Austin said in his speech before the council last night that the United States considered calling a special Palestine session of the U. N. assembly.

Truman Acts For Palestine Losing Votes

 WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—The new Democratic coalition and President Truman's election prospects are taking another notch on this chin today.

The trouble lies in Palestine. But its importance there is a matter of domestic politics. The President's Palestine policy stated yesterday to the United Nations at Lake Success will not please the Jews here. They want our arms embargo lifted so Palestine Jews may arm themselves further against the Arabs, and, perhaps, dispatch of armed United Nations forces to establish the Jewish homeland.

N. Y. Demos Worried
 A lot of electoral votes could ride on that kind of an issue, probably more than 100. Worried New York state Democratic leaders are talking with the Jews, with Henry A. Wallace and others in opposition to Mr. Truman's Palestine policy. The reason is simple enough. New York doubters will go Republican this year if the Jews bail. So may other states.

Jews are especially numerous among the nine big states. Their resentment continues through the presidential campaign. On election day, it is fair to assume Mr. Truman will lose a tremendous vote which goes east for the late FDR. The administration's chance of avoiding that loss depends on adjustment of the Palestine situation to the satisfaction of most American Jews by next November.

Population Told
 The states with the most considerable Jewish populations are California, Connecticut, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania. The Jewish cities of the United States are New York with 2,025,000, Buffalo, Newark, N. J., Baltimore, Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and St. Louis.

Mr. Roosevelt let the Jews in tightly with his administrations. That association with the Democratic party may be expected to break up if Jewish dissatisfaction with the administration's Palestine policy is not overcome. Politics is making powerful political medicine with Palestine.

Favors Embargo to Arabs
 He is publicly on record for repeal of the arms embargo and for pressure on the British to embargo shipments of arms to the Arab. And Wallace wants the United States to take the lead in organization of a United Nations army to impose partition on the Arab population of Palestine. All that will get votes for his third term.

Sen. Robert A. Taft, R., O., who seeks the Republican presidential nomination, says Mr. Truman's do-nothing policy on Palestine. Taft hit the headlines Sunday with a demand that the United Nations use force in Palestine to obtain partition.

Both Taft and Wallace have tempting bait for Jewish voters.

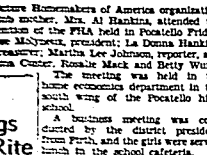

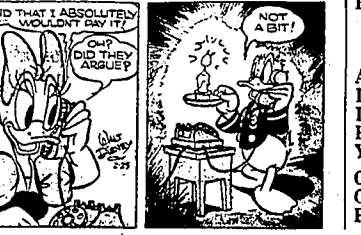

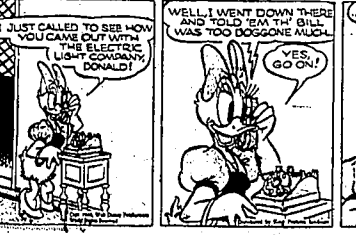

liberal candidates on the Democratic ticket." Then he added:

"I am hopeful that the central committee of the Democratic party will take no action prejudicing or closing the door on such a working agreement. Personally, my disagreement is with the national leadership of the Democratic party and not with my friends in the Democratic party in Idaho."

(Caravanti, before he left Wednesday morning for Boise, told the Times-News he had not received a message from Taylor and he "has not heard from Taylor in months.")

Earlier Taylor covered the state with a mimeographed letter in which he said a third party would be formed in Idaho, but no congressional offices will be put up "unless the Coulter-Cassett faction should be triumphant in the Democratic party resulting in the nomination of reactionary candidates."

He added if the candidate of the Democratic party in Idaho were "at all acceptable" they will have the whole-hearted support of the third party.

Taylor was referring to former Sen. Charles C. Gossitt and former three-term Democratic State Chairman Robert Coulter. Taylor stumped the state against Gossitt in 1946 and favored George Donart of Weber for the Democratic senatorial nomination. Donart won the nomination but lost the election to Sen. Henry Dworshak, R., Ida. in the same campaign. Taylor accused Coulter of holding back funds for his (Taylor's) campaign.

Coulter immediately replied: "Taylor has said the Democratic party has left him. But he still re-

erves the right to come into Idaho and tell the Democrats who they should nominate for office. I don't believe the Democrats of Idaho want this traitor to the Democratic party to take their candidates."

Just how much support Taylor will have in the central committee meeting is not known. Leading Idaho Democrats who supported in his former campaigns for the U. S. senate have denounced him for his views on foreign policy and for his bolt of the Democratic party.

No other top-ranking Democrat has come out in opposition to the meeting in the Democratic caucus convention. Just the reverse is true. In Democratic meetings to date, resolutions have been adopted pledging full support to the European recovery plan and to the President.

A lot of words should fly at the central committee meeting. It was called merely to pick the site and date for the Democratic Delegate convention. But Taylor's action in the third party will provide the fireworks tomorrow.

The committee meeting will be held in the afternoon. At the Jackson-Jefferson day dinner, Attorney Grover A. Giles of Utah will deliver the main address.
