June Classes Set Here for Polio Project

Mrs. Frankie Alworth, local representative at a recent meeting of the state polio board at Boise, was speaker at the Lincoln school PTA study group meeting Thursday afternoon.

She announced classes will be held here in June for polio emergency workers. Physical therapists and a nurse will teach the course, and Mrs. Alworth said that the training received will be an asset in the home and will prepare workers for an emergency epidemic.

In her discussion of the disease, Mrs. Alworth related some unusual facts about the 1941 polio epidemic in Idaho. Prior to that time, she said there was no record of babies or adults over 60 having the disease. However, in that year's epidemic a five-month-old baby and an adult 60 years old and another 68 were stricken. She said that specialists from all over the country came to Boise during the epidemic to study the patients and the causes and cures of the disease.

Mrs. Alworth pointed out that Idahoans owe a great deal of thanks to the Elks for donating their home, purchased for crippled children, for conversion into a polio hospital at Boise. She said that patients will be cared for in Hobbs and Pocatello until the new Twin Falls hospital is completed.

Of the \$150,000 for the polio in Idaho, Mrs. Alworth reported that \$70,000 was from the state fund, and the rest was borrowed from the national foundation.

Mrs. Fred Spitzer, chairman of the study group, introduced the speaker and also Charles E. Cotton, superintendent at the south central district health unit and Lincoln school bus master, who showed a film on polio.

Travel by Plane Increases; Rail Figures Decline

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Airline travel pushed beyond the six billion passenger-mile level for the first time last year. It was about one-half as great as railroad Pullman travel.

The Air Transport Association reported this today in a revised summary of 1947 statistics for 12 major domestic airlines.

Airline passenger traffic totaled 6,991,121,000 passenger-miles (number of passengers multiplied by distance traveled), an increase of 18 per cent over 1946. The association said this was the smallest increase over a preceding year with the exception of 1942, when half of the airline planes were drafted into military service.

Meanwhile, it said, railroad Pullman travel dropped 27.8 per cent to 12,342,500,000 passenger-miles; rail coach travel fell 29 per cent, and intercity bus travel was off 7.5 per cent, compared with 1946.

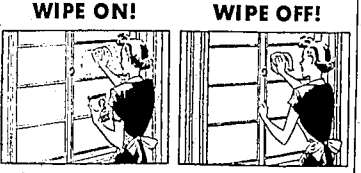

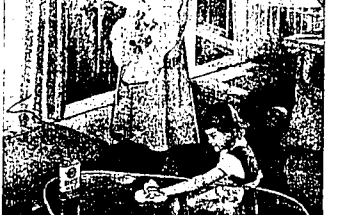

Through Minority, Communists Control Power for Costa Rica

(Editor's note: This is the second of two dispatches on the Costa Rican revolution.)

By PETER EDSON WASHINGTON, (N.A.A.) — If O. Henry were alive today and writing of Latin-American revolution, he would have a new type of character to introduce in his plots. It would be the Latin American communist.

The current revolution in Costa Rica offers an example.

The little republic of Costa Rica has been considered one of the most stable of the Central American countries. It has the reputation of rich Spanish graneros and big estates. Coffee plantations on the central upland plateau have been run by small and middle-class land owners. There have been few great accumulations of wealth and little peasant poverty.

Biggest operator in the country has been United Fruit company. Most of its plantations used to be on the Caribbean coast, which is low and tropical. When disease hit the banana plants three some years ago, United Fruit moved over the mountains to the Pacific coast.

The one railroad from the eastern port of Limon to San Jose, the capital, is British-owned. The extension to the Pacific is owned by the government. United Fruit runs most of the shipping.

In summary, Costa Rica's living standard is higher than in most parts of South America. There has been no great exploitation of the populace. It hasn't been a country where there was great unrest. It wasn't a place where you would expect communism to take over as it

has in other parts of the world.

According to Washington reports, the Communist in Costa Rica is believed to be a woman. She was born Maria Isabel Carrvallo. She now goes under the name of Carmen Lora. She is 46 years old and was a school teacher, but she is better known as a writer. She has apparently never been outside her own country.

Yet it is generally believed here she encouraged the formation of the Communist movement in Costa Rica. Her most recent in San Jose has been a meeting place for native Communist leaders and foreign visitors.

She picked men to be the leaders of her movement. Chief among them is Manuel Mora, now head of the popular front, a very recent member of the cabinet and chairman of its finance committee.

When the communist government was first started in 1936, Mora was a young man just out of college. He began his political career as an opponent of "Yankee imperialism," which all native patriots like to shout about. He is considered an expert on the subject of the Communist party in Costa Rica.

During the war Mora became pro-American. He took the lead in advocating co-operation with American capital seeking to develop his country and raise its standard of living. This was after the third international was abolished in Moscow. The Communist party in Costa Rica then dropped that label and became known as Vanguardia popular, or the popular front. Mora is still head of the party.

Another leader is Rodolfo Guzman. He is probably the only one of the group who has ever been to Moscow. He went there in 1935. He had received only primary school education in Costa Rica. He came back from Moscow a well-versed labor leader and organizer. Today he is head of the "Eisenhardt" syndicate, organized the strongest Costa Rican labor union.

In all there are believed to be not more than 20 real leaders in the popular front. They form the Costa Rican jobless and organize the cells at lower level. Not more than five of the 20 are considered strong enough to be entrusted with running Communist policy if the Costa Rican government were to be isolated from outside contacts.

While Communist leaders may seem like a small number to control a country's politics, Costa Rica's population is only 600,000. Its area is roughly comparable to West Virginia.

Last year the popular front in Costa Rica got hold of a radio station. It has been mostly active, as has its newspaper. But the movement itself has been on the decline. It captured 16,000 voters in the 1937 election. Its present strength is believed less than half that figure. Up until now no one took it seriously.

A numerical strength has gone down. His influence has gone up. Today the front has seven seats in Congress. The Republican party has 21 seats. The United party has 12.

The popular front therefore holds the balance of power. That's just what it wants. No party can do anything without its cooperation. That gives the communists control of the situation.

South Led in Men Rejected On Education

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—More than one-fourth of the men rejected for military service in World War II for insufficient education were from the southern states, the National Education association said today.

The 12 states with highest percentage of rejections for educational deficiency were southeastern and southwestern states, an association survey of selective service figures said. But it added:

"It cannot be said that the educational inadequacies are entirely the fault of the states concerned. Southeastern and southwestern states cannot afford to buy the relatively high quality of education which the wealthier states are able to purchase."

"The number of men rejected throughout the United States solely for educational deficiency—62,324—would have constituted 46 divisions, twice as many as the combat divisions used in the south Pacific operations."

"Stern Warning"
"This is a stern warning to the American people to provide adequate education for their children as a means of effective national defense in war or effective citizenship in peace."

The association said one-fourth of the men rejected for lack of schooling were from Arkansas, Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, Louisiana and South Carolina.

The percentage rejected for lack of education, and the average spent per child during their school years, by states, included: Idaho, 1.9 per cent.

100 Transport Planes Ready In Reich Row

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—The air force has about 100 twin-engine transport planes in Germany which can be used to fly supplies into Berlin if the Russians continue to cut railroad and highway traffic.

The planes, C-47s, are those of two troop carrier groups based in the United States zone of western Germany, air force officials said today.

500,000-Pound Capacity
It was estimated that 100 C-47s have a total capacity of about 50,000,000 pounds of cargo. This would provide a substantial flow of food and other materials, needed by American military and civilian personnel in Berlin.

However, it was pointed out that only one field, Tempelhof in the heart of Berlin, is available. This would create an air control traffic problem for frequent flights. From the western zone by the 100 C-47s.

A 20-mile-wide corridor is provided for flights from the western zone to Berlin.

Army authorities said that ordinarily a reserve supply of food sufficient for 45 days has been maintained in Berlin.

The first and natural reaction to the Russian attempt to encircle 25,000 allied troops and civilians in Berlin is that Generalissimo Stalin is driving them.
In former days that almost certainly would have been done if a foreign power tried to interfere in any such fashion with the free and legal movement of Americans. We have fought over such matters on more than one occasion.
But war, and nations which might lead to war, are a more serious matter in the middle of the 20th century than in the early days of the 19th.

Worth Questioned
There is no question of the right of allied forces to occupy their agreed zones in Berlin. There is a grave question, however, of the right of starting shooting about it.
Occupation of Berlin is highly important in our efforts to stabilize the Germans for the cold war. Also to the countries of western Europe who feel themselves impinged against the Russian aggression unless they can be certain of our capability to defend them.
But from a strictly military standpoint, the only viewpoint from which it is safe to consider the present situation, Berlin isn't worth it. Especially it isn't worth a gesture which could only end in futility.

Not Enough Strength

The allies don't have enough military strength in Europe now to back up an attempt to use force. And General Clay says the Russian stoppage of our trains cannot be broken immediately without force. For the time being, we are waiting for the Russian answer to our protests.
If that answer is unacceptable, then the allies will be faced with the necessity of making a decision. Shall Russia be permitted to continue the step-by-step envelopment of Europe which Hitler tried to place him in position to fight the world?

Question on Berlin
Shall we remain belated in Berlin until we can throw in the power—troops, planes, tanks, atom bombs and all the paraphernalia of war—which would be necessary to force Russia to back down, or shall we take the prestige loss of retirement?
The Russians are reported increasing their forces along the demarcation line between the German zones. But they understand the language of force when used by the other fellow, too. Enough of it, and they will back down, unless we have totally misjudged their lack of both desire and preparedness for war.

Goal on U. S. Daylight Time To Be Missed

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—President Truman's recent suggestion that daylight saving in the United States be on an all-or-nothing basis will fall far short of fulfillment this year.
A survey of the 48 states indicated today that "summer time" has won some converts since last year. More than 60,000,000 of the nation's 140,000,000 people will follow daylight saving in 1948.
But in general, the pattern is the same as in 1947.

Most in Northeast
The populous northeastern sector of the country will observe the advanced time almost 100 per cent. There will be only scattered areas, rural sections will continue to shun it.
Most communities observing the new time will start getting their extra hour of evening recreation on Sunday, April 25, this year. Clocks will be moved ahead an hour at 2 a. m. that day.
Ends Sept. 25
The last hour of sleep will be regained five months later, on Sept. 25.

California went on a daylight saving basis on March 14 as a power conservation measure induced by severe drought.
Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Utah, and Montana are among the states which will not observe daylight saving time.
