
Missouri Vote Fraud Charge Regaining Life

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—A senate investigation of Democratic fraud charges in Missouri is regaining life after a Missouri stamping grounds showed new signs of life today.

The charges arose in connection with a primary in the fifth Missouri congressional district in 1946.

These were the developments today:

1. A Judiciary subcommittee prepared to question the FBI man who handled the case. He now is a federal judge in St. Louis.

New Probe Reported

2. Senator Kemp predicted that a new investigation committee will take a look at how the justice department dealt with the election irregularities in Kansas City precincts. Kemp claims the department "washed" the case.

A grand jury indicted 72 persons, but 66 were freed last Jan. 25 after he had held for evidence three others. The remaining six are awaiting trial.

The fifth is not President Truman's own congressional district, but he took a hand in the 1946 campaign. He endorsed Elmer Axtell for the nomination over Roy L. Glauber. Axtell defeated Glauber but lost the election to Republican Alvin K. Reeve, Jr.

Reeve switched.

Kemp tried to get the senate Judiciary committee to investigate the case last July. He failed when Senator Langer, R., N.D., joined Democrats in voting against Kemp's proposal. Kemp then asked the district to overturn the Judiciary committee. Democrats took that idea to death in the closing days of the regular session.

Senator Donnell, R., Mo., is chairman of the Judiciary subcommittee considering the nomination of 22-district Allen Tamm, assistant FBI director, to be a federal judge in the District of Columbia.

Tamm is opposed by the local bar association and a committee of the American Bar association on grounds that he has never had any trial court experience.

Test Given on 'Full' Military Aid to Greece

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (AP)—The state department floated a trial balloon today suggesting that some active American military aid may be needed to win the "Battle of Greece" from international communism.

Secretary of State Marshall's top expert on Greece—Loy W. Henderson—made the suggestion in a speech to the Kentucky Western Action committee for action at Louisville.

Crisis Situation

If the situation in Greece, as a result of increased Russian assistance to guerrillas deteriorates to a point where Greek forces "alone" cannot cope with it, Henderson said the forum:

The United States will not stand idly by while foreign aggressors deprive Greece of its territorial integrity and political independence.

Henderson did not define what he meant when he said "not stand idly by." But one deduction could be the possibility that in the event American troops may be needed to save Greece from communism.

Marshall had not seen Henderson's speech in advance. Neither, did Henderson say whether the United States to such last resort action as use of troops. It would take congressional action.

But Henderson's speech is bound to get the maximum interpretation, especially in Greece. Greek officials are anxious to interpret it as a promise that if things get bad enough, the United States will send considerable full military intervention.

Eire Starts First Experiments With Coalition Controls

DUBLIN, Feb. 19 (AP)—Eire began its first experiment in coalition government today, and to most Irish that simply meant: "Dew is out."

But while Eamon de Valera, prime minister since 1932, has been turned out by the parliament, he remains a political power in Eire. His Fianna Fail (Soldiers of Destiny) party holds 68 parliament seats, only short of a majority.

De Valera's followers, far from downcast, were predicting the overthrow of the coalition and new elections within the year.

A five-party coalition, apparently respectful of de Valera's 16 years in office, joined forces yesterday to elect John A. Costello, 55, a Dublin attorney.

The leader of an Irish government without the mystical, New York-born de Valera, was still a little shaky. He had to be urged by his political allies there would be little immediate change in Irish life under Costello's leadership. The quiet, cautious new prime minister is leader of the conservative Fine Gael (United Irish) party.

Yemen Confirms Monarch's Death

ADEN, Aden, Feb. 19 (AP)—The government of Yemen confirmed in a telegram today that King Zaidi Imam Yahya is dead. He was 42.

The news first was broadcast Wednesday by the capital radio station. A messenger from there and the government telegram confirmed it.

There was no official explanation of whether the king died of natural causes or was killed. He was elected ruler 45 years ago.

Reports from the Arab kingdom just north of this British colony said Sayed Ali Abdullah al Wazir had been elected new king by the people in accord with Islamic tradition. He had been first minister.

Hodge is commander of the U.S. occupation zone in south Korea.

He wrote Lieut. Gen. G. P. Korenchuk, the Russian commander, that he held Korenchuk responsible for the incident at Pyongyang, Feb. 8.

Majors Darrel Costello and Richard C. Biggs were pushed around by Koreans and a camera was snatched from Costello. They were trying to watch a parade of the Russian-armed north Korean army.

The army and north Korean government were established by the Soviets in violation of international agreements. The Americans were on duty in Pyongyang as liaison officers.

Steelworkers to Ask Wage Boosts

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 19 (AP)—The CIO-United Steelworkers of America today asked for a "substantial wage increase" and a social insurance program.

The announcement, made at the end of a one-day meeting of the union's 15-man wage and policy committee, fixed no figure for the sought-for raise.

President Philip Murray released a "statement of policy" which, he declared, will be presented to the steel industry.

Improvements for Snake Stop Loss of Rainbow Trout

AMERICAN FALLS, Feb. 18 (AP).—Many large rainbow trout have been saved as a result of improvements in the Snake river channel below American Falls.

B. D. Almsworth, superintendent of the state fish hatchery, said today that only four or five trout a day were found stranded on rocky bars during the current spawning run. Five or six times that number were stranded a year ago.

Stranded trout are rescued by fish and game department employees. Using bulldozers, the Idaho Power company has eliminated many shallow pool holes previously death traps for big trout coming out of the main stream when the water flow was at March.

Truman Tops Demo Holiday Dinner Slates

By LYLE C. WILSON
UP Political Analyst

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19 (UP)—President Truman tops the Jefferson-Jackson anniversary bill tonight at two \$100-or-more-a-plate dinners here to raise funds for his presidential election campaign.

It is a political occasion and a political speech is expected of the President. His remarks will be broadcast into the south where there are threats of rebellion against his candidacy, and into the north where Henry A. Wallace is trying to raise a third party to defeat him. Mr. Truman is in a tough spot in some ways. Washington awaits his speech with more than usual interest.

Nearly 3,000 Democrats will assemble here for two dinners similar to those on a smaller scale in many other cities. Mr. Truman will dine with about half of the Washington group at the Hotel Statler. He will proceed then to the Hotel Mayflower to deliver the principal address of the evening at 10 p. m. EST. It will be broadcast by NBC, ABC and MBS.

One hundred bucks was the minimum for Washington Jefferson-Jackson dinners. Party officials explained there actually was no charge to those who will assemble tonight. But all who gave \$100 or more to the party for the occasion were invited. In that basis the gross take here would be a minimum of \$200,000, there being 2,000 plates set at the two hotels for tonight.

Others Appear Elsewhere
Cabinet members and others will be speaking elsewhere in the nation. Sen. J. Howard McGrath of Rhode Island, chairman of the Democratic national committee, jumped the gun last night with a speech leading at the vitals of the party. He received a few cracks, too, for Wallace, the third party presidential candidate, to suggest to brand him. Robert A. Taft, R., O., as an isolationist who could cripple the Marshall plan and revivify the United Nations charter.

"At the same time Senator Taft was making this statement," McGrath continued, "Governor Dewey, a me too diplomat of 1944, was off on a different tangent. He was speaking, I suppose, to escape, if possible, from the taint of Taft leadership."

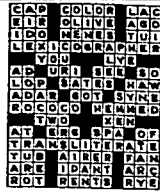

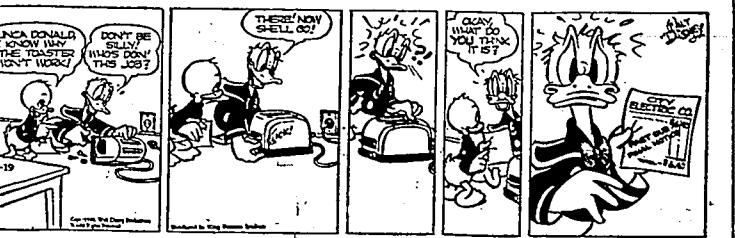

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Big Increase in Births to Jam Schools

(From Page One)
Long range estimates say births will level off to 2,000,000 annually during the 10-year period between 1948 and 1958.

Enrollment figures for elementary schools show there are 384 first grade students but only 1,000 in second grade. The third grade moves to junior high next year and is replaced by a first grade. The fourth grade moves to the present first grade and there will be approximately 100 additional elementary students to house.

Three and possibly four class rooms at the Lincoln school will be needed to handle the increase. The present enrollment at the Lincoln school shows a ninth grade of 24 students and 100 in the eighth grade with 312 pupils. The last figure includes youngsters from the Carey, Hagerman and Mountain View districts. Next year the 203 sixth graders from the grade schools will be moved to the Lincoln school.

Unlike the grade schools, the junior high has no room for expansion. The school has had to be determined. The high school with 725 students can accommodate 100 more pupils. However, in two years classes of over 300 students will be entering and the school will be crowded.

It is obvious that within three years construction should be started on a new high school. If all plans issued are passed on schedule the new building program runs to no more than \$100,000. It may be necessary before a building project is completed. The entire school system is in a state of transition. The new high school will be completed by the end of the year.

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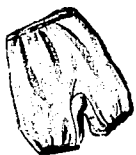
