Quick Settlement Is Predicted for Miners' Walkout

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—House Speaker Martin today predicted quick settlement of the coal strike, perhaps by Tuesday, after arranging a peace pact between John L. Lewis and a mine operators' representative.

Attorney-General Clark announced, nevertheless, that the government will proceed with its contempt case against Lewis Monday, even if the strike is settled by then.

With no advance fanfare, Martin moved into the person district which in 27 days has brought idleness to more than half a million miners and other workmen.

Working by telephone, he persuaded Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, and Van Horn, operators' representative, to meet with him in his office at the capital today.

Proposed Bridges There he proposed Senator Bridges, R. N. H., as the third, neutral member of the board of trustees to administer the miners' walkout and retirement fund.

Lewis and Van Horn agreed to the Massachusetts lawmakers' suggestion. The whole affair took only 15 minutes.

But Attorney General Clark said the unexpected development would undermine his long-continued attempt of court charges against Lewis.

Ordered to Return Federal Judge Matthew McGuire a week ago ordered the miners back to work. But they didn't go, and Lewis said he had nothing to do with their decision.

Lewis as chairman of the pension trust fund called a meeting of trustees Monday in New York City.

2 Bullet Wounds Fatal to Miner; Inquest Pending Stabbed by Truck Driver

An inquest into the death of Robert Metcreek, 27, route 1, Twin Falls, who died at 10:59 p. m. Friday in the Twin Falls county hospital from two bullet wounds inflicted during a fight with State Police Officer Jack Lewis.

The death resulting from the inquest is expected Monday, according to Sheriff. He said Coroner Show is gathering evidence pertaining to the death and is unable, as yet, to determine if an inquest will be necessary.

Metcreek died as the result of a gunshot wound in the abdomen. He was shot in the right arm. He was wounded by Lewis after he allegedly attacked the trooper with a pocket knife while driving a warning that the truck he was driving was a defective signal.

Lewis had Metcreek, who was accompanied by his father, who was metcreek about 9:30 a. m. Friday near "Dadman's curve" on U. S. Highway 20 between Lewis and Lewis.

The fight started, according to Lewis, after he had warned Metcreek about a defective signal on a truck that was not in order. Lewis said he talked with the Metcreek about the defective signal and was returning to his car when Metcreek jumped him.

Lewis stated that followed Metcreek jumped a two and one-half inch gash in his left side and minor stab wounds in his chest, left arm and right hand and thumb. He was taken to the county hospital, treated and held later Friday to cooperate at the inquest.

In relating his version of the incident, Lewis said Saturday: "I talked the violation over with Metcreek, who was driving, for about 10 minutes and then I started back toward my car. Metcreek said there was no indication that anything was up. He said, 'I just saw some fellows' and suddenly this guy jumped on me, holding his arms around my neck."

THEY'RE BOTH TO BLAME!

A salesman from Salt Lake City came into our office Friday, and at first glance we could see he had something on his chest. "What in hell has happened to your roads?" he asked almost indignantly.

That's the kind of reaction we're getting every day from visitors arriving from all directions. Our highway system, just to put it frankly, is in a mess, and in spite of all the excuses and buckpassing the responsibility rests with the department of public works and the state administration.

We have dined on this subject until our readers probably are getting tired of it, but unless all the newspapers of the state start dinging and the people join with us in a concerted protest, all we are going to get out of these state departments is more appeals for money and little to show for it in the way of better roads.

The governor has suggested that one of the things we need is an "adequate highway financing program." We'd suggest knocking out the word "financing" for the time being, and starting from scratch.

We need qualified engineers, qualified maintenance men and qualified personnel throughout to get an efficient highway system. But we'll never get them under this political set-up.

Once the people of Idaho make up their minds to this very obvious fact and demand that our state highway department be removed from political control altogether, we'll see definite improvement in our highway system.

Don't let either the Republicans or Democrats in Idaho fool you in this respect. They're both guilty of using this department as a clearing house for political patronage.

Non-Operator Railmen Open Pay Hike Bid

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Sixteen non-operating railroad unions started their drive today to win wage raises. They demanded a 40-hour week and a wage raise of 25 cents an hour.

At St. Louis, George Leichty, president of the Order of Railroad Telegraphers and chairman of the drive, said drivers were mailed to the headquarters of each railroad.

These unions, representing about 1,000,000 railroad workers, put rates of 10¢ cents in 1946 and 12 1/2¢ cents in 1947.

Operators belated their three days before three operating brotherhoods—the engineers, firemen, and switchmen—each completed their second. Those three brotherhoods have rejected the proposal of a White House emergency board that they accept 15¢ cents, retroactive to Nov. 1. A strike is possible after April 26.

The 16 non-operating unions are: Railway clerks, machinists, hood and tinners, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers, electrical workers, railway engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen, yardmen, telegraphers, steamfitters, yardmasters, restaurant employees, child laborers, marine engineers, and journeymen.

Major goals given: Their major goals are: 1. A cut in the work-week from 48 to 40 hours, without any reduction in the present straight-time rates for 40 hours.

2. A raise of 25 cents an hour in wage rates after the hours adjustment has been made.

The unions want those terms to be effective May 10.

Each railroad is being asked to fix a date for the date of negotiation, but not later than May 10.

The emergency board is to consolidate the talks and bargain nationally.

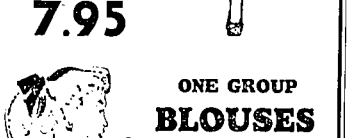

Plan to Crush 'Hard Core' of Red Party Set

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—A plan to crush the "hard core" of the American Communist party was being whipped into shape today for congressional action.

The House un-American activities committee will start writing it into a bill Wednesday, Representative Nathan B. Chitt, one of the plan's authors, predicted speedily and overwhelming house approval.

The plan, drafted by a subcommittee which Nixon heads, is aimed at making Communist party leaders subject to criminal prosecution on conspiracy charges.

"High Priority" Expected
Nixon said he expects it to get "high priority" from house leaders.

"This legislative program," Nixon told reporters, "is as vital to the security of the country as the European recovery program and the military defense recommendations of the President."

"The other two without this would leave a fatal defect in our national security."

Could Prosecute Foster
Nixon said that, under the plan, if the Communist party were found to be "conspiratorial," William Z. Foster could be prosecuted as its leader. Top penalty upon conviction would be a \$10,000 fine and 10 years in jail.

The subcommittee suggested expanding the 1940 Smith act which makes it illegal to conspire knowingly or willfully to overthrow the government by force and violence.

As amended by Nixon's group, the act would make it illegal to advocate overthrowing the government by any means "for the purpose of subverting the interests of the U. S. to that of a foreign communist power."

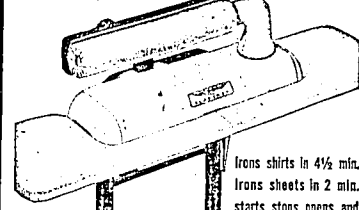

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower said today he "meant every word" in his statement of Jan. 23 taking himself out of the presidential nomination picture.

The retired army chief of staff talked with reporters as he left a conference on defense with President Truman.

"I made a direct statement on the presidency, Ike said he did not talk politics with Mr. Truman. He added:

"I made up my mind to say nothing more. I wrote a letter and meant every word of it."

"I told my aides they could do the talking from now on. I'm not talking any more. If I do, it doesn't do any good."

Eisenhower in a letter to a New Hampshire publisher last Jan. 23 said he could not accept a presidential nomination. He said his decision to "completely" remove himself from the political scene was "definite and positive."

That letter was written at a time he was being mentioned prominently for the Republican presidential nomination.

Talked for Hours

Since then Eisenhower has been talked of for the Democratic nomination.

The general, who takes over as president of Columbia university in June, was in uniform as he called on the President for a 20-minute talk.

He said Mr. Truman wanted to discuss with him the "general lay-out" of the nation's defense and the subject of "balance" of the defense program.

He said he and Mr. Truman and Defense Secretary Forrestal are in general agreement on defense plans and programs.

Bargaining Is Called in Meat Packer Strike

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—The government will try to end the 20-day-old CIO meat strike across the bargaining table — starting next Wednesday—instead of by a court order.

President Truman made that decision yesterday after studying the report of a three-man board of inquiry telling what the wage dispute is all about.

Third Case Reported

The meat strike is the third case in which Mr. Truman has demanded a strike of 20 days or more—fact-finding reports under the national emergency provision of the Taft-Hartley act. In the other two—atomic energy and coal—he took the next step and got federal court injunctions against the walkouts.

But in the meat case he stayed out of court—at least for the time being—and directed the federal mediation and conciliation service to sponsor further negotiations.

Bargaining Session Set

Last night this agency called a bargaining session for Wednesday morning in Chicago. The CIO Packinghouse Workers and the four biggest companies, Swift, Armour, Cudahy and Wilson, were asked to be there.

James J. Spillane, Chicago regional director of the service, said he is sure all parties will be on hand.

The dispute began when the union demanded a raise of 20 cents an hour and the companies offered only 10. The strike started March 16.

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Vienna Chiefs 'Not Enthused' On Pact Meet

There are some indications that the allied delegates here also are not enthused by London reports that the deputy foreign ministers are making progress on a peace treaty for Austria.

Optimistic expressions from the allied delegates have also led to speculation elsewhere as to whether a treaty now might not actually damage the general anti-communist cause.

Last year, when the Russians first indicated that they might make peace arrangements with the Austrian state department apparently believed that removal of occupation troops was a prime factor in Austrian recovery.

The premise is now open to serious question. Developments in Czechoslovakia have made the Austrians stop and think. Maybe continued occupation would be better than no left to the merits of the Russian offensive in Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Yugoslavia, plus the "refined" but well-armed organization the Red occupation forces would have behind. Moscow has given a good demonstration in Hungary of how it handles the line—its troops withdrawal clauses of peace treaties.

Automatic Control For Fires Urged

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—Most business fires start in basements or congested places, the National Fire Waste Council said today in endorsing an automatic sprinkler program as a means of cutting the nation's rising fire losses.

Fort Collins, Colo., was awarded first prize in the annual fire waste contest. The awards are based on efforts made by towns in keeping fire losses down, and do not necessarily go to a town with the best fire record.

Winners of honor awards in the fire waste contest include: Group 2 (250,000-500,000)—Seattle, Wash. Group 3 (20,000-50,000)—Billings, Mont., and Idaho, Ida.

Smaller Supplies Of Lamb Sighted

WASHINGTON, April 10 (AP)—The agriculture department predicted today supplies of lamb meat this spring and early summer will be smaller than a year ago.

Shunt feed supplies in some areas—particularly such major producing states as Texas and California—and bad weather in some other areas were blamed.

Only in southeastern states was condition of the early lamb crop said to be above average.

Wheat Crop May Set New Mark In Northwest Areas

SEATTLE, April 10 (AP)—Winter wheat crop estimates released Friday indicate possible new record production for Washington and the Pacific northwest.

The estimates are on the basis of April 1 reports of producers. Harvest C. H. Stewart, senior statistician for the department of agriculture here, said the Washington prediction of 62,000,000 bushels tops the record set in 1946 by nearly 1,500,000.

Last year's winter wheat harvest for the state was 51,850,000 bushels. The 10-year 1937-46 average is 37,572,000.

He said that if the estimates for Oregon, Idaho and Washington materialize, they will set a new three-state record. The prediction for Oregon is 27,660,000 and for Idaho 22,550,000.

Slews said the Washington crop came through the winter in excellent shape, with very little freeze damage. He said only a small amount of freezing with spring wheat will be necessary.

Bond Signing Is Work Out To Governor

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10 (AP)—Gov. Mon C. Wallgren wore blisters on his fingers writing his own name Friday.

The Washington state chief executive was in San Francisco signing the Tacoma Narrows toll bridge revenue bonds—14,000 \$1,000 bonds. But Governor Wallgren didn't have to sign his name 14,000 times.

Machine Used
"Only 700 times," he sighed, as he manipulated the master pen handle on a machine which recorded his name on 20 bonds simultaneously.

Governor Wallgren came to San Francisco to sign the bonds. It was the only place in the west, he said, where such a machine is available.

Governor Wallgren said that Washington state law requires that the governor and state auditor personally sign all bonds. Auditor Cliff Yelle already has signed the bridge bonds.

New Design Studied

The Tacoma Narrows bridge collapsed during a heavy windstorm Nov. 7, 1940. Governor Wallgren said much study has gone into the design for the new bridge and engineers are convinced they have developed a structural plan that will withstand even the terrific wind scourges of the Narrows.

Construction of the suspension type bridge may begin next week.

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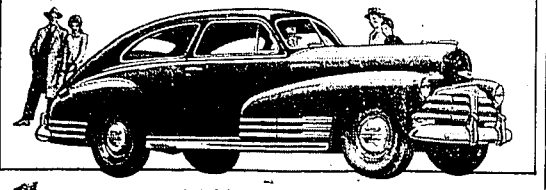

U. of I. Sets Up Reseeding Study Project

MOSCOW, April 10 (AP)—A special research project has been set up at the University of Idaho to study the practice of dropping from airplanes range grass seeds wrapped in pellets.

Dean D. S. Jeffers of the school of forestry said today the field tests show the best way to seed 10,000,000 acres of southern Idaho range lands.

The land specialists, he said, will seek answers first to these questions: What is the rate and amount of germination of seeds in pellets of different size and composition? How much are seeds injured by heat and moisture? What effects does the addition of fertilizer to the pellet materials have on germination and seedling survival? How uniform is the distribution of pellets dropped from planes? Can pellet materials be improved? Can burned-over forest land be reseeded by broadcasting pelleted tree seeds?

Tried Extensively

Pelleting of seeds in tiny balls of earth to protect them from erosion or rodents until they could get started has been tried extensively in the West.

Ordinarily Dean Jeffers said, research precedes application of a practice. In the case of pelleted seeds, however, the practice is spreading fast while "so far as we have been able to learn, this will be the first research study to determine its advantages, if any, over broadcasting ordinary seeds from a plane."

Last fall the federal bureau of land management sponsored a pellet dropping demonstration near Gooding. Some 21,000 acres of range lands were reseeded.

Plan to Continue

The bureau plans to continue large-scale reseeding operations in southern Idaho. It will cooperate with the university in planning, managing and gathering data on the operation.

The project is part of a long-range program for range management research approved by the university board of regents, Pres. J. E. Buchanan said.

The ultimate goal is to find a low cost method of establishing grasses and legumes on depleted southern Idaho range lands which are not suited to present rehabilitation methods. The pellet study will be one step in that direction, Buchanan said.

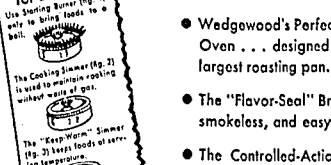

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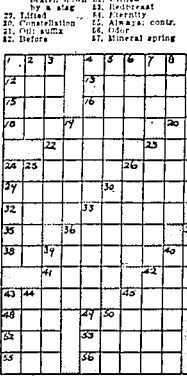
