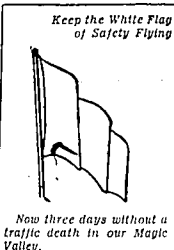

Discoverer of Folk Songs in U. S. Passes

GREENVILLE, Miss., Jan. 28 (AP)—The voice of John Lomax, famed Dallas, Tex., collector of American folk songs, was stilled forever today but the tunes he discovered, such as "Home on the Range," lived on to perpetuate his memory.

The veteran troubadour died here Monday night of a heart attack, just a few days after he came back to his native Mississippi to celebrate his 80th birthday.

Stricken Friday

He was stricken Friday and had been in a coma most of the time since then. His wife, who flew here from Dallas, and his son Alan of New York and John, Jr., were at his side when death came.

Lomax was responsible probably more than any other one man for the preservation of the ballads of the old west and the rich spirituals of the deep south.

His interest in American folklore began when he was a youth on his father's farm in Texas where he lotted down for his own amusement hitherto unrecorded songs of the south.

Aided by Scholars

Later his fund of Americana was considered so important that he was aided in his work by scholarships from Harvard university, the Guggenheim foundation and the Library of Congress.

He and his son Alan became famous together for their pilgrimages into the once wild west to collect and record more than 10,000 American songs.

Among his discoveries were the late President Roosevelt's favorite, "Home on the Range," and the famous "Old Alex Little Dogies," which Lomax dug up at a 1900 Ft. Worth, Tex., cattleman's convention.

His death here came just 24 hours before he was to make his farewell appearance at a civic celebration in honor of his 80th birthday.

Northwest Wheat Stocks Are Low

PORTLAND, Jan. 28 (AP)—Unsold wheat in the Pacific northwest is at its lowest winter level in 13 years, the federal crop reporting service said today.

Holdings on Jan. 1 in Oregon, Washington and Idaho were listed at 53,822,000 bushels, 23 per cent under last year. Of this, between 5,000,000 and 10,000,000 bushels is export wheat owned by the government, trade sources said.

The holdings are expected to be just enough to provide for normal feed and flour needs until the new crop is harvested.

Trade groups said they were recommending against resumption of government purchase of wheat for export.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—President Truman has presented a quiet but determined challenge to the Republican curtailment of private banking on the question of curtailing the excessive inflation of loans and credit to consumers, builders, industry and commercial institutions during the past year.

Secretary of the Treasury, James A. Lovett, says he is not sure if he reflects his program, as seems likely, he feels that he will be in a position to make a partial check on the responsibility for further dangerous expansion.

While the nation's financiers are aware of the White House attitude, it has escaped general attention because there was no public ranting over this complex problem.

Mr. Truman's program on the curbing of private credit, federal securities, debt management and taxation can be gleaned from his economic report and from statements before congressional committees by Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder and the federal reserve chairman, Marriner S. Eccles.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

The belated disclosure by our state department of the details of the cooperation between Stalin and Hitler in the Russian propaganda war called "Dinner at the White House" has caused Einar Roosevelt's friend and guest, Louis Adams, to write a book, "How Things Appear from Pegler's Angle."

Adams is a native German and a naturalized American. He writes through his pen as an ardent non-combatant, partisan of Marshal Tito, the communist quillist and Muscovite puppet who rules Yugoslavia.

The information which the state department has released is the fruit of the American people's curiosity. It is surprising to know the practical cynicism of Marshal Stalin and the dishonesty of all attempts by Roosevelt and others to distinguish between communism and nazism.

It is now revealed for the political purpose of justifying President Truman's program of buying the friendship of European peoples by the labor of Americans who toil to pay taxes to buy the goods to be used as bribes.

There was absolutely no conflict of principle or ideology between Russia and Germany.

From the start, Hitler did the fighting and Stalin sent him grain, oil, minerals and other necessities. The state department documents tell of this in detail.

Adams says he is a socialist and there is no evidence that he ever joined the American communist party. That point is unimportant, however. But his own statements, arguments and intonations are important.

Adams never attempts to differentiate between Hitlerism and communism, point by point. He tries to propose a compromise without ever saying what concessions a free people could make to that tyranny which found Hitler a congenial partner in the general whackup of Europe and the great east.

Adams betrays himself into a damnation of Stalin when he writes that the old ruling groups in the occupied countries had "almost invariably" compromised with Hitler to hold onto their interests.

Again he says the old rightist parties and "privileged classes" were on the chute because of their cooperation with the "razzi." Stalin did just what those "old ruling groups" did.

The point to be emphasized is that Einar Roosevelt, with the state department, the FBI and the army and navy intelligence hopping at her imperious commands, still involved this fellow to dine with the British prime minister and promote the ultimate delivery of all Europe to Stalin after American soldiers and wealth had wrought the liberation.

Although Adams is a physical plant and owes the United States an enormous debt of gratitude and patriotism, he let the neighbors' fingers fight the war that he so positively demanded.

Some of Pravda's more thoughtful readers must have been puzzled by the series on American life that Boris Izak and Yur Prava wrote that paper. Comrades Izak and Zhukov were over here covering the U. N. meetings for the Communist party organ. But they took time off to record a few impressions of the American scene.

They seem to have gathered their material on this broad land of ours by walking around New York City and reading American newspapers and magazines. They didn't get all their facts on straight. But their conclusions, of course, weigh right to one favorite line of Soviet propaganda.

Everything the news reporters saw here added up to impending economic disaster. Pravda readers learned that a New York factory foreman told Comrades I. and Z. that the plant's workers couldn't even afford to go to a cafeteria any more, but had to lunch on bread that they brought from home.

Meanwhile, in Catechism General Eisenhower had spoken at a merchants banquet where each guest was served a four-pound steak. Pravda readers were told that the "new look" is a desperate measure to postpone depression. "Last autumn, at the command of the textile corporations, a new fashion was proclaimed in America—long skirts," the authors discovered. "As if by magic the whole press started praising the new style. (Oh, yeah?) It was advertised as improving mobility and possessing important practical advantages."

Probably the Izak-Zhukov series wasn't aimed at the thoughtful reader anyway. It was more likely aimed at those Soviet citizens whose minds have been regimented from childhood by Russia's insulated, one-sided educational system, and who swallow anything the government hands out without a second thought. There must be millions of those thoughtless readers in Russia. They are the ones who are being urged to increase their production or who are being kept in the armed forces to make their country strong against the coming imperialist war that the top communists are always shouting about.

The series on American life must comfort them somewhat. It must help them forget their own sky-high prices and meager rations and shabby clothes as they reflect that things are bad in America, too. Probably it never occurs to them that the capitalist nation which is about to collapse is the capitalist nation whose strength their government fears.

PARINGS AND PICKINGS

While people are talking about paring down the budget, there's some other good paring to be done. Dr. Frederick J. Stare, outstanding nutrition expert writing in the Atlantic Monthly, points to the continuing waste of food in the United States.

Granted that it is the people next door, not oneself, that are wasteful—or more likely still the restaurant on the street one people go to for a meal. The fact remains, as Dr. Stare points out, that huge waste occurs through "overeating as a national habit and overeating as a personal habit."

It is easy to understand—though hard to remember—that Americans would do well to eat less meat and more fruits and vegetables, for their own welfare as well as the world's. It is sobering to read an estimate that the amount of edible food wasted in the United States each year amounts, in terms of the 1946 retail market value of food, to about \$2,000,000,000—enough to cover the European recovery program for one year.

This waste includes the fresh, useful scraps which fill garbage cans instead of being used as fertilizer. These Europeans who are to be seen roaming through garbage heaps looking for scraps to eat would find they could be fed in such expensive waste—Christian Science Monitor.

THIS BE SLAVERY

The national conference for prevention of war is happening newspapers, to "Stock-two-three-four slavery"—meaning compulsory military training, of course.

The training program would be self-imposed democratically by American will and could be terminated at any time the same way.

Peace-loving Americans are staunchly supporting the six months' "two-two-three-four" program simply because they want to take no chances that Americans might otherwise have to serve in any other language—"dret-vel" slavery—or slavery in any other language—between—Milwaukee Journal.

Potato Stocks Fall in Idaho; Report Shows

BOISE, Jan. 28 (AP)—Stocks of Idaho potatoes on hand Jan. 1 and for sale were estimated today at 12,200,000 bushels, the bureau of agricultural economics reported. Of this number a little over half the stock was held at the beginning of 1947 and this amount is five per cent smaller than for the 10-year (1936-45) average.

These stocks include quantities which will be sold to starch factories and other processors, including quantities which will be purchased by the government under terms of its processing plan, but do not include the stock to be fed to livestock, held for seed by growers, or the stock earmarked and waste, the bureau said.

43 Per Cent of 1947
Holdings available for sale Jan. 1 were about 43 per cent of the state's 1947 production. Stocks held a year ago were about 31 per cent of the previous year's crop.

Preliminary estimates indicate that sales from the 1947 crop may amount to 2,425,000 bushels, or 19.9 per cent of the crop, with the remainder, 1,975,000 bushels, to be used for seed on farms where crops are produced and 1,150,000 bushels to be used for food. 1,150,000 bushels fed to livestock and lost through shrinkage and waste.

141,000-Acre Planting
Indications at the 1948 plantings by growers will be 144,000 acres, 10 per cent more than the 1947 plantings. Increased acreage plantings were indicated in eastern Idaho, with little change from 1947 in south central and southwestern districts.

Carlot shipments through Jan. 1, 1948 were 15,729 compared with 16,674 cars to the same date a year ago.

BURLEY, Jan. 28—Funeral services for 7-year-old Morgan, 2-year-old son of John and Veda Jensen, Morgan, who died in a Boise hospital Monday, will be held at 10 p. m. Friday at the third ward LDS church, Bishop Lawrence Tolman will officiate.

The child was flown to Boise Sunday when it was believed he had polio. It was uncertain whether death was due to a toxemia condition and pneumonia. He was born Jan. 19, 1946, at Anacostis, Wash.

Surviving besides his parents are his 1-year-old sister, Veda Kaye Morgan; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Morgan, Deale, and his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Barry, The McCulloch funeral home is in charge of arrangements.

State Buys Huge Store of Surplus

BOISE, Jan. 28 (AP)—Five lots of electronic material, consisting of short wave transmitter-receiving sets and radar equipment, has been purchased by the state from the war assets administration.

State Purchasing Agent Harold Boyd said the material will be used by the forestry department, police, municipalities and schools.

Boyd also said a fire engine has been purchased from the WAA for the city of Victor and four fire trailers for the state forestry department for use in northern Idaho.

A native of Sacramento, Calif., Jurgen got his start in the "big time" at the Hotel St. Francis in San Francisco in 1933. Prior to 1933 he had had a small band that played at resorts like Lake Tahoe during the summer months.

Poles' Guided Press Claims Aid Is Beaten

WARSAW, Poland, Jan. 27 (AP)—It may be called the "western European plan" but whatever it is, Poles say they and neighbor countries in Soviet Russia's orbit have beaten America to the punch.

Says the communist Polish press: "American plans are still in the words. We have passed from words to deeds."

Poland claims that while America and the 16 countries participating in the Marshall plan are still talking about how much aid when and where, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, the Balkan nations and Russia have long since passed beyond sound industrial and economic recovery.

Industries Integrated

Furthermore, there has been a constant integration of industries in the eastern European countries, Poles and Greeks say. A federation of states or a common union has been formed. They say they can accomplish all this by the year 1950 or a more or less uniform pattern in their recovery effort.

United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration

posting \$300,000,000 worth of food, industrial equipment and other aid into Poland in 1948 and 1949, with shipments still coming, generally credited with having the foundation for Poland's recovery.

Claim Saund Currency

The Poles have gone on from there. They claim their currency is sound. They say every dollar secured brings one zloty's worth of production. They assert inflation has been avoided through strict control of government expenditures and a gradual increase of business in circulation as industrial recovery is speeded up. They say there's no unemployment here—there's a job for every Pole.

"I am just existing," said Cyrus J. Waid, 36, of Camden, N. J. "We walk into the store and prices are so high we can't reach the shelves."

"We never have enough money," said Mrs. Waid. "I don't know what she is underminded."

Leon, who is 11 and was partially blind, is the only one of the Waid's daughters.

Get Sighting Test

Chairman ROSENBERG called her to him after the Waid budget had been thoroughly explored. He gave her a \$100 and said he'd fix it up for the family to see the skills of Washington.

"Then he said he was calling food company people to find out next week to find out whether these high prices are justified."

No Hint on Plans

"They didn't say what the committee may do about the question of the Waid's case," said President Truman the day he wants to limit back price control and rationing as a last resort.

The Waid's and their daughters are brought here by Waid's union, the CIO Food, Tobacco, Agricultural and Allied Workers of America, to tank up the President's stand.

State's Educators Seek Way to End Teacher Shortage

BOISE, Jan. 28 (AP)—Leading Idaho educators today had taken action in devising a program to solve the shortage of qualified teachers.

The action came at a regional conference called by Dr. Ralph McDonald, Washington, executive secretary of the National Education Association's commission on teacher education and professional standards.

The Idaho educators in a session session voted to ask the state board of education to eliminate emergency teaching permits within three years; to set up a program designed to sell the teaching profession to public school students; to encourage civic groups to provide scholarships to students wishing to train as teachers; to encourage communities to find suitable living quarters for teachers, and to work for elimination of salary differentials between secondary and elementary teachers.

Oregon and Washington educators in attendance at the conference adopted similar programs.
