ANOTHER LIQUOR BILL

The four-minute verdict which the jury returned in Twin Falls' latest liquor case sets some sort of a record, and the trial itself was another demonstration of how law enforcement is made to look silly.

While the records show that it's next to impossible to win conviction in liquor cases, it is not our purpose in this one particular instance to take issue with the verdict. Juris as a rule, even in this "dry" community, will not find liquor law violators guilty.

Testimony was introduced to show how two undercover agents for the state liquor law enforcement bureau went about getting their evidence. Each of these agents, according to testimony by the jury, tapped up at least seven bottles of beer in his establishment before making the arrest on charges of illegal sale of liquor.

As the public well knows, there has been considerable criticism of the sheriff's department, particularly over the department's apparent attempts to make it appear that our city police department is lax in law enforcement.

It is that actually the case, the sheriff's department has failed to make its efforts concerning its police work known to the public. Twin Falls has long been known as one of the "cleanest cities" in the state.

Whether it's the sheriff's department, the state department of law enforcement, or the two working together, the net result of such activities has been practically nil.

THE SPECIAL ELECTION

The forthcoming special election, called to give the taxpayers of Twin Falls an opportunity to correct what the present city administration believes would be a serious error, is worthy of unbiased consideration.

It will be recalled that in a previous bond election, the voters authorized funds for a new city building, the plans for which included a 250-seat capacity auditorium. Under the voters' plan, it is expected that at least one for considerable criticism at the time, and the proposal barely carried for that reason.

Ordinarily an election is an election, and an issue once decided should stand. But in this case there is an exception. At least the taxpayers should give it serious thought.

First of all, what will a 250-seat auditorium provide in the way of a solution to this problem in Twin Falls? It would be too small for the average convention or other meeting of any size and too large for the usual committee get-together.

On the other hand, the building housing our police department is inadequate in many respects. The city fell, for instance, is anything but a credit to Twin Falls. Before long, it will be only reasonable to expect that the building would have to be enlarged and remodeled.

She Lashes Special Privilege Cards Used on Freedom Train

Editor, Times-News:
On the editorial on the special privilege cards issued by the so-called "freedom train," the emotion is all on the side of the "freedom train" as the "freedom train" woman declared it. I found out from personal experience that the cards were used in the public library in Idaho. I felt that I could pass on to the many children with whom I come in contact something of the meaning and beauty of the "freedom train." So I journeyed to the "freedom train" for the purpose of seeing the "freedom train" with my own eyes.

All those who know me are aware that I am a partial cripple, having spent a few years on crutches with a hip infection, and that I now have only a partial hip joint, which leaves the entire side very weak. For the first time in my life I thought a favor because of my physical handicap and asked the head of the citizens' committee in Idaho if I could view the train without the grinding "standing in line" which I felt I could not take. I knew that many of these special tickets had been given out, and I hoped a few of them were reserved for the physically handicapped.

The gentleman informed me, however, that all these tickets had been given out long before, that they had made no special provision for physically handicapped individuals, and that if I wanted to see the "freedom train," I would have to take my chances with the rest. So rather than miss what I had come so far to see, I got in line with my friends of the "common herd," of which I am proud to be one, and stood with my feet on wet, cold pavement, occasionally in mud when the crowd shifted and I was inadvertently pushed off the pavement, from 9:30 until 1:45, four and one-quarter hours, before my aching hip and I reached the steps of the "freedom train." From about noon on it rained a cold drizzle, and the wind was much sharper, making the wait a thing of torture for everyone.

But I saw the "freedom train" and would not take anything for the experience of viewing the numerous documents, though I now limp 100 per cent more than I did before the ordeal, and so far the physical help has not ceased, it has extra ache. I am bringing in this personal

She Points to Two Defeats of School Reorganization Plans

Editor, Times-News:
In two recent elections, one in Clear Lake county, the other in Bonnerville, the voters defeated a county unit plan of reorganization submitted for their consideration by their county planning boards. To me this signifies that the public is not in favor of the reorganization law the serious study it deserves. For a long time we considered only the advantages explained to us. As we get further into the operation we begin to view those advantages with skepticism.

Generally speaking, country people are the least enthusiastic. Town people, having been told it will mean bigger and better schools for them, vote affirmatively if they bother to vote at all. To them I would like to address these questions:

What advantage is it to you to have your schools overcrowded with children of rebellious taxpayers? Such parents will certainly not vote for bond issues to enlarge your school system. Most parents in getting districts believe with good cause, that their children are getting adequate training for strong character and happy usefulness where they are.

Would you like to have your children deprived of extra-curricular activities because they must spend so much time on the bus or because more competition eliminates them from such activity?

Do you think this is the time to erect buildings in solvent districts to inaugurate a school building program when our roads are in a deplorable condition, when homes and hospitals are so badly needed, and when construction costs are at their highest?

Do you think it democratic that five people in the county and five people in the state (our new school boards), can so manipulate the elections that a town the size of Kimberly, or King Hill, or Wendell can be out-voted? It is in such a manner that power becomes centralized.

Size of the small towns and rural communities would like to remain in control of our schools. We think it should be our right to say where our children attend school, as long as we are willing and able to pay the bill. No rural district in Idaho is without a trained educator or several who are also willing and able to accept the responsibility of the school's success. Living in their respective districts, they are in contact with the problems and are less susceptible to the ads frequently entering the field of education.

It is true we need more money to attract more and better teachers and to raise the standards of smaller schools, but a compulsory consolidation law that excludes dissent and rebellion is not the answer. No rich district objects to sharing its wealth with a poor one if the laws that govern both are fair and impartial. Previously the state apportionment was given rich as well as poor districts. The legislature could have adjusted this. Formerly a good many districts were not operating and contributed very little money to any education program. This too could have been remedied. The present law authorizes with the consent of the county commissioners a two-mill levy yearly for its county administrative expenses alone. In Elmore county, for instance, this levy could amount to \$14,000, a sum that would go far to alleviate the destitution of its poorer districts.

The law is cumbersome and involved. The public doesn't understand it and lawyers differ in their interpretations of it. It is expensive mainly to taxes on an already tax-burdened public. However, the law angle is secondary to the principle involved. The law says in effect, "I have the power to educate your children as I see fit. Whether you agree with me or not, you are compelled to follow my dictates and pay the bill."

Soviet Armed Force Power Exceeds U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—Russia's armed forces, supplied with manpower through a compulsory military training system, far outnumber those of the United States.

The big difference, according to the best information available here, lies in the size of the army of the two dominant world powers.

The United States is far ahead in naval strength (in vessels but not personnel) and has a slight edge in airpower.

4 to 5 Million in Army

While the red army is reported to comprise units with a total between 4,000,000 and 5,000,000 men (including combat, reserve and military police), the American army has about 642,000 men.

The Russians had 13,500,000 men in the army at the end of the war; there were roughly about 8,500,000 in the U. S. army.

The Russian air force is believed to be equipped with 15,000 airplanes, with possibly an additional 15,000 in storage.

22,246 U. S. Planes

The U. S. air units, including air force, navy and marine corps, are estimated to be equipped with 22,246 active planes, with an additional 15,292 stored away so they can be speedily sent into operation.

Soviet Russian naval strength is believed to number about 500,000 personnel, manning at least 250 submarines (92 to 100 of the latest German type), 3 or 4 old battleships and about 100 destroyers and destroyer escorts and possibly 1 carrier.

397,000 in U. S. Navy

Comparable figures for the U. S. are 397,000 personnel (not including 81,000 marines), 175 submarines, 60 battleships, 73 cruisers and 564 destroyers and destroyer escorts, and 103 carriers.

However, as in most of the U. S., has only 277 combat vessels in its operating fleets and 178 of them are not yet manned.

Both navies have miscellaneous other types of craft, such as ice-breakers, tankers and torpedo boats.

Officers of all reclamation and water-users groups throughout the state have been invited.

Welsh said special arrangements are being planned for ladies. He added it was the first time that a program for women has been arranged.

Harry E. Folk, Williston, N. D., president of the National Reclamation association, will be the banquet speaker.

Welsh said the program would include talks on sprinkler irrigation, noxious weeds, underground water, and operation and maintenance problems.

Demand Lack Hampered '47 Spud Season

IDAHO FALLS, April 3.—The 1947-48 shipping season for potatoes was characterized in Idaho by lack of any real demand because of higher asking prices and the fact that tubers from other states were plentiful at low prices.

This was one of several conditions listed today by Joe Gardner, manager of the Idaho potato growers' news office in Idaho Falls, in his annual summary. His office closed last night.

Subject to Revision

Gardner cautioned, however, that the report is subject to revision because of the fact that it is based on figures through May.

The acreage of Idaho's 1947 production totaled 28,900,000 bushels of potatoes. This is 14,700,000 bushels less than the 1946 crop. However, he reported the quantity of the 1947 crop is generally better than last year's and the report showed a steady rise in the price of Idaho potatoes from September until March.

Prices Steadily Climbed

Last September, tubers were selling at \$24-30 per cwt. Demand with prices still high, resulted through the shipping season. By the first week in January, the price had advanced to \$27-30 per cwt. and reached the season's peak of \$37-42 during the last few weeks in March. The average price for Idaho potatoes, according to the Idaho potato statistics, for the year 1947-48 showed that Idaho Falls is still the potato capital of the nation, although Blaine county again topped Blaine county in the number of bushels. The county's share was \$229,000 for Blaine Idaho Falls and \$261 for Blaine Idaho Falls, amounting to 7,125 cars during the 1947-48 season. Shelby was second with 2,775 cars and Blackfoot third with 2,664 cars.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—Senator Dworshak, R., Ind., pronounced his complete support today for a \$75,000,000 bill aimed at improving the health of America.

After all, he said in a statement, the amount is far less than the \$1,000,000,000 that has been estimated for the purchase of tobacco during the first year of the foreign aid program.

"Certainly a request for \$175,000,000 to improve the health of the American people is a reasonable request in view of the fact that it is to be voted largely for all to other people."

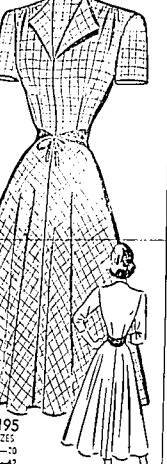

25 "Ham" Radio Artists in Area Keep Busy "Talking" With Foreign Friends

"Ham" radio—a interesting and entertaining hobby as anyone could hope to have.

Not only does it keep your hands busy but it gives you an opportunity to chat in to the farthest corners of the world.

Imagine for just a minute that you are sitting in a cramped cockpit and by merely pressing a switch you are conversing with a college student in China, thousands of miles away.

Nor is it strange to note that many of the amateurs in the radio field, especially those in and around Twin Falls, make their living in the radio field.

Many are employed by local broadcasting stations, some operate the federal communications system.

It is hard for most of them to explain how they got started as amateurs. They just say they got interested.

Each amateur has a different and personalized QSL card. It is one of their obsessions to cover the walls of their "shack" with the cards received from other hams.

There is more to amateur radio than just pressing a button and talking to the air. The extra carries a small fortune for their equipment.

They must take examinations in code, theory and regulations before they may obtain their license.

Then they must have the right atmospheric conditions. One day it may be easy to talk to Japan, and Australia at certain hours.

Later they may be unable to pick up even the strongest transmissions from those places. It is always an adventure to make a contact, for they can never be certain until the contact is made exactly where it will come from.

Once a person becomes a "ham" and is interested in more than experimenting with new types of equipment, some of their original ideas.

Much of the equipment now turned out by manufacturers of short-wave and broadcast radio was developed either by amateurs or because of their needs.

The 25 hams in the Magic Valley and 20 others who have either had some service-connected radio experience or hope to become hams have organized a radio club, the Smokey Hammers and Hobbies club.

Although their meetings are held monthly, groups of the hams get together at least for a salad.

Those who can't drop in personally come on the air to discuss with the group accounts of their club, the latest radio news and other things.

Long noted for their activities in emergencies, hams have often served as the only means of communication from areas stricken by fire, flood and explosion.

You decide to do what the rest of Washington society does—have a party at the home of the hostess. Say a party at the home of the hostess. Which is an international extravaganza. You walk for that sort of thing.

How much will it set you back? Well, that depends on a lot of things. How fancy are the people you want to entertain? Would they accept behind your back? If you didn't serve champagne? Would they settle for the garden variety of hors-d'oeuvres—straw, shrimp, celery, olives, and so on? Are you growing out of a preparation on tooth-picks? No butter? No music?

At the Press

If U. N. Can't Stop Russia, Who Can? Observers Think Power Show "Might"

Editor's note: This is the third and last in a series of articles on the plans of the United Nations.

By S. HUNTON HEATH

LAKE SUCCEEDS, N. Y., (AP)—Russia will not fail—either in the immediate future. That is the considered opinion of some of the best-informed observers here at the capital of the United States.

They feel that like any small-town bull, the Soviet union will keep pushing the little fellows around—making them work for her—until she is induced by a bigger power with decent instincts.

Then, they think, she will back down, and say, in effect: "So sorry, fellows. We didn't suppose you really cared."

They are certain that Russian aggression can be halted. But not by bluff. They suggest that what can bring her to terms is a coalition of non-communist powers, backed by the full, unreserved might of the United States.

For reasons discussed in earlier dispatches, these observers are under no illusion that the United States can stop Russia, or even slow her down.

But they believe that the Brussels pact between Great Britain, France and the Benelux countries can serve as the nucleus for the necessary non-communist coalition. They are encouraged by Scandinavian interest in that economic-military alliance. They think such a freedom bloc can draw strength from the 16-power economic cooperation involved in our European relief program. And they feel that President Truman's speech, asserting his desire to back the freedom bloc to the limit, will spread the movement.

In all such discussions, the United States is the key. Those who know the Soviet economic, industrial and military situation best are convinced that she is in no condition to fight a war anywhere off her own soil, at present.

They feel that any about even an old-fashioned war, like World war II. They are even more certain that Moscow would almost crawl to avoid an atomic war. And as much as they deplore the terrible nature of an atomic war, none wish when it has taken but any doubt that, if war came, several major Soviet cities would go up in atomic clouds within a few days.

It is the almost universal feeling that the world cannot begin

brakes on her program of expansion. But whether it comes in Italy or elsewhere, they are certain that the challenge to Russia from the United States will have to come. That it will have to be a real challenge, not a bluff. That when it does come, Russia will back down.

They hope that from then on, gradually perhaps, Russia will begin taking part through the United Nations in a genuine attempt to build up the world. Or, at the very least, that she will stop obstructing the world's attempt to build itself back to physical, economic and moral health.

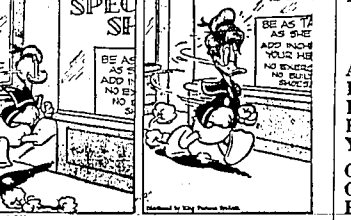

Kansas Found To Be Center Of All World

OBORNE, Kans., (AP)—Kansas, long recognized as the center of the nation, is to have that honor as the geographical center of the world.

The U. S. coast and geodetic survey says that a vast project to measure the size and shape of the earth will start from the oil marker on the Meade ranch near Osborne.

Most of the earth's 57,000,000 square miles of land have been linked together with a network of triangles pointed directly to this marker, which is the geodetic center of North America.

For years the marker has been the starting point of all surveys in the nation.

From the White House to the most inconspicuous farm, all buildings which have been surveyed are listed on charts as being a certain distance from the Meade ranch marker.

Now government experts have a much better plan in mind to tie together astronomical observations and gravity checks, and by triangulation to reach a more exact center of the earth and the shape of the earth as a whole.

Representing the geodetic center, Kansas also has the geographic center of the United States within its borders. The latter spot, also marked, is near Lebanon.

Issues, Stakes of Italy's Vote On April 18 Are World-Wide

ROME, April 3 (AP)—The Italian republic will elect its first parliament in Rome on April 18. The issues are world-wide and the stakes are global. The world wide is watching how Italy votes in a vital test of strength between communist and anti-communist forces.

The reason: As Italy goes, so may go the rest of Europe. Here is how many diplomats and high-ranking Italians in Rome see it.

Italy is the world's front-line bastion in Europe. It can be reached by land with Europe's eastern sphere of influence and with France.

If the communists fail to win a majority in the election, the spread of Soviet influence may be halted.

But should Italy fall into communist hands, Soviet influence could receive a powerful forward thrust.

They believe the main anti-communist party, Premier Alcide De Gasperi's Christian Democrats, will gain 55 to 60 per cent and the anti-communist coalition 35 to 40 per cent.

The communists have a powerful coalition in their popular front. This takes in their own party, the pro-communist Italian socialist majority and a half dozen small left-wing parties.

Most observers agree this coalition will get more seats in the chamber of deputies than any single opposition party. They expect 35 to 40 seats.

Many think 40 per cent, some say up to 45.

They believe the main anti-communist party, Premier Alcide De Gasperi's Christian Democrats, will gain 55 to 60 per cent and the anti-communist coalition 35 to 40 per cent.

Atomic Bomb Blast Stunted Child Growth

By BENNIE TAYLOR

PALO ALTO, Calif., April 3—The shock of the atom bomb explosions at Hiroshima and Nagasaki temporarily stopped the growth of Japanese children who came through the ordeal, a scientist reported today.

This effect was due primarily to a pressure wave which spread out with destructive effect a mile or more from the blast centers. Buildings nearest the blast centers were crushed so it by a giant deflection hammer. Humans and animals receiving the full force of the blast were killed almost instantly.

Injuries Varied

Farther away from the centers, the blast waves decreasing in strength as they fanned outward, inflicted injuries in varying degrees.

X-ray pictures of more than 1,000 children who were in these outer

areas were taken by Dr. William W. Grunlich, Stanford university anatomist, under sponsorship of the U. S. atomic energy commission. They formed the basis of the report.

Leg and arm bones shown in the X-rays have fertile white lines extending across them near the ends. They show up frequently in the leg bones a little below the knee and above the ankle. This is the region of bone growth. The leg and arm bones become longer by the gradual addition of spongy material at each end. As the child ages, the spongy matter hardens progressively toward the ends.

Premature Hardening

The white cross lines, Dr. Grunlich reported, represent the premature hardening of bone which should have continued to grow and lengthen.

This can happen also, Dr. Grunlich said, in serious illness or in major vitamin deficiency cases. It signifies the temporary interruption of growth.

There were other evidences of injury to the children, Dr. Grunlich said. The most common occurrence was the after effects of internal bleeding, a thing that naturally would disrupt bone processes. The youngsters returned their
