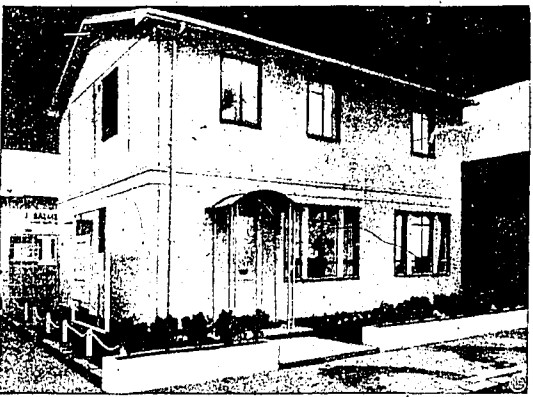

Chinese Reds Release Four U. S. Marines

SHANGHAI, April 1 (AP)—Four U. S. marines captured by the Chinese communists while on a Christmas day hunting trip in north China were released today.

U. S. navy authorities reported the leathernecks were released at Haiyang, a coastal city 60 miles northwest of U. S. western Pacific fleet headquarters at Tientsin.

There were no immediate details, but officials said they presumed the four are in good condition.

Fifth Man Died

Efforts are being made to recover the body of a fifth, Mr. Charles J. Brayton, Jr., Fort Jay, Governor's Island, N. Y., who died of wounds received in the incident.

The four survivors, William L. Toland, Fort Worth, Tex.; Pfc. Carl W. Anderson, Omaha, Neb.; Pfc. Robert Hart, Pittsburgh, Pa.; and Pfc. Thomas Kapodistria, Buffalo, N. Y.

There has been no clear account of what happened Christmas morning near the village of Wangmu, where the five were captured. Marine authorities reported the five entered Communist territory after the process of Chinese national guards at Lingchuan.

Aided Nationalists

The communists reported Feb. 13—his one of their daily propaganda broadcasts—that the marines were participating in China's civil war on the Nationalist side. They said Brayton was wounded fatally in a skirmish.

The communists later were reported demanding \$120,000 ransom for the four, but the U. S. embassy in Nanking said it had no information on that.

Four of the marines were on leave for the hunting trip. The fifth was AWOL. Their burned and wrecked jeep was found by Chinese Communist troops shortly after the marines disappeared.

Minidoka's Agent Asks for Freedom Gardens for Area

TUPPER, April 1—Willard E. Kutz, county agent, has asked for freedom gardens in the Minidoka county area to raise more produce this year.

Kutz pointed out that the need for producing home grown food is great since many of the world's area is seriously short of food. By producing and preserving large amounts of home grown food, more supplies can be shipped abroad, the county agent added.

2. The home garden saves money for the family budget.
3. Garden produce will decrease the demand for more buying and will save food so more can be sent to Europe.

Analyst Sees 'Necessity' in Franco Okay

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR.

There is only one explanation for the surprising unanimity of the house in deciding that Spain should be included in the Marshall plan. It is a hard word.

Francisco represents the totalitarianism against which the world's democracies have been struggling for 16 years. It is not merely Spain, it is a way of thought and a way of government which we ought to suppress in Germany and which we are now failing to prevent Russia from spreading.

Step-by-Step War
It has become a step-by-step war in which we have been taking on the most dangerous enemies of the moment, which we are taking on the weapons of most immediate effect, but which taken we are willing to accept the help of governments of which we disapprove in order to keep their countries from falling under the sway of, and being used by, the chief opponent. The democracies did not move against Franco immediately after the war because they feared to open the door to communism in Spain. It is still an important factor.

May Be Inefficient
But even the plea of expediency may prove insufficient. The house action already has been very damaging to allied hopes for the Italian election next month. To many Italians, Franco and the now-deposed Mussolini represent one and the same thing. "The communists can say 'Yes, we told you America is fascist'."

The senate, and the state department which is known to disapprove of cooperating with Franco, probably will block the proposal. The United Nations "near-brother" in political relations with Spain will be a factor.

Did America Put U. N. 'on the Spot' With Palestine Switch? Observers Say It Did

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y. (NEA)—Many experts here, both diplomats and laymen, say that the United States put the United Nations "on the spot" with the Palestine problem.

They charge the U. S. with bungling, bungling, carelessness and thoughtlessness. "Palestine ought never to have come to the U. N. at all," said one highly-placed observer. "It was a matter for the U. S. and Great Britain to handle by diplomatic methods. But the United States didn't dare do that because of the political anger in an issue so vital to the Jewish people. So the issue was dumped into the lap of the United Nations that already had more troubles than it could handle."

That was only the beginning. Some might question whether the U. S. had any special obligation to the Jews. The democracies did not move against Franco immediately after the war because they feared to open the door to communism in Spain. It is still an important factor.

But even the plea of expediency may prove insufficient. The house action already has been very damaging to allied hopes for the Italian election next month. To many Italians, Franco and the now-deposed Mussolini represent one and the same thing. "The communists can say 'Yes, we told you America is fascist'."

The senate, and the state department which is known to disapprove of cooperating with Franco, probably will block the proposal. The United Nations "near-brother" in political relations with Spain will be a factor.

Compromise Pending. The senate version of the aid bill provides for such a committee. The two bills will be considered by a joint house-senate conference committee which will compromise the two versions.

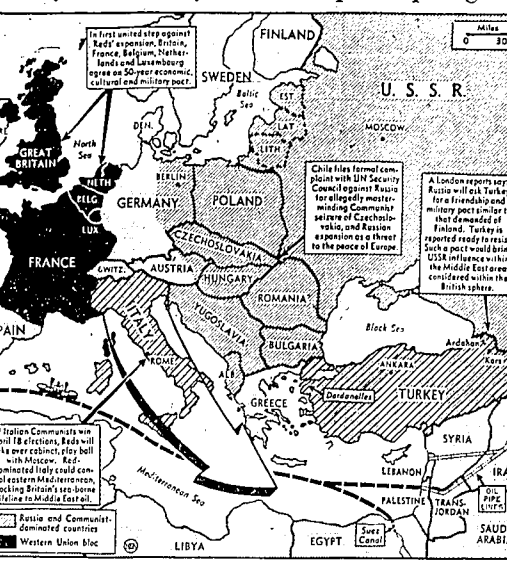
Goff had a reporter he hopes a sound businessman will be appointed administrator of the program, but any event, he feels the congress should be in a position to have a close check on operations.

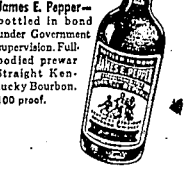

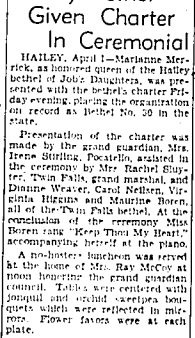

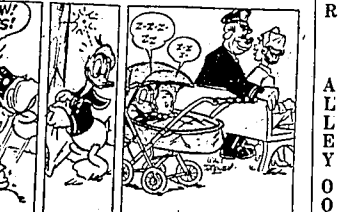

Mine Walkout Biting Deeper In Steel Area

PITTSBURGH, April 1 (AP)—The steel industry counted 38 blast furnaces banded today as the 18-day-old soft coal walkout bites deeper into national production. Another five will be closed within the next few days if the shutdown continues. The 400,000 members of the United Mine Workers, idle to back up their demand for \$100 monthly pay raises, today celebrated John L. Lewis day—also known in some areas as Mitchell day, in honor of the sponsor of the eight-hour working day.

Meanwhile, throughout the country more than 20,000 other workers were idle in steel, railroading and other industries, closely allied to coal.

Railroads Hit
Coal-carrying railroads were hard hit. The Chesapeake and Ohio had furloughed 13,400 employes and the Baltimore and Ohio an estimated 6,000.

Other railroads reported these workers laid off: The Pittsburgh and Lake Erie, 670; the Vestington, 900; the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific, 250 and other lines, smaller numbers. The New York Central planned to lay off 800 at Cleveland by Saturday. The coal hauling Utah railroad was closed.

Birmingham, biggest industrial center of the south, reported steel production cut to approximately 48 per cent of normal and about 2,000 workers were idle by the coal shortage.

Furnaces, Hearths Closed
Seven blast furnaces and six open hearths were closed in the area. The Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad company rail mill at Ensley, employing 500, was shut. Fifty coke ovens were idled at Republic's site. Thomas works in Birmingham, the American Cast Iron Pipe company was operating only three days a week because of a coal-induced pipe iron shortage, affecting 1,200 to 1,300 not included in the 3,000 reported idle. Cerris a steel company in Utah laid off 600 men.

At Buffalo, the CIO-United Steelworkers reported the American Radiator and Standard Sanitary corporation was suspending operation, idling 1,500.

Deadline Nearing On Soil Planning

BOISE, April 1 (AP)—The Idaho production and marketing committee today advised Idaho farmers that May 1 is the deadline for signing 1948 conservation plan sheets. FMA Committee Chairman A. V. McCormack, Lewiston, said conservation practices include green manuring, application of fertilizers, noxious weed control and range improvement. Last year about 40,000 Idaho farmers participated in the conservation program.

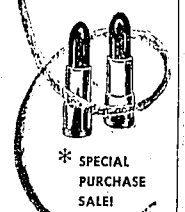
Canal Group Sets Budget of \$1,200

21 Prominent Citizens Asked To Judge Rift

NEW YORK, April 1 (AP)—The United Financial Employees (AFU) today invited 21 prominent citizens to investigate its dispute with the New York stock exchanges and submit a report for "public judgment."

The invitations were sent to such figures as RCA Pres. David Sarnoff and Bernard M. Baruch on the fourth day of the financial workers' strike against the New York exchanges.
"We are perfectly willing to subject our case to impartial scrutiny," said the letter, signed by M. David Keville, union president.

At the same time, the union announced in circulars distributed by rain-drenched pickets that it was setting up plans to broaden the strike.
"The strike is to be general and we intend to ask non-union employees to participate," the handbills said.

The union said in its invitations to the group of private citizens that it took the strike step with "greatest reluctance" and it "challenged the employers to be equally ready to submit their case."

The union also announced that Alfred Baker Lewis, who it identified as "a prominent business executive," had undertaken to form a citizens committee supporting the strike.
The only comment from Emil Schramm, president of the stock exchange, was: "I have no interest whatsoever in any proposal made by one Mr. Alfred Baker Lewis."
