# Miners Ignoring Court's Order to Return to Mines

By The Associated Press  
Despite a federal court order for an immediate end to the three-week-old coal strike, there was scarcely a sign of a back to work movement of 400,000 United Mine Workers today.

The temporary injunction was issued Saturday night in Washington by Judge Matthew F. McGuire. It ordered John L. Lewis and the miners to end their strike. It also ordered coal operators to negotiate with the UMW the coal minor pension issue which brought about the walkout.

Lewis did not advise his miners to return to work. Before the injunction was issued, he told them they were on their own and they could work as they liked without working for him. Miners called a meeting to discuss the question.

Violation of a federal court injunction might subject Lewis to a fine for contempt as well as other similar circumstances. The union has assets of \$3,500,000 and Lewis \$1,000,000 in the strike of November, December, 1946. The union's first later was out to \$700,000.

**Industry Squared**  
The content clause which has put the country's coal production to a trickle, has put a tightening squeeze on industry and railroad transportation. The Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding and Shipworkers group, announced it will seek wage increases for its 125,000 members in the steel and shipbuilding industry during the next few months.

**Meat Strike Continues**  
Members of the strike of 100,000 CIO United Meat Packers in plants of the major packers, continued a 100th day of picketing, with no end in sight.

A union official said the strike would last at least 100 days. He said that the strike would be a test of the nation's ability to produce meat.

The strike is in its 103rd day. The picket, Roy Perry, was shot and was expected to recover. Police arrested three persons, and said the shooting was the first in the strike which resulted when two of these arrested tried to push through a gate.

The strike had been relatively peaceful, although the nation had been in a meat shortage since the strike began. The picketers have charged that the union is using force and threats on picketing at some other strike plants.

**Tights Break Out Over Coal Strike**  
PITTSBURGH, April 5 (AP)—Fighting between rival pickets of the nation's bituminous coal fields, now paralyzed by a nation-wide coal strike, broke out today in a tiff.

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# Russians Call for Peace Conference to Stop 'Battle of Berlin'; Allies Accept

BERLIN, April 5 (UP)—The Russians called today for a peace conference to end the "battle of Berlin," and the British and Americans promptly accepted the offer.

It remained for the Soviet union to name the place and time for a meeting to iron out the last difficulties caused by Russia's sudden clamp-down last Wednesday midnight on rail traffic of the western powers through the Soviet-occupied zone and from the German capital.

Russia gave promptly and apparently grudgingly in the "nervy war" its action last week. Informing the three western powers that Soviet authorities were ready to discuss "clarification" of the transport orders, Lieut. Gen. Mikhail Dratvin, Soviet deputy commander, said:

"I cannot see any possibility of changing existing regulations affecting traffic or freight and personnel through the Soviet zone of occupation in Germany."

American and British shock of the expressed opinion that Soviet entry to their military trains could not be permitted, but both agreed to a meeting, and asked that the Russians suggest a time and place for it.

Wiley, who has filled the office of chief deputy since last year, said he did not know the reason for the dismissal.

"About a week ago," he said, "Rayborn asked me to resign. I refused. Since that time, I have not received a word from him."

### Fire Department Lacks Ladder For About 32 Local Buildings

The lack of adequate ladder equipment for the Twin Falls fire department was revealed last week at a demonstration of a new lifeline purchased recently by the department.

A demonstration of the use of the rope was held at the Charter Seed company elevator on Wall Street.

Under the direction of Assistant Fire Chief Robert Miller, members of the fire department hitched their safety belts to the rope from a window in the top of the elevator and slid down the 60-foot drop.

After the demonstration was completed, Fire Chief E. H. Freelove said the rope was the only emergency device which could be used to rescue persons from buildings over two stories high.

The ladders on the fire truck, he said, are only 35 feet long and would prove ineffective on at least 32 structures in the city.

The use of the rope is limited, Freelove pointed out, since it can be employed only as a means of exodus and not as a method of entry.

The Twin Falls high school, topped by the dormitory band practice room, is one of the chief danger spots in the city, he continued. The fire ladder will reach the second story windows in the school, he said, but not the roof.

Firemen would be virtually helpless, the chief said, if faced with the task of rescuing a large number of people from the roof of the building.
