Objections Voiced Here on Parole Granted to William D. Hale, Convicted Slayer

Objections were voiced here Friday with the announcement that William D. Hale, 37, one of two men convicted for the 1933 murder of Twin Falls Police Officer Craig T. Bracken, will be paroled.

The state board of corrections Thursday granted Hale a parole, effective April 14, with the parole to extend for an indefinite period, the Associated and United Press reported. Prosecuting Attorney Everett M. Sweeley, who gained Hale's conviction pointed out that Hale's attorney, J. M. Lampert, Boise, pleaded with the jury to "send Hale away for the rest of his natural life." Sweeley said Lampert's plea indicated Lampert's belief in the mental deficiency of Hale who was convicted of first degree murder. Hale belonged away from society, Sweeley quoted Lampert as arguing.

Hale and Danny Williams were convicted of killing Bracken. Hale still is held in the prison on a life sentence. Hale won a commutation to a 25-year minimum from the old board of pardons in April, 1946.

Warden Louis H. Clapp said Hale had won his parole "doing a good job" at the prison. Hale has been a trustee since May, 1944.

The vote for parole was unanimous. Other members of the board are R. P. Schofield and Herman P. Paul.

"We expect some repercussions from 'Twins' parole," said Clapp, "but we feel Hale is a man who will release back to society. We'll always have a hold on him as long as he is in our parole."

Questions Provided Deputy Sheriff Claude Wiley questioned whether the parole board had made provisions for Hale's care when he is released. Wiley was a deputy under Sheriff A. C. Parker at the time of the murder.

"If he is turned loose, he will have to fend for himself," Wiley pointed out. "Hale's view of the parole was expressed by both Twin Falls city and county law enforcement men and officials. Many had worked with Bracken, a popular police officer."

Bracken was killed May 7, 1933, when he apprehended Hale and Williams while they were escaping from a robbery.

Wiley said Hale had been in the prison since 1933. He got outside the walls once by submerging himself in a tub barrel. On his next try he was guarded.

The guard lived in a little more than a year ago a guard from the top of his cell block.

In announcing the parole, Warden Clapp said, "We discussed Hale's case length."

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U.S. Weather Brings Winter 'Hodge Podge'

Winter weather in the hodge-podge across the nation today.

The fuel oil situation was eased in some communities as temperatures moderated but in others supply dwindled, and thousands of homes were left in the dark.

Snow, hail and rain fell on southern California in the second day of a storm which broke a record 10-day drought.

Hail in Hollywood

King-size hail, in some places weighing as much as a golf ball, pelted Hollywood, Beverly Hills, West Los Angeles and other sections of the Los Angeles area today.

The hail was the heaviest since the Carolinas northward to the lower Ohio valley. There also was more hail in the Carolinas and the central plains states. There was rain and some sleet from northeastern Texas to the Gulf of Mexico.

The question before the house is: When, oh when, will the United Nations get around to providing an armed force to maintain peace in Palestine pending the establishment of a Jewish and Arab state? That's more than a question. It's a prayer among those who recognize the terrible dangers of this situation in which the Arabs violently oppose separation and the Jews want it.

Appeal for Action
The Jewish agency for Palestine Tuesday appealed for action by the U.N. security council against what the agency described as an Arab plot to overthrow the partition plan.

Monday Associated Press Correspondent Daniel de Luca reported from Jerusalem that the Arab High Commission is fighting to prevent the U.N. from partitioning Palestine from Jerusalem's ancient walls to the sea.

An unofficial tabulation stated that 1,045 people had been killed in the Arab-Jewish civil war since the U.N. decided to partition the holy land, Nov. 29.

Arabs Gathering
An AP Correspondent Joseph C. Goodman cabled from Damascus, Syria, that trucks loaded with Arabs were moving into Damascus and many observers to believe that a general attack on the Jews of Palestine might be approaching.

The leader of the Arab forces, Fawzi al-Qawukh, told reporters that "the middle east is in a state of movement... for an all-out fight." There you have the makings of a conflict which might easily sweep the whole middle east. It could develop into a Jihad (Mohammedan holy war). It could also end in a third world war.

The only safeguard against this is the quick establishment of an armed force in Palestine under the auspices of the United Nations.

'47 Banner Year For 4-H Projects

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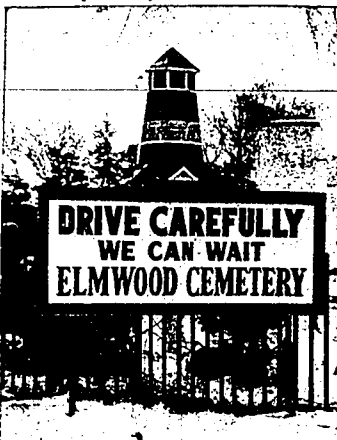
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Safety Story Has Good Plot

Town Hall Speaker Says Turks Taking Anti-Communism Stand

As a self-styled "one woman good will mission," James Sanli, lecturer and U.S. State Department Turkish expert, told members of the Town Hall association Thursday night that Turkey has taken a definite stand against communism.

In his difficult, comprehensible lecture on the sharply defined borderline of western democratic and eastern communist ideologies, Miss Sanli said, Turkey has maintained an honest and consistent non-militaristic foreign policy since its transition to a republic in 1923 from a "decadent" empire.

Although sharply criticized for its non-combatant position during the war, Turkey was actually an ally of Great Britain and battles acting as a base of operations, played the role of pacifier in the middle east, Miss Sanli pointed out.

Addressing more than 300 persons in the high school auditorium, Miss Sanli said Turkey has developed into a study republic from an imperialistic nation in the last 25 years and has mobilized a million men in the past two years to resist Russian territorial expansion.

"World peace," she said, "can only be achieved by the people of neighboring nations getting to know each other."

U. S. Pushes On Self-Help Ahead of Aid

The United States, having learned the lesson in Greece and other spots, has been putting pressure on self-help ahead of American aid shipments to China as well as to western Europe. Now, on the eve of announcement of a Chinese aid program, the pressure seems to be producing some results, even if not revolutionary.

China's Premier Chang Chun said last week that his government "fully recognizes that, in order to secure the maximum benefit from external aid, an adequate and practicable program of domestic measures of self-help is needed. This program should at the beginning by stress on financial and economic matters of immediate importance which will be followed by certain other reforms in the fields of general administration and military reorganization."

Doctor Takes Issue in Draft Health Report

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—A physician took sharp issue today with conclusions based on a 4-P draft rejection, that the average city man is healthier than his country neighbor.

A study of selective service statistics show, said Dr. Maurice H. Friedman of Washington, that more white men from rural areas successfully passed military physical tests than did city men. This was despite the fact that the "cream" of the farm workers as essential and never submitted to examinations, he contended.

Paper Prepared

In a paper prepared for the national conference on rural health sponsored by the American Medical Association, he said:

"It is quite true that the number of rejections was higher in registrants from farms than in other occupational groups. Without hesitation this has been accepted as showing that the health of our rural population was distinctly inferior to that of our urban population and that this was a direct result of a lack of adequate medical care."

"When one makes a nationwide comparison of farm and urban registration there is a disproportionate representation of northern registrants in the non-farm sample."

More Negroes

"Moreover, in the farm registrants there is a disproportionate representation of Negroes. Hence in any nationwide comparison of farm and non-farm men one is not simply comparing a representative farm laborer with an equally representative city laborer."

Dr. Friedman contended it was "quite" to apply selective service statistics as a measure of health and added that even if a reliable yardstick were available "we could not draw any conclusions on the adequacy or inadequacy of medical care in rural areas."

Accidents in Homes Take Heaviest Toll

CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—Accidents killed more people in their homes than on the highways last year, the National Safety Council reported today.

The council said it was the first time in 30 years, except for a brief period of wartime driving restrictions, that more people were killed accidentally at home than in traffic.

Two Per Cent Most

All told, deaths from all types of accidents in 1947 were two per cent higher than in 1946.

The safety council's report showed that this is what accidents did to the U. S. last year:

Killed—100,000.

Injured—10,500,000.

Cost—\$4,700,000,000 in wages, medical expenses and property damage.

Traffic deaths dropped from 33,411 in 1946 to 32,000 last year—a four per cent decrease.

32,500 Dies in Homes

But 32,500 persons died in home accidents during 1947, compared with 32,500 in 1946. Occupational accident deaths rose from 18,500 in 1946 to 17,000 last year. Each type increased three per cent.

The council blamed the over-all

higher death toll on an increase in the number of deaths from public accidents other than traffic, which totaled 19,000 compared with 17,000 in 1946.

Passenger fatalities on scheduled domestic air transport increased to 199, compared with 75 the previous year.
