Tito Declares Yugoslavia Is 'Bomb'-Armed

THIRISTE, Feb. Territory, Jan. 21—The pro-fascist newspaper La Voce Libera published today a purported secret speech by Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia in which he was reported to have said that Yugoslavia has atomic bombs and jet propelled planes for the "final annihilation of reaction."

U. S. Britain Blamed
La Voce Libera quoted Tito as saying that reactionary forces, with the aid of American and British capital, were working against the "Yugoslav proletariat." The quotations were:

"We are ready to risk their feet in the Adriatic against their atomic bombs... We shall not allow them to stand alone this time."
"Our jet propelled fighter planes and our artillery will efficaciously discourage any military aviation. Our material comes from an inexhaustible source. Our lines of transport will never be cut."

"Russian work-shops turn out 30,000 cars monthly. Headquarters have at their disposal 150 divisions ready to march on 48 hours notice, and capable of any aviation attack obstructing their advance up to Paris."

The report then quoted Tito as saying:

"Comrades, you know well that the people are not on our side. This is proved unequivocally by the lack of extra quantities of wheat which the farmers have been called upon to donate voluntarily. The farmers are perfidious and obstinate and it is impossible to clear their brains of bourgeois ideas. They are anti-social. I have no wish to litter the matters of religion, but when priests will tell alarm bells, there will be adequate insurance that it must not be overlooked that the farmers are very well armed."

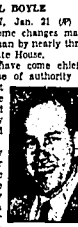
Truman Changed Man, Boyle Finds After Absence of Year

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—There've been some changes made in Harry S. Truman in nearly three years in the White House.

The changes have come chiefly from the exercise of authority in perhaps the most powerful executive office in the world—the presidency of the United States.

Rise in possibility either makes or breaks a man. He grows with the use of authority or he becomes a neuter. He loses himself in the person he leads or he loses his own personality at the same time it takes slow but killing toll of his nerves. That is the history of Harry Truman, but added to his self-confidence and political astuteness.

"I went to a Truman press conference the other day, and saw the President for the first time in almost a year."

We gathered, in an ante room just before the conference hour. There was a young girl in the group and she was slightly nervous. Most people are when they wait to see a President for the first time.

On the walls were hung the Indian peace pipes in a glass case, a diploma from "The Mitchell College of Hunting and Fishing," and several framed political cartoons, some kidding the President, some praising him. One showed a large eight ball with a sign before it that said "Harry doesn't live here any more."

The door opened and the regular White House reporters filed rapidly into the conference room, where Mr. Truman sat awaiting them.

Mr. Truman made a brief announcement and waited for the questions. They came thick and fast—like balls in a table tennis game. In about 10 minutes Mr. Truman answered 18 impromptu questions, smiling and without reference to prepared notes or inquiries of aides around him.

The questions ranged from atomic energy to foreign affairs, from the history of White House architecture to veterans' allowances. The President either gave a detailed answer immediately, replied there was no comment or said that a formal announcement would be forthcoming. But there were no pauses, no hesitation. He knew exactly what he wanted to say.

The President was crisply dressed, about halfway between Wall street and Broadway, in a gray suit with

Idaho Worker Wage Reaches All-Time High

BOISE, Jan. 21 (AP)—The three-month period ending Sept. 30, 1947 registered an all-time high in wages paid to employes covered by the Idaho employment security act. H. O. Garrett, executive director of the employment security agency, said today.

"I've covered all the Presidents since Coolidge," he said, "and this class is the most infamously and friendly. He really lays people—although he is really rather a shy man himself. 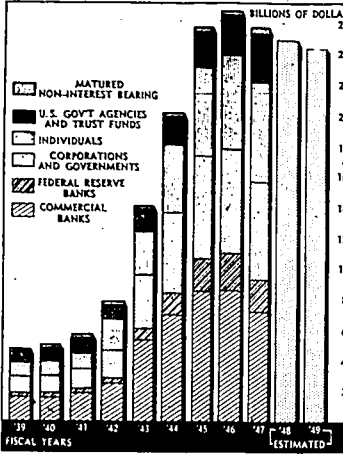
Hair Dyed

Utah Woolmen Take 'Healthy' Swipe at U. S.

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 21 (AP)—The Utah Wool Growers' association wound up its 41st annual convention with a healthy swipe at the federal government last night.

The delegates also elected Dom Clyde, Heber City, to his 10th term as president of the association, Douglas Clark, Cedar City, was named vice president.

Demands Ease

The wool growers eased up on their demands that public domain lands be returned to the private ownership by the federal government, but at the same time took a hefty swipe at the government by demanding every effort be made to "seize government out of business and establish more business in government."

Evidently taking their cue from the wool growers adopted a resolution which said in part: "At the present time the opportunity for obtaining these public domain lands under private ownership seems impractical."

"Time Not Right"

Nicholson told the convention earlier that at present the "time is not ripe" for private ownership of public domain lands. Nicholson completed a study of the entire federal land situation for the secretary of interior last year.

He told the convention that "eastern capitalists" wanted to buy up western lands if they are taken out of the public domain for one of two reasons: "To write off excess profits and to build western playgrounds for themselves and their families."

WAA Okays Gowen Field Surplus Sale

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 21 (AP)—The war assets administration received permission for sale of Gowen field at Boise under conditions which will permit the city of Boise to acquire that section of the war surplus army air force base that it needs.

Federal officials said permission for the sale was received from the WAA zone office in San Francisco.

Under the authorization, 1,771 acres of the base is classified as surplus property. This section includes runways, hangars, a warehouse and administration building. WAA officials said they anticipated that Boise city officials would make application to acquire this portion of the \$2,920,000 property.

Boise officials already have entered negotiations for the purchase of this section, which cost the government \$3,917,000. A WAA announcement added that deadline for bids is Feb. 3.

An additional 1,140 acres of the property was classified by the WAA as non-airport property, and will be advertised for sale soon, said W. E. Griffin, chief of the real property field office.

Russia Wrath Is Stirred by Base Opening

By DEWITT MACKENZIE, AP Foreign Affairs Analyst

Washington's decision to reopen the war-time American airfield of Meliana, near Tripoli in North Africa, has stirred the wrath of the Soviet press which charges that this is further evidence of Uncle Sam's imperialistic ambition to rule the world.

The accusers chose not to recall that Russia has made an open secret of her desire to become a Mediterranean power. Indeed, she wants a mandate over the Italian colony of Tripoli, and is demanding that Turkey give her a hand in the control of the strategic Dardanelles which provide the Soviet union access to the Mediterranean from the Black sea.

Well, America has no imperialistic ambitions, but a couple of World wars, in which she has been compelled to play a leading role, have thrust world wide interests and obligations upon her. She proposes to carry out her obligations to others and to safeguard her personal interests—and it's well that this be recognized by all and sundry.

One of the theatres in which Uncle Sam's obligations and interests are heaviest is the Mediterranean. This vast area, which washes the shores of many countries on three continents, has become one of America's front line defenses—most of the front-line defense of the western hemisphere, for that matter.

Out of that zone could come another World war. Moreover, the United States has committed herself to the assistance of distressed countries like Greece, Italy and Turkey—a commitment which is partly altruistic and partly a matter of self-defense.

The time was, of course, when Britannia ruled the waves and was mistress of the Mediterranean, though France and Italy had good places in the sun. But World War II knocked out the latter two, and has compelled England to acknowledge that she no longer is capable of maintaining her supremacy there.

That's where Uncle Sam came in—and that is likely to be a position which he will maintain. He fully recognizes Russia's rights to free access to the Mediterranean, but he doesn't recognize exclusive rights which should permit Moscow to adopt Italy's proud designation of "mare nostrum"—our sea.

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Britain Slates Early End for Palestine Rule

LONDON, Jan. 21 (AP)—Great Britain will speed her withdrawal from Palestine rather than delay it and already has moved to sell two thirds of her military supplies in the holy land, official statements disclosed today.

Lord Lonsdale, minister for colonial affairs, railed critics in the house of commons from all parties when he announced in the name of the government that no British troops will remain in Palestine beyond Aug. 1.

May Advance Date
He said there was no basis for reports from Jerusalem that the British evacuation timetable might be delayed two months because of the fighting there. Rather, he said, the date might be advanced.

"I have no reason to believe that even in Palestine have made it impossible for us to complete our military withdrawal Aug. 1," he said.

The British withdrawal is scheduled to start May 15.

Lionsdale's statement were supported by War Minister Emanuel Shinwell, who disclosed that Britain already has started the immediate task of disposing of her military supplies in the holy land.

Shinwell said that two thirds of the British supplies—227,000 tons—have been offered to the ministry of supply for disposal.

The remaining one third—523,000 tons—will be retained by Britain to meet the needs of the forces in the "middle east" with the exception of 50,000 tons, which will be returned to Britain.

Britons Swing Toward U. S. View on Russ

Great Britain's socialist government, having sought manfully for a long time to find a bridge between the American and Russian positions in world affairs, now appears to have followed the United States into the field belief that the conflict has passed the stage of negotiation, just how far Ernest Bevin will go Thursday in outlining revisions in British foreign policy remains to be seen, but developments over several weeks made plain that the revision has been made.

Russia Demounced

Herbert Morrison and Clement Attlee have made speeches bitterly denouncing Moscow; Morrison made it clear that Britain no longer makes any distinction between the threat posed by fascism and the threat now posed by communism.

It is significant that this shift in policy has come about in conjunction with a considerable improvement in Britain's own position. Her production is at record highs, and the Marshall plan in Washington now figure that less than \$2,000,000,000 in outside aid will be needed through her efforts.

Service Policy Affected

This movement has an immediate effect on the armed forces, with which she has been accustomed to back her foreign policy.

Where, a few months ago Britain seemed to be relinquishing her position as the guardian of the Mediterranean and the middle east, we now see her trying to develop a new system of military alliances with the Arabs. She is not withdrawing the troops she has in Greece as originally planned. She is returning more to the level of a partner with the United States, although she still can't participate in anything that costs dollars.

Puerto Rico May Get Own Refining

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21—Legislation to allow Puerto Rico to refine all the sugar it produces, about 1,000,000 tons a year, was introduced in the house Tuesday.

Under the 1946 sugar quota act, the island is limited to refining 125,000 short tons. Fernos Isern, the Puerto Rican resident commissioner, said the legislation is designed to eliminate any restriction on Puerto Rico-United States trade that is not applicable to trade among the states of the union.

Large sugar-producing states are not restricted as to the amount of sugar they can refine.
