE, Jan. 19 (AP)—Four of the 30 production credit associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington have achieved complete member-ownership, the goal set when they were organized 14 years ago this month. It was announced today by E. E. Henry, president of the Production Credit Corporation of Spokane.

Henry said the four have just retired the last of the government's funds in their capital structures. They are the Northwest Livestock PCA, with headquarters in Portland; the Idaho Livestock PCA, Boise; the Eastern Idaho PCA, Pocatello, and the Montana Livestock PCA, Helena.

When the associations were organized in Jan., 1934, Henry said, the federal government, acting through the Spokane corporation, subscribed \$1,627,000 in the capital of the four associations. This money, he added, now has been completely repaid.

In addition, the associations have \$1,072,295 of capital bought and paid for by their members and also have built up surplus and reserves totaling \$1,682,235.

Henry said the associations, now operating on their own funds, will continue as units of the production credit system to serve the credit needs of farmers and stockmen in their respective territories.

Panel's Ballot Is Slated for Rockwell Act

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—The Rockwell bill to amend repayment and interest features of reclamation law was scheduled for a vote today in the house rules committee. Whether supporters of the long-pending measure could get it out of the committee onto the house floor was a matter of speculation. Some sources were more confident than others.

Rules committee members direct the traffic of house bills to the floor. They can vote against bringing a bill to the floor.

Favorable Testimony
During an hour's testimony—albeit favorable—on the bill Friday, most members sounded friendly to it. But Indiana Republican Forest J. Harney asked that a vote on bringing it to the house floor be postponed.

The version approved by the house public lands committee was one of many considered by congress over a three-year period. It would extend the repayment period for reclamation project power features from 50 to 70 years. It would reduce the interest rate on investments in those features from 3 to 2 1/2 per cent, with 2 per cent to go directly to the treasury. The other one-half the reclamation bureau would use to help defray irrigation costs of projects.

Doubt Expressed
The interest provisions, about which most of the controversy on the bill has centered, were those that got Harney's attention. He expressed some doubt that the bill clearly guaranteed that 2 per cent would go to the treasury.

Rail Union Chief Quits PCA Office

CLEVELAND, Jan. 19 (AP)—A. F. Whitney has resigned from the Progressive Citizens of America because "I cannot go along in its endorsement of a third party."

Whitney, president of the powerful Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, has been a member of PCA's board of directors, and sat on the stage when Henry A. Wallace, PCA's presidential candidate, recently spoke here.

A letter to C. B. Baldwin, executive vice-chairman of PCA, contained Whitney's resignation.
