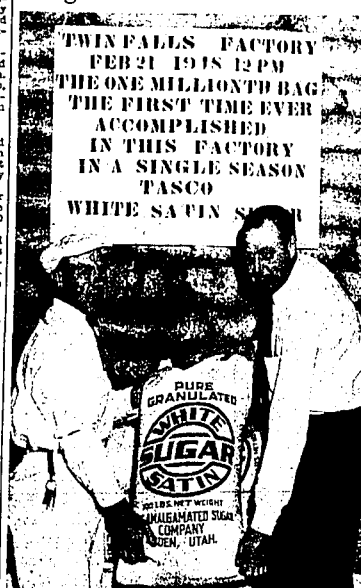

**Power Firms In Northwest Set Projects**

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### Manslaughter Case, 14 Civil Suits Pending

Eight jury and six non-jury cases are on the civil calendar for district court, Charles A. Bullis, county clerk, has announced. The cases will start March 8. With the exception of one case, all are scheduled to be heard by Judge James W. Porter.

Judge Porter also will hear the last case remaining on the criminal calendar when Ira L. Dougan is slated to go on trial on a manslaughter charge March 2. Dougan, who is represented by Lowe and Lowe, Burley, is charged with manslaughter in connection with the automobile death last June 20 of Mrs. Mildred Standler.

Judge Stephen Set. On March 15, Judge Doran H. Sutphen will conduct the trial here of C. A. Robinson vs. C. D. Smith and others. WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP) — A former Japanese soldier has surrendered to the navy after quietly farming on the largest of the Palau islands for the past four years. The navy announced the surrender here.

Shihangaki Kazuo told the navy on Koror island he would have given up sooner but he didn't know the war was over.

Back in 1943 when the United States forces took over Peilithon, Kazuo was told by his superiors to go where he pleased. He built himself a bamboo boat and inspected island after island until he decided on Babelthap.

Now Kazuo doesn't want to go back to Japan but the navy is going to send him there, anyway.

### Solons Agree on 30-Day Rent Lid

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—A 30-day extension of rent controls was agreed on today by senate and house Republican leaders. The present controls are due to expire Feb. 29.

Senator Taft, R., of Ohio, reported the senate will extend the law to the next week on a 30-day extension bill the house is expected to pass Tuesday.

The extension would allow both chambers time to decide whether to continue controls, for how long and in what form. The senate now is debating a bill to continue controls 18 months with some changes from the present law.

### Ashida Is Named Japan's Premier

TOKYO, Feb. 21 (UP)—Hitoshi Ashida, a conservative and former foreign minister, today was elected Japan's fifth premier since the war. Diet members cast 316 votes for Ashida, giving him a clear majority among the four candidates considered.

Former Premier Shigeru Yoshida received 180 votes; Former Premier Teiichi Katayama, 8; and Communist Kiyochi Tokuda, 3.

The election was little more than a formality after the powerful Social Democratic party revealed earlier in the day that it would support Ashida. He succeeds Katayama.

### Klan-Fighting South Coach To Be Fired

LAKEVIEW, Ga., Feb. 21 (UP)—Coach Walter Bowland, who strapped on a .45-caliber to scare off the Ku Klux Klan, hasn't been fired yet.

The berry ex-marine said he thought he had been dismissed yesterday when one of his pupils at Lakeview high school told him, "We're sorry to hear that you've been fired."

Later, the coach ran into Ruth Williams, Caloons county school superintendent. She said she had read about his being fired but that it hadn't happened yet.

Suspension Told

"But I'll tell you one thing," Miss Williams added. "You'll receive a notice very shortly that you have been suspended until the board of education meets the first of next month. All this publicity is disgraceful!"

The school trustees had voted to let Bowland go because, they claimed, he had failed as a coach and because he wouldn't stop giving out "publicity." The trustees can only recommend, however; the board of education has the final word.

Acted Against Klan

Bowland said the trustees really wanted to get rid of him because he had "the guts" to haul out a gun and get friends to do likewise at a school basketball game Tuesday night. He said the Klan had designated that as the night to "get" him.

He added that his "green" basketball team won eight games and lost four.

The whole thing started, he explained, when he knocked down a former student who was trying to break up a basketball practice session. The Klan threatened to tar and feather him if he didn't leave town.

### Simplot's Buying Of S. L. Plant to Undergo Inquiry

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (UP)—The Justice department's anti-trust division is investigating the sale of the war-built alumina plant near Fort Lathrop, Colo., to J. R. Simplot of Boise and Pocatello.

Simplot, wealthy Idaho industrialist, purchased the plant from the war assets administration in December and began remodeling it to produce commercial fertilizer.

The department said today it investigates all deals involving more than \$100,000 to determine whether the buyer would be in a position to monopolize the market.

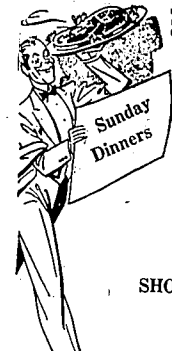

### Red Cross Conducts Class on First Aid to Slash Death Toll

Every three seconds an accident brings injury to some man, woman or child in the United States. Every five minutes an accident brings death to someone.

To help cut down this waste of life, the Twin Falls chapter of the American Red Cross is conducting first aid classes and is planning accident prevention classes for this fall.

Since Marie Valley is essentially an agricultural center, the Red Cross is planning an active farm accident program.

Falls are the chief cause of home accidents. Other major causes are burns, poisonings, suffocation and firearms.

Contrary to the popular belief that accidents, like taxes, are inevitable, most accidents can be prevented, Mrs. Bailey said.

Red Cross courses in accident prevention for adults and young people teach methods for eliminating hazards and reducing accidents in homes, on farms, and places of business.

**Cost Exceeds Budget**  
Cost to the Red Cross for conducting first aid and accident prevention programs far exceeded its budget in 1947. A more active program is being planned for this coming year.

The money used for these purposes is raised annually by the Red Cross. This year, during the March fund campaign, the Twin Falls Red Cross chapter must collect \$22,000 to properly administer all of its activities.

Collections in Twin Falls will begin March 1. Before that time contributions may be sent to local Red Cross headquarters in the Twin Falls public library building.

He took with him a resolution calling the resigned ministers "agents of foreign reaction."

Another was Education Minister Petr Zelenka, a Czech national socialist who was marked for assassination in the plot. Other named communist members were involved in the plot.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—American Legion National Commander James F. O'Brien today proposed that, after GI education, 4,000,000 veterans be sent abroad to help administer the Marshall plan.

"Two million veterans," he said in an interview, "who are now in legions and other schools, will do a disheartened and disturbing group after they finish their studies for they will have no outlet for their brains."

"My cure is to send them to countries which are benefiting under the Marshall plan where their education can be used in their training in rehabilitation work."

He said he had consulted ambassadors to countries which will benefit by the Marshall plan and that the veterans would be of much help.

### Crank Blamed in Threat of Death

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 21 (AP)—An assassination threat against Mayor Earl Riley was reported today by police who said he believed it was the work of a crank.

The threat was made in a 4-a. m. telephone call to a newspaper office. Police were sent to the mayor's home. Riley said he wasn't disturbed as this was the first time he received a threat.

The mayor has been in the center of a controversy since he received a notice a city club committee reported that vice and gambling interests operate in Portland under police protection. The club membership yesterday approved the report but directed its committee to amend it by naming names. The mayor told the city club the charges were unfounded.

### Fishermen Idled By Court Ruling

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21 (AP)—Hundreds of fishermen have been made idle temporarily by a court decision upholding a state law governing the size of trawl fishing nets, an industry spokesman said today.

Joseph L. Aloia, attorney for the Northern California Fisheries Association, said 800 fishermen and 25,000 workers were idle yesterday. He said many fishermen would have to wait until July to obtain new nets. "Minimum mesh size of five inches as specified by law."

The federal court ruling affected only nets on "bottom fish," such as sole, sand dabs and rock cod.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 21 (AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said today the whole chance for world peace and the future of the United Nations rests with success of the Palestine partition plan.

The president's widow made the statement at a foreign policy discussion at the first annual convention of Americans for Democratic Action.

Mrs. Roosevelt said flatly that the United States must help implement the U. N. Palestine decision. There is no other course.

### Dixie Solons See No Hope of Halting 'Civil Rights' Legislation of President

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—A secret senate poll has convinced some southern Democratic leaders they have almost no hope of blocking approval of civil rights legislation in this session of congress.

A veteran Dixie senator, who helped count noses today a reporter the southerners now appear to have lost the Republican support they need to prevent adoption of a gag rule on senate debate.

He said President Truman's demand for anti-lynch, anti-poll tax and anti-discrimination laws has been accepted as a political challenge by the GOP members. As a result, he said, few, if any, Republicans will vote against limited debate.

This prospect arose as some 50 Democratic house members from the states of the Old Confederacy broadened their drive against the Truman civil rights program.

They and five southern congressmen will slam down their criticism of the program Monday before Sen. J. Howard McGrath, R. I., the Democratic national chairman. Governors Loney, Ariz.; Dewar, Ark.; Cherry, Va.; Thurmond, S. C.; and Throckmold, N. C. are heading for the capital.

The only promise McGrath has given is that he will pass their proposals along to Mr. Truman. The president tonight was on route to the Virgin Islands where he was to be given an official reception by William H. Hastie, Negro governor of that Caribbean outpost.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—The fate of more than 1,000 American soldiers in North Vietnam is being hidden by the jungles of the region.

The army said today the American graves registration service has suspended further search for the bodies of fliers and other American military personnel after more than two years of intensive probing in the wild hinterland.

Many of the 1,000 men who failed to arrive at destinations, were air force crews believed to have crashed on inaccessible mountain peaks where humans seldom if ever traveled by jungle.

While the searches here have been called off, any future evidence warranting an inquiry in a specific case will mean a new hunt, the army said.

### Large Change Expected for Idaho Survey

For the first time in eight years, the bureau of the census in 1948 is conducting in Idaho and throughout the nation a full scale census of manufacturing. This census, begun in 1910, has been conducted at varying intervals since. Through 1899 it was conducted at 10-year intervals, from 1904 to 1918 at five-year intervals, and every two years from 1919 through 1939. The surveys for 1941, 1943 and 1945 were not conducted because of the war.

Idaho, in 1939, had 540 manufacturing establishments and statistics for 1947 are expected to reveal a substantial increase. The state's industrial employment total at this census included 12,038 persons with wages and salaries amounting to \$16,214,412 and value added by manufacture to \$31,700,000.

The state's principal industry group in 1939, in terms of the average number of wage earners employed during the year, was that engaged in the manufacture of lumber and timber base products with 6,018 workers in 111 establishments with wages totalling \$7,232,000 and a value added by manufacture of \$13,616,000.

The first census of manufacturing to include Idaho was that for 1870 when the state was still a territory. Idaho territory reported a value of 101 establishments, employing 253 workers, with wages of \$1,227,712 and a value of products of \$1,047,624. The chief industry, in terms of dollar value of products, was the milling of quartz with 10 establishments employing 53 workers at wages of \$41,250 and a value of products of \$22,108.

Flour and grist mill products ranked second, \$21,010, with three establishments employing 10 workers at wages totalling \$2,000. Blacksmithing was third with 25 establishments employing 50 workers, whose wages totalled \$14,000. The smithies reported the value of their products as \$70,880.

While the census of manufacturing is being conducted by mail through inquiries sent from Washington, D. C., headquarters of the census bureau, such follow-up work as may be necessary in Idaho will be conducted from census hearing field offices at Caldwell, Seattle, Wash., and Salt Lake City, Utah.

### Steel Leaders Defend Boosts Of Iron Price

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 21 (AP)—Steel industry executives declared today that a recent flurry of price increases on steel products merely offset higher costs and was not in anticipation of a new round of wage raises for steel workers.

Benjamin F. Fairless, president of U. S. Steel corporation, said the price change "mentioned in recent press accounts" relate primarily to semi-finished steel and were not a general increase.

"The adjustment was made to take care of a particular situation of limited scope," he said. "It has nothing to do with future wage demands and should not be understood as indicating any trend in general steel prices."

Republic Steel Pres. C. M. White declared in a letter to the trade publication Iron Age that the price boosts "are attempting to compensate for past wage increases which were folded upon the public behind a smoke screen set up by phony economists and former department of commerce new dealers."

"This last October, CIO Pres. Philip Murray charged that the steel industry had increased prices by \$23,000,000 annually since last October. He served notice that his steel workers' union will seek "substantial wage boosts in negotiations which open in April."

### Pliers, Bed Slat Save Tot From Eagle's Clutch

CARLSBAD, N. M., Feb. 21 (AP)—A pair of pliers and a bed slat were the weapons used by a Carlsbad couple to save their 4-year-old son from an eagle's clutches.

The mother, Mrs. G. J. Reinhart, told it this way:

"The child was playing in the yard while she hung out a wash. Suddenly, the big bird appeared in the yard. It hopped to the child and dug its talons into his head.

For a minute she pulled in vain at the eagle's legs, then ran to the house.

Returning with a pair of pliers, she jerked the talons free, snatched up her son and rushed him to a doctor. Three talons had pierced the child's skin.

In the meantime, her husband had returned home. Reinhart beat the bird to death with a bed slat.

Examination of the bird showed its tail feathers had been pulled out. Reinhart said he understood it had been captured in nearby mountains and had escaped from his cage. The name of the owner has not been determined.

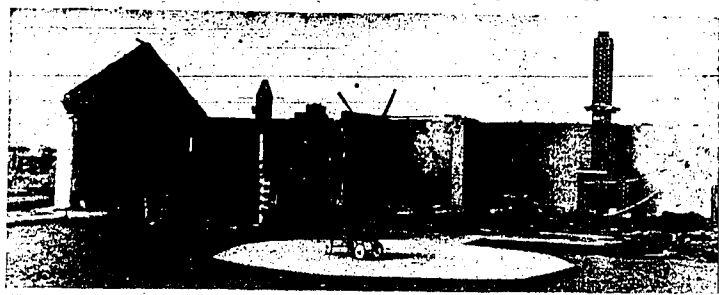

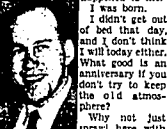
### Rodeo Planned by Carey for July 24

**Lack of Cash Halts USAF's Pilot Program**

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21 (AP)—Nearly 8,000 U. S. reserve pilots, the bulk of the nation's standby air force on the Pacific coast, were grounded today by a government "technical" order.

Curtailment of air reserve flight training and proficiency programs throughout the United States by military plans to idle and affect half a handful of pilots who built the United States to its wartime peak as the world's greatest air power.

Funds dwindle

Col. D. B. Hamilton, reserve commander at Lancaster field, said dwindling fiscal 1947 financial appropriations caused E. Doree headquarters in Washington to issue the order.

He said it was "temporary—possibly until July," but could not say if the program would be resumed at the beginning of the new fiscal year.

The shut-down was nationwide. Orders were made to estimate the total number of reservists who might be affected throughout the country.

**350 To Continue**

Only 350 pilots out of 8,000 reservists assigned to nearby Hamilton field will be allowed to continue military flying under the reduced program. Colonel Lancaster said military flying is to be continued throughout the fourth air force, which embraces nine western states.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 21 (AP)—Harold E. Stassen entered the Oregon preference primary election today, opposing Gov. Thomas E.enas for the Republican presidential choice in this first test of how western sentiment will run in the presidential election.

Stassen filed by statement which he personally handed to the state election chief, David O'Hara, in response to the petition signed by the Republican voters of Oregon. I have decided to file in the Oregon preference primary.

"We will carry on an active and constructive campaign on the major issues before the country."

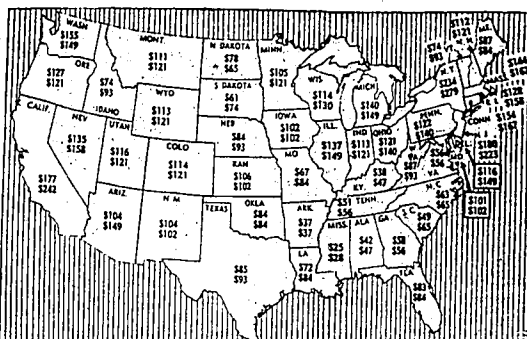

**How Shrinking Dollar Hits Schools**



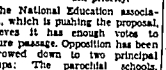

**Federal Cash Aid to Schools Being Pushed Toward Reality**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Legislation to provide \$300,000,000 a year for federal aid to public schools at last seems to have a chance after being kicked around for 20 years.

A bipartisan bill, backed by four Republicans and four Democrats will probably come up for vote in the senate soon.

A companion bill in the house may be deferred until April or May.

The National Education association, which is pushing the proposal, believes it has enough votes to ensure passage. Opposition has been narrowed down to two principal groups: The parochial schools, which would get no help from the present draft; and the people who believe that elementary school education is the responsibility of the state—not the federal government.

The National Education association has just announced the results of a new national survey, intended to show how much federal aid to public school systems, and the inability of many of the poorer states to meet what are considered adequate educational standards. In general it shows that the great post-war crisis in the schools—heightened in the papers in 1945-46—has now been greatly relieved, but is still far from being solved.

The teacher shortage isn't so bad. Out of nearly 900,000 teachers, the number of unlicensed is still 107,000—a drop of only 13,000 from the 120,000 in 1943. Pay scales have been raised from an average of \$1,646 a year, at the end of the war, to \$2,550 in the current school year. That's an average increase of \$700.

**Canner Urges Farm Support Plan Changes**

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 21 (AP)—A National Cannery association of financial today urged that the government crop-support program be modified so that it will not compete destructively with unsupported crop surpluses and avoid dangerous and costly surpluses.

The speaker was Howard T. Cummings, Rochester, N. Y., president of the association. He said that the 28th annual conference here of the Utah Canners' association.

He said the current federal crop-support program is unsatisfactory to processors of foodstuffs. He also stated that many growers "are coming to see that the price of a support program may turn out to be a price adjustment."

"Too much government in the growing business may be just as undesirable as it is in most other businesses," said Cummings.

### Range Lands Are Bettered By Reseeding

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—Five million acres of Idaho grazing range land could be improved by reseeded range lands, according to a report of the United States Forest Service.

Typical of results in range improvement listed by President Roosevelt in his message last week was the Willow Creek program in the Boise national forest.

**1,900 Acres Borne**  
A total of 1,900 acres was burned over in 1942. After reseeding the grazing capacity jumped from 123 cow-months to 1,150 cow-months. Average cost of seeding 6,000 Idaho acres last year was \$1.00 per acre. For protection cost an additional \$2.00 per acre.

Forest officials said a 507-acre tract in the Almo park division of the kingdom forest was reseeded and fenced at a cost of \$11.10 per acre. A 20 per cent cut in grazing permits was thought necessary to prevent erosion. In 1940 some 10,000 acres of irrigated land below the area.

**17 Per Cent Eliminated**  
Now forest officials intend the senator, reseeding promises to eliminate 17 per cent of the cut. Forest service plans to reseed some 10,000 acres with an estimated annual increase in feed of 14,000 cow-months. It was estimated that 500,000 acres of land available for reseeded are in forests and 2,400,000 acres are on federal, state, county or private lands which could be used in conjunction with forest areas.

## German Leaders and Unity; Whatever It Is, They Seem to Be "Against" It

The second day in Frankfurt, Germany, accepted a cigarette and put it carefully away in the breast pocket of his suit jacket. He would smoke the cigarette after dinner.

"Let us presume that the London conference of foreign ministers will help us recognize the facts of the Russian occupation of eastern Germany—that the Russians probably won't ever move out. What, then, do you believe to be the chances for success of any effort to unite the three western zones of Germany on a concrete economic and political unity?"

The old man was quite emotional about it. In his emotion he failed to give any such answer. "The German unity" stems from to him date in history, but from a time no earlier than 1911. Before that Germany had been balkanized into kingdoms, duchies, grand duchies, principalities far beyond anything the victorious allies ever had in mind.

"How can we do anything when we aren't allowed any freedom of action in anything?" They ask and ask again. Privately, they go further. "The Americans are nice people, but they're making a botch of Germany. Now if it were left to us..."

"But when it is suggested that the American army might leave the continent, it opens in such terms as this: 'In this American zone in the American zone to go about the business of their own salvation, they raise their hands in horror. And leave western Europe to the Russians!'"

with the unification of western Germany immediately after the London conference died in stalemate. I doubt they did. But whether they or not, their negative approach to the suggestion was inescapable.

These men, most of them dating back to the time of Germany's wobbly Weimer republic, have all been cleared long since of any tinge of nation or aggressive militarism. Mostly they are professional politicians who were out of office during the years of Nazi power. Vocally they are democratic. But they are Germans, and this strongly implies an intense nationalism that has nothing to do with Nazism or Hitlerism.

Now that our plan to unite western Germany is an announced fact, it's certain that they won't oppose it, openly in such terms as this quoted above. They don't oppose us openly in anything. But in this, as in everything else we sit upon to do, they are a drag. They won't actively help us. They want to make an occupied Germany work.

"The total sum of what they said in strong opposition to any plan to try to make western Germany function independently of eastern Germany—leads to the inevitable assumption that they will be of little help to us in that direction. The 'I have no way of knowing whether these German leaders had any advance knowledge that we would announce a plan to go ahead'..."

### U. S. Returns Bedsheets for Belgian Town

HEMORVILLE, Belgium, Feb. 21 (AP)—The Good people of Hemorville got their bedsheet back today from the Americans.

Col. John Hanlon of Winchester, Mass., presented each of the 24 Hemorville villagers with a pair of crisp new bedsheets in the name of his fellow townspeople.

It was a day of joy for this tiny snow-covered hamlet of three miles north of Bastogne. The church bells pealed, bagpipes sounded and the children waved Belgian and American flags.

"Winchester Day"  
They called it "Winchester day," this is the story behind the gesture:

On Christmas eve in 1944, Hanlon, then a major commanding the first battalion of the 502nd parachute infantry, dropped out of the skies with his men onto the snow-covered fields surrounding Hemorville.

Hanlon went to the church and the bell. He explained the Americans needed camouflage to hide them from the Germans.

Gave up Sheets  
The villagers went to their homes and returned with precious snow-white bed sheets. Hanlon promised the sheets would be returned.

### Robins Displays Language Talent

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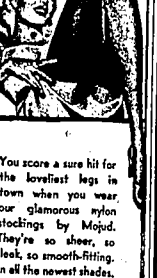

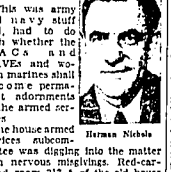

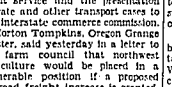

## Disagreement Rampant on Trio Of State Acts Passed in 1947

**BOISE, Feb. 21**—The election of Idaho legislators will be spotlighted this year, perhaps more than any election year in the history of the state, and that spotlight will be on despite the consuming interest in the presidential and congressional campaigns.

As far as state politics are concerned the interest must lie with the election of the 44 state senators and 20 representatives. No other state official will be elected.

The three major issues of the 1947 legislature—liquor, slot machines and school reorganization—on which there were more or less agreement, not counting the fact of certain technical details, will be the three major issues of the 1948 campaign. But this time disagreement is rampant.

There is no question that the legislature will be begged to amend the liquor law to allow the sale of liquor over the bar without restriction of area instead of only within the limits of cities and villages. There will be an effort to repeal the slot machine law. And opposition is stirring against school reorganization and consolidation.

The 1947 legislature passed the liquor law in good faith holding that legalizing of liquor by the drink was the best answer to tax law enforcement. So far that premise has proved to be correct. Slot machines were legalized for a similar reason, but primarily as a revenue raising measure. There was no opposition of any consequence against the school reorganization law.

As Alfr. Glen, Robert E. Smylie pointed out in his Lincoln day address in Pocatello, the state commission of law enforcement has been sued more times in an effort to halt liquor enforcement than in all history. The state commission, which was formed by a law amendment in the 1946 legislature, is still in session. Two efforts to get a final supreme court decision on validity of the 1947 slot machine law have failed.

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
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
