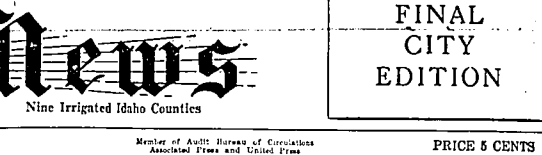

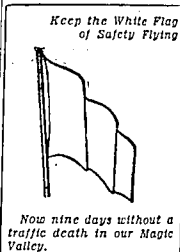
Annual Scout Camporee Is Parley Topic

California Checks Rainfalls' Results

SAN FRANCISCO, April 9 (AP)—North and central California took stock of its storm-replenished reservoirs and waterheds today to ascertain whether a drought-horn power curtailment program can be relaxed.

Emergency Power Director Robert P. O'Brien offered a complete resurvey.

One of the driest winters in years led to the imposition last month of a 20 per cent cut for industrial use and irrigation pumping, a slash in the use of electric signs on business establishments and an appeal for residential electric conservation.

Results of the survey will be ready next week, O'Brien said.

The weather bureau predicted heavy rains would strike much of the area during the night and Sunday.

Light snow or rain was general yesterday from Bakerfield northward.

The rains helped farms and ranches and added a little more water to depleted reservoirs.

Poland Captures Two U.S. Officers

WARSAW, April 9 (AP)—U. S. Ambassador Stanton Griffith has proposed to the Polish government against the recent detention of two assistant military attaches.

Griffith said Lt.-Col. Frank Joseph Beaumont, Tex., and Captain Nicholas Hudziak, Maryland, were taken into custody April 1 while on an automobile trip in lower Silesia. Both carried diplomatic passports.

Griffith said the two officers were taken into custody at Kono, northwest of Wroclaw (Breslau). They were detained several hours and questioned.

Utah Plant Sale Given U. S. Okay

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—The justice department has approved sale of the \$450,000 kalamite plant at Salt Lake City to J. R. Simplot of Idaho, Mr. Senator Thomas, D., Utah, said today.

Simplot has agreed to pay \$750,000 for the property which he plans to make phosphate fertilizer. He has had possession of the plant for some months on a temporary permit from the war assets administration pending justice department approval of the sale.

The plant was built during the war to extract aluminum from clay. It was never operated.

JOLIET, Ill., April 9 (AP)—Victim of a savage beating Wednesday night, William P. McCabe, 65, Joliet publisher and a former state legislator, remained in critical condition today.

Menhville investigators were checking various angles, including politics and gambling which McCabe fought editorially in an effort to learn the motive for the vicious attack. Sheriff John Klenick said, however, he regarded robbery as the most likely motive.

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Russia Tried To Order 540 Heavy Planes

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—The Soviet Union tried to order in early 1944 to obtain 540 heavy, long-range bombing planes from the United States.

The Russian bid and its turn-down by lend-lease negotiators were officials disclosed last night with publication by the state department of four heretofore secret "Soviet supply proposals."

The documents were published following suggestions from congress that they contained facts bearing upon postwar American deliveries to the Soviet Union.

A news conference, at which the proposals were distributed to reporters, George Truett, state department expert on Russian economics, declared the proposals have only "historical interest."

He made it clear the immediate purpose of taking the secrecy label off the papers was to meet congressional criticism and seek to disprove any Mrs. Roosevelt wartime agreements still assure Russia of a supply of American goods.

Russia obtained lend-lease help from the United States as a means of pressing the fight against the Germans.

Met in 1941, top Soviet, American and British officials met in Moscow and signed the first of four "protocols" setting forth (1) what Russia wanted from the United States, (and later Canada) and (2) what the United States and Britain believed they could make available to the Russians. The documents were subject to change due to shipping shortages, production difficulties and competing war needs.

The Russians then received in general less than they asked because the goods were not available or could not be delivered. Their total lend-lease receipts from the United States over 50 months to date, \$10,000,000, according to latest reported figures.

Court Takes Baby as Mother Convicted of Killing Daughter

LOS ANGELES, April 9 (AP)—A mother convicted of beating her two-year-old daughter to death was barred forever today from again seeing her month-old son.

The judge declared: "This baby has the right to grow up and not be treated worse than a cur dog." The same ban, the judge ruled, applies to the baby's father.

Shaking with sob, Mrs. Elizabeth Kunin stole a last glance at the baby, Steven Dale, as she was led back to her cell, preparatory to transfer to California's state prison for women at Tehachapi. She must serve a one to 10 year term for manslaughter in the death of her daughter, Denise.

The dramatic custody hearing was held in the superior court of juvenile Judge A. A. Scott, on the heels of Mrs. Kunin's sentencing to prison yesterday—her 25th birthday.

The baby's father, Lawrence Kunin, 27-year-old Beverly Hills salesman, made a request for custody, telling the court he could provide a good home. But the judge rejected it.

"This is an unfit home by reason of neglect, cruelty and depravity of the parents. This court cannot act idly by in view of the testimony, and make plans whereby either parent ever has access to this youngster. "He and his wife are not fit persons to have custody or contact therewith. I am going to see that she doesn't have that opportunity."

Richard Maddox, Mrs. Kunin's attorney, declared: "Legally, I construe this as a temporary decree. When she is released from Tehachapi she and Mr. Kunin can take action to regain custody."

3-Zone Reich Move Gaining More Support

The idea of creating a new German reich out of the three western zones of allied occupation is gaining momentum as it becomes increasingly clear that Russia has scaled off and assumed permanent control of eastern Germany.

Further striking evidence of this trend comes from a speech delivered by the German state legislator in the British zone by Gen. Sir Hans Robertson, the military governor. Speaking with the personal approval of British Foreign Secretary Bevin, we are authoritatively informed, Sir Hans said:

"I am determined to make the best of that part of your country which is on the right side of the iron curtain. Make up your minds to stand with us, gentlemen, who, with democracy on their lips and francophony behind their backs, would give your German freedom from you."

Well, that's plain talk. The general didn't mention communists specifically but there's no doubt he was talking about them and was advising the Germans to reconcile themselves to living with the western zone, together with their capital, at least for the time being. And as I pointed out previously, the inability to reconstruct the country with Berlin as the capital is a major reason why the people, not only for sentimental reasons but because it is one of the greatest cities in the world, the hub of European rail transport.

While Sir Brian was making this candid declaration, Maurice Couve of Marseille, French minister for German affairs, registered in Berlin to be the chief of Gen. Lucius Clay, the commander of the American zone. Wes Gallagher, AP chief bureau in Berlin, tells us that the American trip is interpreted in authoritative quarters as a move to remove the division in way of the reunification of the French with the British and American zones. The latter two have established politico-economic cooperation.

Bannock Leaders Ruled Out on Rift

POCATELLO, April 9 (AP)—Bannock county commissioners cannot continue to take part in the dispute over the proposed reorganization of the Blackfoot village, Prosecuting Attorney Henry McQuade ruled.

McQuade said when commissioners turned down the petition for incorporation, they put the county treasury in jeopardy. He added that the county board in the dispute should fight out the case on their own expense.

"The case now is under study by Fifth District Judge L. E. Clemons," he said.

General Asks UMT's Adoption At Burley Army Day Program

BURLEY, April 9 (AP)—Advocating a definite system of national defense made possible through universal military training, Brig. Gen. John E. Walsh, adjutant general of the Idaho national guard, urged the adoption of the UMT by the general public at an Army day ceremony this week.

"There is a tendency for America not to assume the responsibility for peace. After every war, the American people seems to forget the need for military training and it is necessary for every person to get something of his own life for the preservation of this nation," General Walsh said.

He reviewed the history of the national guard, which started with the colonial militia more than 200 years ago. He held of the importance of engineers of the army in surveying for the early day railroads and pioneer trails as valuable in bringing people to the west.

"We owe the first survey for water in this great Magic Valley to the army engineer corps," General Walsh related. "We have but one country in the present day, and that is by a strong America," he said.

He asked support of the state guard units, saying that these professional soldiers need help in their plans for the 14-day training period at Ft. Leavenworth.

Also pleading for universal military training was Col. Sherman R. Hawley, national corps reserve, representing the Burley veterans and reserve groups. He said the United States army has done more to advance the cause of democracy than any other force in the world. "When diplomats and politicians have failed, the army has taken over," he said.

"The United States of America is the only power professing and committed in the cause of democracy that is capable of defending it. Our country is a stumbling block to those who would make all men slaves," he said.

"Protection we must have, but we are one in three who must do the fighting, the training, arms, and intelligence of the home front," he concluded.

Capt. Norman Smith presided at the program, assisted by L. J. Fudde, commander of Burley post of the American Legion.

Following the program, Brigadier General Walsh administered the national guard oath to Robert L. Campbell, John A. Hill and Stanley D. Vallette.

A band directed by the High School band, concert by the Idaho Grange, preceded the program and an army recruiting service film was shown. During the evening, a weapons display was featured at the army general plans from the national guard air division, Boise, were on display at the Burley Municipal airport during the afternoon but stormy weather caused some of the air show features to be cancelled.

South Africa Asks For Fencing Law

BOISIE, April 9 (AP)—The union of South Africa has requested information on Idaho fence laws for purposes of writing fencing legislation of its own.

"The South African government asked copies of Idaho legislation on fence laws from the commissioner of agriculture," he said.

Idaho legislation on fences has been in existence since 1893 according to the state land office.

Land Aims of Stockmen Hit By Westerner

CHICAGO, April 9 (AP)—A western conservationist today asserted "a small, highly organized and determined group" is trying to get control of western public lands "for their own personal benefit."

Arthur H. Carhart, Denver, told the Task Force that the campaign to get public lands "is well-organized and dangerous."

In his prepared address, he said: "It all stems down to a small, highly-organized and determined group trying to get control of those lands... for their own personal benefit."

"On the other side is the public who owns those lands and has more at stake in them than this, or any other special group."

Carhart said stockmen, both sheep and cattle, are seeking "exclusive privilege of purchasing" public grazing lands. "Other citizens would be barred," he said. "They want some tracts now in national forests."

He charged that a congressional subcommittee's hearings "were packed, stacked and manipulated."

"Only three-fourths of one per cent of the non-rangeland feeding depends on forage in the national forests. Only four and one-third per cent of western beef stock feeding is based in public lands."

"In the case of sheep, two per cent of national feeding requirements rests on forests, with five per cent of western beef feeding dependent on them."

"Stockmen are already getting all possible forage from these lands if they are to be grazed on a continuing yield basis, and in the community interest."

'Ag' Department Not Satisfied on Plans for Basin

PORTLAND, Ore., April 9 (AP)—The department of agriculture is not satisfied with the department of interior's Columbia river basin program.

The agriculture department said in a report prepared by the USDA office here that inadequate reasons are listed for the various proposed projects.

The interior department's report on the program was called "a generalized atlas and travelogue of the watershed... Irrelevant acreages is treated as though it were all in one large farm... power production is mentioned without any mention of repayment of contracts."

If each project were considered separately, according to the report, the program proposed in the report would be drastically altered, the USDA said.

The USDA added that the plan was "formulated without benefit of the services of the department of agriculture, the agency most vitally affected by such a program change in agricultural economy."

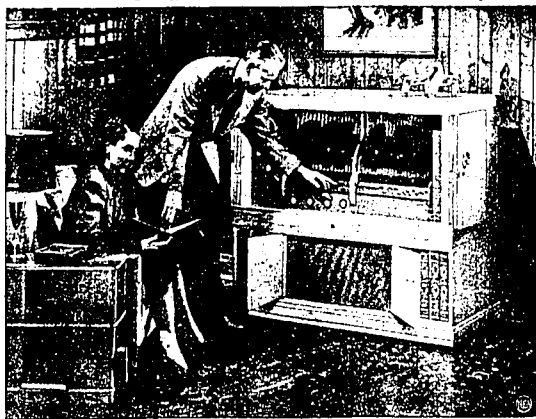

NURENBERG, April 9 (AP)—Twenty SS officers were found guilty by an American tribunal today of participating in more than 1,500,000 murders during the Nazi reign of terror in Europe. Sentences will be announced tomorrow.

Those convicted included five generals, 10 colonels, three majors and two lieutenants.

Two other defendants, Capt. Felix Dauterive and Sgt. Mathias Dietrich, were found innocent of participating in the mass murders and guilty only of membership in the SS, a criminal organization.

One Is Released

Aussie Joins Rank Urging Big 3 Parley

AP Foreign Affairs Analyst
Herbert Pratt, Australia, has joined the ranks of those who advocate a sort of "deception meeting" between Truman, Attlee and Stalin to seek a solution of the world crisis. These advocates seem to be overlooking something that sticks out like a sore thumb.

A lot of the trouble with Russia today directly to the completely cynical manner in which she uses agreements to further her own ends. As long as her foreign policy is governed by a combination of revolutionary realizations and imperialistic ambitions, any agreement with her can be only a snare and a delusion.

A truce in the cold war, such as some European observers profess to be in the offing, would be a most dangerous thing for the western democracies. The very nature of their systems causes them, at every opportunity, to slip back into complacency and unpreparedness.

The revolutionary dynamics of the situation on the other hand, would turn a truce into a period of further preparation and further intensification of democratic positions. Despite all the war and pre-war propaganda, the word of the Kremlin is not to be trusted for anything good. A part of their creed is that the end justifies any means, particularly lying.

Russian communists went to the European socialist meeting in Berlin in 1921 under instructions to "make them by the hand now in order that we may take them by the throat later." That has been the spirit behind every friendly-looking gesture from the bolsheviks that I can remember.

The communists began violating the treaty by which the United States recognized them as a legal government the day after it was signed by continuing their interference in our internal affairs through the communist front.

Since then a description of Russia's undependability would fill a book.

Explanation of "Booty" Asked By Dworshak

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, R., Idaho, has demanded a state department explanation of disposal of dismantled war plants in the U. S. occupation zone in Germany.

Dworshak read to the senate a new dispatch indicating that Russia and her satellites received 63 per cent of reparations taken from the U. S. zone.

He said the dispatch, based on a release from headquarters of Gen. Lucius Clay, American occupation commander, showed that Russia and Poland got 40 per cent of western Germany's dismantled plants in lieu of the 25 per cent agreed to at Potsdam for the first two years of occupation.

Dworshak said that the plants were removed because they represented a "war potential" within German borders.

"I would like to have the state department tell the senate and the American people whether the plants will represent a 'war potential' when transferred behind the iron curtain," he said.

Dworshak called the reparations policy "inconsistent" with efforts to make Germany economically stable.

He added that Russia is taking all the dismantled plants in its own occupation zone in addition to 30 per cent of the U. S. total.

BOISE, April 9 (AP)—Idaho ranks first in the nation in production of antimony, silver and zinc, Harry Marsh, secretary of the Idaho Mining association, said yesterday.

The Gem state also ranks second in output of lead, tungsten and phosphates, Marsh told the Rotary club.

Reviewing the state's mining industry for the past 48 years, Marsh said the best estimates are that \$500,000,000 in gold has been taken from the state since the discovery by Capt. E. D. Perré on Orofino Creek in 1850.

Discussing lead he said, "No other metal is used in so many different forms for such a wide variety of purposes."

Lead, as a life protective metal in atomic production has taken tremendous tonnages. In 1947 there were consumed about 1,140,830 tons of lead. The 1948 estimated consumption is set at 1,030,900 tons.

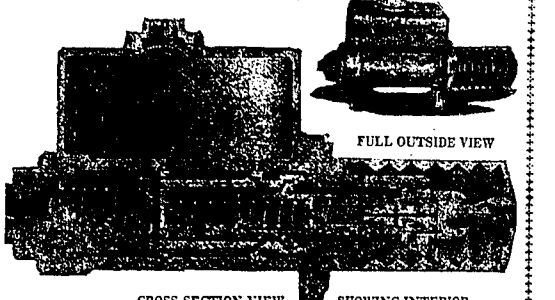

Truman Tells 'Government' Debate Delay

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—President Truman said Thursday that the administration is not ready to talk with other nations, including Russia, on forming a world government.

The question came up at a news conference. A reporter asked that the administration was asked, "St. Louis Star-Times had pointed out in a recent editorial that 'we attempt might be to save our bid for peace if we invited the nations, including Russia, to a conference on the question of a real world government.'"

Not Ready
The administration ready for such a step? Mr. Truman was asked. He replied: The administration is not.

Other points touched on in the conference include:
Strikes—Mr. Truman said the administration will enforce the Taft-Hartley law to the letter to end the coal strike, and will apply it equally to the meat strike. That goes for any strike affecting the country as a whole, he said.

Politics—Mr. Truman had no comment on the Blawie victory in the Republican primary in Wisconsin. He smilingly explained he was not entered in that contest.

Other comment:
On other matters, Mr. Truman said that the question of U. S. support for a so-called "four power military alliance did not come up in his talk with Prime Minister Spaak of Belgium.

He said that minutes of the conference of the four-power commission in Berlin would not be made public at this time.

He remarked that Bernard Baruch was following the same line of thought he had expressed in saying that profits, prices and wages should be drafted if manpower is.

Dairy Production Climbs For Idaho

BOISE, April 9 (AP)—Idaho plants made 1,745,000 pounds of butter and 1,650,000 pounds of cheese during February.

The U. S. department of agriculture said yesterday that butter production was two per cent higher than in January, and one per cent less than in February of last year and 11 per cent below the five-year average for the month.

American cheese production was 10 per cent ahead of January, nine per cent below February of last year and seven per cent above the five-year average.

The 280,000 pounds of Swiss cheese produced in Idaho was the highest of any February on record going back to 1920.

Milk production for the month was 22,000,000 pounds, the same as in January and compares with a 10-year average of 24,000,000 pounds.

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New Accord Will 'Steady' Wheat at \$2

SPokane, April 9.—The international agreement signed by 26 nations last month will probably stabilize the price of wheat near \$2 a bushel, Albert J. Barton, Washington, D. C., said Thursday.

Barton is field agent for the grain branch of the production and marketing administration. He explained the agreement to members of the state production and marketing committee.

Annual Buying Set
The agreement provides, he said, that 33 importing nations will buy annually from the United States, Canada and Australia 30,000,000 bushels of grain starting Aug. 1. The largest shopper will be Canada with a quota of 20,000,000 bushels, he said. The United States follows with a 10,000,000 bushel export and Australia's share totals 2,000,000 bushels.

17 Per cent Export
The U. S. export quota is supposed to be 17 per cent of the total crop forecast for the nation this year, Barton said.

The maximum price is equivalent to 42 per bushel at Portland, Ore., and the export will probably be stabilized by the government if the market price strays above that point, he said.

Russia, and Argentina, both wheat exporters, are not signers of the agreement, the Washington man said.

West Warned on Red Menace Peril

SALT LAKE CITY, April 9.—American Legion Leader W. L. (Tom) Sawyer of Indianapolis said last night that residents of the intermountain west lack complete understanding of what he termed the "red menace" which is spreading across the continent.

In an interview, the Legion chief said, "The west area is affected as vitally as those of the heavily populated coastal areas, even though the menace is not on the doorstep, as it is on the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard."

HAIFA, Palestine (MEA)—In peacetime, Haifa would be a perfect place for tourists.

Today, it is not even a fit place for soldiers.

The British soldiers are leaving. Every few days, a troop transport pulls out of Haifa. Along the deck rails, British eyes take a last look at Haifa. British mounds spit into the three-mile strip of Mediterranean that is Palestine's sea.

They think the British forces are simply retiring beyond the limits of Palestine. To Cyprus, to the zone. When Berlin gets the word from the United States, they think the British will be back.

One thing is for sure. Any British soldier who comes back will not come with smiles on his face. On the way back in, they'd have to pass some British censors.

From atop Mount Carmel, the port for British evacuation looks like a travel agency's advertising poster.

From inside the travel-poster town come sporadic bursts of rifle fire. Occasionally, a smoke signal rises. Moments later, a dull boom is blown back across the murmur of the harbor. Then, though you can't see them, the ambulances rush about through the city, carrying dead and wounded from beneath the dusty ochre rubble.
